4	Directing the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission to study the methodology for determining
5	non-federal sponsor contributions by localities to conduct coastal storm risk management studies in the

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11	WHEREAS, storm events and rising tidal waters cause recurrent flooding of the Commonwealth's land
12	resources, result in the loss of life, damage to property, and unsafe and unsanitary living conditions, disrupt
13	commerce and government services, and place the health, safety, and welfare of citizens living in flood-prone
14	areas at risk; and
15	WHEREAS, the Commonwealth has taken measures in recent years to prioritize the use of community
16	and regional scale planning, protect and enhance nature-based approaches, address socioeconomic inequities,
17	and enhance equity through flood resilience and preparedness; and
18	WHEREAS, the Chief Resilience Officer is tasked with coordinating and seeking to maximize the
19	availability and use of federal, state, and private funding to address resilience challenges, initiating and
20	assisting with the pursuit of funding opportunities at both the state and local levels, and utilizing his authority
21	to serve as a non-federal sponsor and enter into legal agreements as provided in § 2.2-220.5 of the Code of
22	Virginia; and WIJEREAS, the implementation of the Norfelly Coestal Starm Dick Management study is estimated to
23 24	WHEREAS, the implementation of the Norfolk Coastal Storm Risk Management study is estimated to cost the city \$2.6 billion, the Metropolitan Washington, District of Columbia Coastal Storm Risk
25	Management Feasibility Study is estimated to cost the impacted localities \$15.2 million, and the Virginia
26	Beach Coastal Storm Risk Management Study, Northern Virginia Coastal Storm Risk Management Study,
27	and Virginia Peninsula Coastal Storm Risk Management Feasibility Study are ongoing and expected to result
28	in significant and comparable cost-implementation estimates; and
29	WHEREAS, the non-federal cost-share for partnership in and implementation of coastal risk reduction
30	projects is typically 35 percent of the total cost estimate, and other costs may be incurred by non-federal
31	sponsors to ensure the safety and protection of Virginians; now, therefore, be it
32	RESOLVED by the House of Delegates, the Senate concurring, That the Joint Legislative Audit and
33	Review Commission be directed to study the methodology for determining non-federal sponsor contributions
34	by localities to conduct coastal storm risk management studies in the Commonwealth.
35 36	In conducting its study, the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission shall (i) examine the methodologies and criteria used by other states, if any to apportion monotary responsibility between the state
30 37	methodologies and criteria used by other states, if any, to apportion monetary responsibility between the state and the participating localities for the implementation costs of a coastal storm risk management study and
38	determine the portion of costs for which the non-federal sponsor is responsible; (ii) develop a recommended
39	methodology and any additional criteria for determining the division of costs for coastal storm risk
40	management studies and the implementation of such studies in the Commonwealth, which shall include
41	prioritization to implement risk-reduction projects in the Commonwealth that (a) reflect community and
42	regional scale planning; (b) protect and enhance nature-based approaches; (c) address socioeconomic
43	inequities; and (d) enhance equity through flood resilience and preparedness, consistent with measures
44	outlined in subsection B of § 10.1-658 of the Code of Virginia; and (iii) consider whether a stand-alone fund
45	shall be established to support and manage cost-share requests from non-federal sponsors for coastal storm
46	risk management studies.
47 19	All agencies of the Commonwealth shall provide assistance to the Joint Legislative Audit and Review
48 49	Commission for this study, upon request. The Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission shall complete its meetings for the first year by
5 0	November 30, 2025, and for the second year by November 30, 2026, and the chairman shall submit to the
51	Division of Legislative Automated Systems an executive summary of its findings and recommendations no
52	later than the first day of the next Regular Session of the General Assembly for each year. Each executive
53	summary shall state whether the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission intends to submit to the
54	General Assembly and the Governor a report of its findings and recommendations for publication as a House
55	or Senate document. The executive summaries and reports shall be submitted as provided in the procedures of
56	the Division of Legislative Automated Systems for the processing of legislative documents and reports and
57	shall be posted on the General Assembly's website.

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
