Marriage Fundamental right to marry. That only a union between one man and one woman may be a marriage valid in or recognized by this 21 22 Commonwealth and its political subdivisions the right to marry is a fundamental right inherent in the liberty 23 of persons, and marriage is one of the vital personal rights essential to the orderly pursuit of happiness. 24 This Commonwealth and its political subdivisions shall not create or recognize a legal status for 25 relationships of unmarried individuals that intends to approximate the design, qualities, significance, or 26 effects of marriage deny the issuance of a marriage license to two parties contemplating a lawful marriage 27 on the basis of the sex, gender, or race of such parties. Nor shall this Commonwealth or its political 28 29 30
