Cannabis Equity Reinvestment Fund. 45 There is hereby created in the state treasury a special nonreverting fund to be known as the Cannabis

45 There is hereby created in the state treasury a special nonreverting fund to be known as the Cannabis 46 Equity Reinvestment Fund, referred to in this section as "the Fund." The Fund shall be established on the 47 books of the Comptroller. All funds appropriated for such purpose and any gifts, donations, grants, bequests, 48 and other funds received on its behalf shall be paid into the state treasury and credited to the Fund. Interest 49 earned on moneys in the Fund shall remain in the Fund and be credited to it. Any moneys remaining in the 50 Fund, including interest thereon, at the end of each fiscal year shall not revert to the general fund but shall 51 remain in the Fund. Moneys in the Fund shall be used solely for the purposes of: 52 1. Supporting persons, families, and communities historically and disproportionately targeted and affected

1. Supporting persons, families, and communities historically and disproportionately targeted and affected by drug enforcement;

2. Providing scholarship opportunities and educational and vocational resources for historically marginalized persons, including persons in foster care, who have been adversely impacted by substance use individually, in their families, or in their communities;

Awarding grants to support workforce development, mentoring programs, job training and placement
 services, apprenticeships, and reentry services that serve persons and communities historically and
 disproportionately targeted by drug enforcement.

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4. Contributing to the Virginia Indigent Defense Commission established pursuant to § 19.2-163.01; and 60

5. Contributing to the Virginia Cannabis Equity Business Loan Fund established pursuant to § 4.1-1501. 61

Expenditures and disbursements from the Fund shall be made by the State Treasurer on warrants issued by 62

the Comptroller upon written request signed by (i) the Director of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion or (ii) a 63 majority of the members of the Cannabis Equity Reinvestment Board established pursuant to § 2.2-2499.5. 64

# § 3.2-4113. Production of industrial hemp lawful.

65 A. It is lawful for a grower, his agent, or a federally licensed hemp producer to grow, a handler or his 66 agent to handle, or a processor or his agent to process industrial hemp in the Commonwealth for any lawful 67 purpose. No federally licensed hemp producer or grower or his agent shall be prosecuted under Chapter 11 (§ 68 4.1-1100 et seq.) of Title 4.1 or § 18.2-247, 18.2-248, 18.2-248.01, 18.2-248.1, or 18.2-250 for the possession 69 70 or growing of industrial hemp or any Cannabis sativa with a tetrahydrocannabinol concentration that does not 71 exceed the total tetrahydrocannabinol concentration percentage established in federal regulations applicable 72 to negligent violations located at 7 C.F.R. § 990.6(b)(3). No handler or his agent or processor or his agent shall be prosecuted under Chapter 11 (§ 4.1-1100 et seq.) of Title 4.1 or § <del>18.2-247,</del> 18.2-248, 18.2-248.01, 73 18.2-248.1, or 18.2-250 or issued a summons or judgment for the possession, handling, or processing of 74 industrial hemp. In any complaint, information, or indictment, and in any action or proceeding brought for the 75 enforcement of any provision of Chapter 11 (§ 4.1-1100 et seq.) of Title 4.1, Article 1 (§ 18.2-247 et seq.) of 76 Chapter 7 of Title 18.2, or the Drug Control Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.), it shall not be necessary to negate any 77 78 exception, excuse, proviso, or exemption contained in this article or the Drug Control Act, and the burden of 79 proof of any such exception, excuse, proviso, or exemption shall be on the defendant.

B. Nothing in this article shall be construed to authorize any person to violate any federal law or 80 81 regulation.

82 C. No person shall be prosecuted under Chapter 11 (§ 4.1-1100 et seq.) of Title 4.1 or § 18.2-247, 18.2-248, 18.2-248.01, 18.2-248.1, or 18.2-250 for the involuntary growth of industrial hemp through the 83 84 inadvertent natural spread of seeds or pollen as a result of proximity to a production field, handler's storage 85 site, or process site. 86

# § 4.1-352. Certificate of forensic scientist as evidence; requiring forensic scientist to appear.

87 The certificate of any forensic scientist employed by the Commonwealth on behalf of the Board or the 88 Department of Forensic Science, when signed by him, shall be *admissible as* evidence in all prosecutions for violations of this subtitle and all controversies in any judicial proceedings touching the mixture analyzed by 89 90 him of the facts therein stated and of the results of such analysis (i) in any criminal proceeding, provided the 91 requirements of subsection A of § 19.2-187.1 have been satisfied and the accused has not objected to the 92 admission of the certificate pursuant to subsection B of § 19.2-187.1 or (ii) in any civil proceeding. On 93 motion of the accused or any party in interest, the court may require the forensic scientist making the analysis 94 to appear as a witness and be subject to cross-examination, provided such motion is made within a reasonable 95 time prior to the day on which the case is set for trial. 96

# § 4.1-600. Definitions.

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As used in this subtitle, unless the context requires a different meaning:

"Advertisement" or "advertising" means any written or verbal statement, illustration, or depiction that is 98 99 calculated to induce sales of retail marijuana, retail marijuana products, marijuana plants, or marijuana seeds, including any written, printed, graphic, digital, electronic, or other material, billboard, sign, or other outdoor 100 101 display, publication, or radio or television broadcast.

- 102 "Authority" means the Virginia Cannabis Control Authority created pursuant to this subtitle.
- 103 "Board" means the Board of Directors of the Virginia Cannabis Control Authority. 104
  - "Cannabis Control Act" means Subtitle II (§ 4.1-600 et seq.).

"Canopy" means the space used by a licensee to produce flowering marijuana plants, including areas 105 between plants, pathways, walkways, and empty space between rows that allow for airflow, light, growth, 106 access for watering, trimming, and other activities associated with marijuana cultivation. "Canopy" does not 107 include space used for mother plants, clones, immature or nonflowering plants, processing, drying, curing, 108 trimming, storage, offices, hallways, work areas, or other administrative and nonproduction uses. If 109 flowering marijuana plants are cultivated using a shelving or other layered system, the surface area of each 110 111 level shall be included for purposes of calculating canopy.

"Child-resistant" means, with respect to packaging or a container, (i) specially designed or constructed to 112 be significantly difficult for a typical child under five years of age to open and not to be significantly difficult 113 for a typical adult to open and reseal and (ii) for any product intended for more than a single use or that 114 contains multiple servings, resealable. 115

"Cultivation" or "cultivate" means the planting, propagation, growing, harvesting, drying, curing, grading, 116 117 trimming, *packaging*, or other similar processing *manufacturing* of marijuana for use or sale. "Cultivation" or 118 "cultivate" does not include manufacturing processing or testing.

- "Edible hemp product" means the same as that term is defined in § 3.2-4112. 119
- "Edible marijuana product" means a marijuana product intended to be consumed orally, including 120

121 marijuana intended to be consumed orally or marijuana concentrate intended to be consumed orally.

"Hemp product" means the same as that term is defined in § 3.2-4112.

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"Historically economically disadvantaged community" means either (i) a jurisdiction identified by the
Board utilizing census tract data made available by the United States Census Bureau in which offenses for
marijuana possession were committed at a rate in excess of 150 percent of the statewide average for
marijuana possession offenses during the 10-year period of 2009 to 2019 or (ii) a historically underutilized
business zone as defined in 15 U.S.C. § 657a.

"Immature plant" means a nonflowering marijuana plant that is no taller than eight inches and no widerthan eight inches, is produced from a cutting, clipping, or seedling, and is growing in a container.

130 "Industrial hemp" means the same as that term is defined in § 3.2-4112.

131 "Industrial hemp extract" means the same as that term is defined in § 3.2-5145.1.

132 "Licensed" means the holding of a valid license granted by the Authority.

133 "Licensee" means any person to whom a license has been granted by the Authority.

"Manufacturing" or "manufacture" means the production of marijuana products or the blending, infusing,
 compounding, or other preparation of marijuana and marijuana products, including marijuana extraction or
 preparation by means of chemical synthesis. "Manufacturing" or "manufacture" does not include cultivation
 or testing.

138 "Marijuana" means any part of a plant of the genus Cannabis, whether growing or not, its seeds or resin; 139 and every compound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture, or preparation of such plant, its seeds, its resin, or any extract containing one or more cannabinoids. "Marijuana" does not include (i) the mature stalks of 140 141 such plant, fiber produced from such stalk, or oil or cake made from the seed of such plant, unless such 142 stalks, fiber, oil, or cake is combined with other parts of plants of the genus Cannabis; (ii) industrial hemp, as 143 defined in \$ 3.2-4112, that is possessed by a person registered pursuant to subsection A of \$ 3.2-4115 or his agent; (iii) industrial hemp, as defined in § 3.2-4112, that is possessed by a person who holds a hemp 144 producer license issued by the U.S. Department of Agriculture pursuant to 7 C.F.R. Part 990; (iv) a hemp 145 product, as defined in § 3.2-4112; (v) an industrial hemp extract, as defined in § 3.2-5145.1; or (vi) any 146 147 substance containing a tetrahydrocannabinol isomer, ester, ether, salt, or salts of such isomer, ester, or ether 148 that has been placed by the Board of Pharmacy into one of the schedules set forth in the Drug Control Act (§ 149 54.1-3400 et seq.) pursuant to § 54.1-3443.

"Marijuana concentrate" means marijuana that has undergone a process to concentrate one or more active
 cannabinoids, thereby increasing the product's potency. Resin from granular trichomes from a marijuana plant
 is a concentrate for purposes of this subtitle.

"Marijuana cultivation facility" means a facility licensed under this subtitle to cultivate, label, and 153 154 package retail marijuana; to purchase or take possession of marijuana plants and seeds from other marijuana eultivation facilities; to transfer possession of and sell retail marijuana, immature marijuana plants, and 155 marijuana seeds to marijuana wholesalers and retail marijuana stores; to transfer possession of and sell retail 156 marijuana, marijuana plants, and marijuana seeds to other marijuana cultivation facilities; to transfer 157 158 possession of and sell retail marijuana to marijuana manufacturing facilities; and to sell immature marijuana plants and marijuana seeds to consumers for the purpose of cultivating marijuana at home for personal use § 159 160 4.1-800.

"Marijuana establishment" means a marijuana cultivation facility, a marijuana testing facility, a marijuana manufacturing processing facility, a marijuana wholesaler transporter, or a retail marijuana store.

163 "Marijuana manufacturing facility" means a facility licensed under this subtitle to manufacture, label, and 164 package retail marijuana and retail marijuana products; to purchase or take possession of retail marijuana 165 from a marijuana cultivation facility or another marijuana manufacturing facility; and to transfer possession 166 of and sell retail marijuana and retail marijuana products to marijuana wholesalers, retail marijuana stores, or 167 other marijuana manufacturing facilities.

"Marijuana paraphernalia" means all equipment, products, and materials of any kind that are either
designed for use or are intended for use in planting, propagating, cultivating, growing, harvesting,
manufacturing, compounding, converting, producing, processing, preparing, strength testing, analyzing,
packaging, repackaging, storing, containing, concealing, ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing into the
human body marijuana.

"Marijuana processing facility" means a facility licensed under § 4.1-801.

"Marijuana products" means (i) products that are composed of marijuana and other ingredients and are
 intended for use or consumption, ointments, and tinctures or (ii) marijuana concentrate.

"Marijuana testing facility" means a facility licensed under this subtitle to develop, research, or test
 marijuana, marijuana products, and other substances § 4.1-804.

178 "Marijuana wholesaler transporter" means a facility licensed under this subtitle to purchase or take
 179 possession of retail marijuana, retail marijuana products, immature marijuana plants, and marijuana seeds
 180 from a marijuana cultivation facility, a marijuana manufacturing facility, or another marijuana wholesaler and

181 to transfer possession and sell or resell retail marijuana, retail marijuana products, immature marijuana plants,

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182 and marijuana seeds to a marijuana cultivation facility, marijuana manufacturing facility, retail marijuana 183 store, or another marijuana wholesaler § 4.1-803.

184 "Non-retail marijuana" means marijuana that is not cultivated, manufactured, or sold by a licensed 185 marijuana establishment.

"Non-retail marijuana products" means marijuana products that are not manufactured and sold by a 186 187 licensed marijuana establishment.

"Micro business" means a licensee that meets the criteria set forth in subdivision B 13 of § 4.1-606. 188

189 "Outdoor cultivation" means cultivation in an area exposed to natural sunlight and open to environmental conditions, including variable temperature, precipitation, and wind. 190

"Place or premises" means the real estate, together with any buildings or other improvements thereon, 191 192 designated in the application for a license as the place at which the cultivation, manufacture processing, sale, 193 or testing of retail marijuana or retail marijuana products shall be performed, except that portion of any such 194 building or other improvement actually and exclusively used as a private residence.

"Processing" or "process" means the production of marijuana products or the blending, infusing, compounding, or other preparation of marijuana or marijuana products, including marijuana extraction or 195 196 preparation by means of chemical synthesis. "Processing" or "process" does not include cultivation or 197 198 testing.

199 "Public place" means any place, building, or conveyance to which the public has, or is permitted to have, 200 access, including restaurants, soda fountains, hotel dining areas, lobbies and corridors of hotels, and any park, place of public resort or amusement, highway, street, lane, or sidewalk adjoining any highway, street, or lane. 201

202 "Residence" means any building or part of a building or structure where a person resides, but does not 203 include any part of a building that is not actually and exclusively used as a private residence, nor any part of a 204 hotel or club other than a private guest room thereof.

"Retail marijuana" means marijuana that is cultivated, manufactured, or sold by a licensed marijuana 205 206 establishment.

"Retail marijuana products" means marijuana products that are manufactured and sold by a licensed 207 208 marijuana establishment.

209 "Retail marijuana store" means a facility licensed under this subtitle to purchase or take possession of 210 retail marijuana, retail marijuana products, immature marijuana plants, or marijuana seeds from a marijuana cultivation facility, marijuana manufacturing facility, or marijuana wholesaler and to sell retail marijuana, 211 retail marijuana products, immature marijuana plants, or marijuana seeds to consumers § 4.1-802. 212

"Sale" and "sell" includes soliciting or receiving an order for; keeping, offering, or exposing for sale; 213 214 peddling, exchanging, or bartering; or delivering otherwise other than gratuitously, by any means, retail 215 marijuana or retail marijuana products.

"Secure agricultural greenhouse" means an enclosed structure that has transparent walls and roofing and 216 is used for controlled-environment agriculture. 217

"Special agent" means an employee of the Virginia Cannabis Control Authority whom the Board has 218 designated as a law-enforcement officer pursuant to this subtitle. 219

Testing" or "test" means the research and analysis of marijuana, marijuana products, or other substances 220 for contaminants, safety, or potency. "Testing" or "test" does not include cultivation or manufacturing 221 222 processing. 223

"Tetrahydrocannabinol" means the same as that term is defined in  $\S$  3.2-4112.

"Total tetrahydrocannabinol" means the same as that term is defined in § 3.2-4112.

§ 4.1-601. Virginia Cannabis Control Authority created; public purpose.

226 A. The General Assembly has determined that there exists in the Commonwealth a need to control the 227 possession, sale, transportation, distribution, and delivery of retail marijuana and retail marijuana products in the Commonwealth. Further, the General Assembly determines that the creation of an authority for this 228 229 purpose is in the public interest, serves a public purpose, and will promote the health, safety, welfare, convenience, and prosperity of the people of the Commonwealth. To achieve this objective, there is hereby 230 231 created an independent political subdivision of the Commonwealth, exclusive of the legislative, executive, or judicial branches of state government, to be known as the Virginia Cannabis Control Authority. The 232 Authority's exercise of powers and duties conferred by this subtitle shall be deemed the performance of an 233 234 essential governmental function and a matter of public necessity for which public moneys may be spent.

B. The Board of Directors of the Authority is vested with control of the possession, sale, transportation, 235 distribution, and delivery of retail marijuana and retail marijuana products in the Commonwealth, with 236 plenary power to prescribe and enforce regulations and conditions under which retail marijuana and retail 237 238 marijuana products are possessed, sold, transported, distributed, and delivered, so as to prevent any corrupt, 239 incompetent, dishonest, or unprincipled practices and to promote the health, safety, welfare, convenience, and 240 prosperity of the people of the Commonwealth. The exercise of the powers granted by this subtitle shall be in all respects for the benefit of the citizens of the Commonwealth and for the promotion of their safety, health, 241 welfare, and convenience. No part of the assets or net earnings of the Authority shall inure to the benefit of, 242

or be distributable to, any private individual, except that reasonable compensation may be paid for services

rendered to or for the Authority affecting one or more of its purposes, and benefits may be conferred that are in conformity with said purposes, and no private individual shall be entitled to share in the distribution of any

of the corporate assets on dissolution of the Authority.

# \$ 4.1-603. Cannabis Public Health Advisory Council; purpose; membership; quorum; meetings; compensation and expenses; duties.

A. The Cannabis Public Health Advisory Council (the Advisory Council) is established as an advisory council to the Board. The purpose of the Advisory Council is to assess and monitor public health issues, trends, and impacts related to marijuana and marijuana legalization and make recommendations regarding health warnings, retail; marijuana and retail marijuana products safety and product composition, and public health awareness, programming, and related resource needs.

254 B. The Advisory Council shall have a total membership of 21 members that shall consist of 14 255 nonlegislative citizen members and seven ex officio members. Nonlegislative citizen members of the Council 256 shall be citizens of the Commonwealth and shall reflect the racial, ethnic, gender, and geographic diversity of 257 the Commonwealth. Nonlegislative citizen members shall be appointed as follows: four to be appointed by 258 the Senate Committee on Rules, one of whom shall be a representative from the Virginia Foundation for 259 Healthy Youth, one of whom shall be a representative from the Virginia Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics, one of whom shall be a representative from the Medical Society of Virginia, and one of whom 260 shall be a representative from the Virginia Pharmacists Association; six to be appointed by the Speaker of the 261 House of Delegates, one of whom shall be a representative from a community services board, one of whom 262 263 shall be a person or health care provider with expertise in substance use disorder treatment and recovery, one 264 of whom shall be a person or health care provider with expertise in substance use disorder prevention, one of whom shall be a person with experience in disability rights advocacy, one of whom shall be a person with 265 experience in veterans health care, and one of whom shall be a person with a social or health equity 266 267 background; and four to be appointed by the Governor, subject to confirmation by the General Assembly, one of whom shall be a representative of a local health district, one of whom shall be a person who is part of the 268 269 cannabis industry, one of whom shall be an academic researcher knowledgeable about cannabis, and one of 270 whom shall be a registered medical cannabis patient.

The Secretary of Health and Human Resources, the Commissioner of Health, the Commissioner of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services, the Commissioner of Agriculture and Consumer Services, the Director of the Department of Health Professions, the Director of the Department of Forensic Science, and the Chief Executive Officer of the Virginia Cannabis Control Authority, or their designees, shall serve ex officio with voting privileges. Ex officio members of the Advisory Council shall serve terms coincident with their terms of office.

After the initial staggering of terms, nonlegislative citizen members shall be appointed for a term of four
years. Appointments to fill vacancies, other than by expiration of a term, shall be for the unexpired terms.
Vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointments. All members may be reappointed.

280 The Advisory Council shall be chaired by the Secretary of Health and Human Resources or his designee. 281 The Advisory Council shall select a *chairman and* vice-chairman from among its membership. A majority of 282 the members shall constitute a quorum *unless the Advisory Council adopts a policy by the affirmative vote of* 283 *a majority of the Advisory Council members that allows for a lesser number of members to constitute a* 284 *quorum, which shall be no less than nine members.* The Advisory Council shall meet at least two times each 285 year and shall meet at the call of the chairman or, whenever the majority of the members so request, or upon 286 *the Board's submission of regulations to the Advisory Council for approval.* 

287 The Advisory Council shall have the authority to create subgroups with additional stakeholders, experts,288 and state agency representatives.

289 C. Members shall receive no compensation for the performance of their duties but shall be reimbursed for
290 all reasonable and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties as provided in §§ 2.2-2813
291 and 2.2-2825.

- 292 D. The Advisory Council shall have the following duties, in addition to duties that may be necessary to293 fulfill its purpose as described in subsection A:
- 1. To review multi-agency efforts to support collaboration and a unified approach on public health
   responses related to marijuana and marijuana legalization in the Commonwealth and to develop
   recommendations as necessary.
- 297 2. To monitor changes in drug use data related to marijuana and marijuana legalization in the
  298 Commonwealth and the science and medical information relevant to the potential health risks associated with
  299 such drug use, and make appropriate recommendations to the Department of Health and the Board.

300 3. Submit To review and approve Board regulations related to public health pursuant to subsection F of § 301 4.1-606. The Advisory Council shall approve or deny such regulations within 30 calendar days of the Board's

302 submission of the regulations to the Advisory Council. If the Advisory Council fails to approve or deny a 303 regulation within 30 calendar days, the Board may adopt such regulation without approval by the Advisory

304 Council.

305 4. To submit an annual report to the Governor and the General Assembly for publication as a report document as provided in the procedures of the Division of Legislative Automated Systems for the processing 306 307 of legislative documents and reports. The chairman shall submit to the Governor and the General Assembly an annual executive summary of the interim activity and work of the Advisory Council no later than the first 308 day of each regular session of the General Assembly. The executive summary shall be submitted as a report 309 document as provided in the procedures of the Division of Legislative Automated Systems for the processing 310

of legislative documents and reports and shall be posted on the General Assembly's website. 311

#### § 4.1-604. Powers and duties of the Board. 312 313

The Board shall have the following powers and duties:

1. Promulgate regulations in accordance with the Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.) and § 314 315 4.1-606; 316

2. Control the possession, sale, transportation, and delivery of marijuana and marijuana products;

3. Grant, suspend, restrict, revoke, or refuse to grant or renew any license or permit issued or authorized 317 318 pursuant to this subtitle;

319 4. Determine the nature, form, and capacity of all containers used for holding marijuana products to be kept or sold and prescribe the form and content of all labels and seals to be placed thereon; 320 321

5. Maintain actions to enjoin common nuisances as defined in § 4.1-1113;

322 6. Establish standards and implement an online course for employees of retail marijuana stores that trains 323 employees on how to educate consumers on the potential risks of marijuana use;

7. Establish a plan to develop and disseminate to retail marijuana store licensees a pamphlet or similar 324 325 document regarding the potential risks of marijuana use to be prominently displayed and made available to 326 consumers;

327 8. Establish a position for a Cannabis Social Equity Micro Business Liaison who shall lead the Cannabis 328 Micro Business Equity and Diversity Support Team and liaise with the Director of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion on matters related to diversity, equity, and inclusion standards micro business participation in the 329 marijuana industry; 330

331 9. Establish a Cannabis Micro Business Equity and Diversity Support Team, which shall (i) develop 332 requirements for the creation and submission of diversity, equity, and inclusion micro cannabis business 333 accelerator plans by persons who wish to possess a license in more than one license category pursuant to 334 subsection C of § 4.1-805, which may include a requirement that the licensee participate in social equity apprenticeship plan, and an approval process and requirements for implementation of such plans; (ii) be 335 responsible for conducting an analysis of potential barriers to entry for small, women-owned, and 336 337 minority-owned businesses and veteran-owned micro businesses interested in participating in the marijuana 338 industry and recommending strategies to effectively mitigate such potential barriers; (iii) provide assistance 339 with business planning for potential marijuana establishment licensees; (iv) spread awareness of business 340 opportunities related to the marijuana marketplace in areas disproportionately impacted by marijuana prohibition and enforcement historically economically disadvantaged communities; (v) provide technical 341 assistance in navigating the administrative process to potential marijuana establishment licensees; and (vi) 342 343 conduct other outreach initiatives in areas disproportionately impacted by marijuana prohibition and enforcement historically economically disadvantaged communities as necessary; 344

345 10. Establish a position for an individual with professional experience in a health related field who shall 346 staff the Cannabis Public Health Advisory Council, established pursuant to § 4.1-603, liaise with the Office 347 of the Secretary of Health and Human Resources and relevant health and human services agencies and 348 organizations, and perform other duties as needed;

349 11. Establish and implement a plan, in coordination with the Cannabis Social Equity Micro Business 350 Liaison and the Director of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion, to promote and encourage participation in the 351 marijuana industry by people from *historically economically disadvantaged* communities that have been disproportionately impacted by marijuana prohibition and enforcement and to positively impact those 352 communities; 353 354

12. Sue and be sued, implead and be impleaded, and complain and defend in all courts;

13. Adopt, use, and alter at will a common seal;

14. Fix, alter, charge, and collect rates, rentals, fees, and other charges for the use of property of, the sale 356 of products of, or services rendered by the Authority at rates to be determined by the Authority for the 357 purpose of providing for the payment of the expenses of the Authority; 358

15. Make and enter into all contracts and agreements necessary or incidental to the performance of its 359 duties, the furtherance of its purposes, and the execution of its powers under this subtitle, including 360 361 agreements with any person or federal agency;

362 16. Employ, at its discretion, consultants, researchers, architects, engineers, accountants, financial experts, 363 investment bankers, superintendents, managers, and such other employees and special agents as may be necessary and fix their compensation to be payable from funds made available to the Authority. Legal The 364

Board may employ or retain legal counsel of its choice to advise or represent the Authority in hearings,
controversies, or other matters involving the interests of the Authority; however, upon request by the Board,
the Attorney General shall provide legal services for the Authority shall be provided by the Attorney General
in accordance with Chapter 5 (§ 2.2-500 et seq.) of Title 2.2;

17. Receive and accept from any federal or private agency, foundation, corporation, association, or person 369 370 grants or other aid to be expended in accomplishing the objectives of the Authority, and receive and accept 371 from the Commonwealth or any state and any municipality, county, or other political subdivision thereof or 372 from any other source aid or contributions of either money, property, or other things of value, to be held, 373 used, and applied only for the purposes for which such grants and contributions may be made. All federal 374 moneys accepted under this section shall be accepted and expended by the Authority upon such terms and 375 conditions as are prescribed by the United States and as are consistent with state law, and all state moneys 376 accepted under this section shall be expended by the Authority upon such terms and conditions as are 377 prescribed by the Commonwealth;

378 18. Adopt, alter, and repeal bylaws, rules, and regulations governing the manner in which its business 379 shall be transacted and the manner in which the powers of the Authority shall be exercised and its duties 380 performed. The Board may delegate or assign any duty or task to be performed by the Authority to any 381 officer or employee of the Authority. The Board shall remain responsible for the performance of any such 382 duties or tasks. Any delegation pursuant to this subdivision shall, where appropriate, be accompanied by 383 written guidelines for the exercise of the duties or tasks delegated. Where appropriate, the guidelines shall 384 require that the Board receive summaries of actions taken. Such delegation or assignment shall not relieve the 385 Board of the responsibility to ensure faithful performance of the duties and tasks;

19. Conduct or engage in any lawful business, activity, effort, or project consistent with the Authority's
 purposes or necessary or convenient to exercise its powers;

388 20. Develop policies and procedures generally applicable to the procurement of goods, services, and construction, based upon competitive principles;

390 21. Develop policies and procedures consistent with Article 4 (§ 2.2-4347 et seq.) of Chapter 43 of Title
391 2.2;

392 22. Acquire, purchase, hold, use, lease, or otherwise dispose of any property, real, personal or mixed, 393 tangible or intangible, or any interest therein necessary or desirable for carrying out the purposes of the 394 Authority; lease as lessee any property, real, personal or mixed, tangible or intangible, or any interest therein, 395 at such annual rental and on such terms and conditions as may be determined by the Board; lease as lessor to 396 any person any property, real, personal or mixed, tangible or intangible, or any interest therein, at any time 397 acquired by the Authority, whether wholly or partially completed, at such annual rental and on such terms 398 and conditions as may be determined by the Board; sell, transfer, or convey any property, real, personal or 399 mixed, tangible or intangible, or any interest therein, at any time acquired or held by the Authority on such 400 terms and conditions as may be determined by the Board; and occupy and improve any land or building 401 required for the purposes of this subtitle;

402 23. Purchase, lease, or acquire the use of, by any manner, any plant or equipment that may be considered
403 necessary or useful in carrying into effect the purposes of this subtitle, including rectifying, blending, and
404 processing plants;

405 24. Appoint every agent and employee required for its operations, require any or all of them to give bonds
 406 payable to the Commonwealth in such penalty as shall be fixed by the Board, and engage the services of
 407 experts and professionals;

408 25. Hold and conduct hearings, issue subpoenas requiring the attendance of witnesses and the production 409 of records, memoranda, papers, and other documents before the Board or any agent of the Board, and 410 administer oaths and take testimony thereunder. The Board may authorize any Board member or agent of the 411 Board to hold and conduct hearings, issue subpoenas, administer oaths and take testimony thereunder, and 412 decide cases, subject to final decision by the Board, on application of any party aggrieved. The Board may 413 enter into consent agreements and may request and accept from any applicant, licensee, or permittee a 414 consent agreement in lieu of proceedings on (i) objections to the issuance of a license or permit or (ii) disciplinary action. Any such consent agreement (a) shall include findings of fact and provisions regarding 415 416 whether the terms of the consent agreement are confidential and (b) may include an admission or a finding of 417 a violation. A consent agreement shall not be considered a case decision of the Board and shall not be subject to judicial review under the provisions of the Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.), but may be 418 419 considered by the Board in future disciplinary proceedings;

26. Make a reasonable charge for preparing and furnishing statistical information and compilations to
persons other than (i) officials, including court and police officials, of the Commonwealth and of its
subdivisions if the information requested is for official use and (ii) persons who have a personal or legal
interest in obtaining the information requested if such information is not to be used for commercial or trade
purposes;

425 27. Take appropriate disciplinary action and assess and collect civil penalties and civil charges for

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426 violations of this subtitle and Board regulations;

427 28. Review and approve any proposed legislative or regulatory changes suggested by the Chief Executive Officer as the Board deems appropriate; 428

29. Report quarterly to the Secretary of Public Safety and Homeland Security on the law-enforcement 429 activities undertaken to enforce the provisions of this subtitle; 430

30. Establish and collect fees for all permits set forth in this subtitle, including fees associated with 431 432 applications for such permits;

433 31. Develop and make available on its website guidance documents regarding compliance and safe 434 practices for persons who cultivate marijuana at home for personal use, which shall include information 435 regarding cultivation practices that promote personal and public safety, including child protection, and 436 discourage practices that create a nuisance;

437 32. Develop and make available on its website a resource that provides information regarding (i) 438 responsible marijuana consumption; (ii) health risks and other dangers associated with marijuana 439 consumption, including inability to operate a motor vehicle and other types of transportation and equipment; 440 and (iii) ancillary effects of marijuana consumption, including ineligibility for certain employment 441 opportunities. The Board shall require that the web address for such resource be included on the label of all retail marijuana and retail marijuana product as provided in § 4.1-1402; and 442

33. Access during business hours any facility governed by this subtitle and any business that offers for 443 sale or sells at retail a substance intended for human consumption, orally or by inhalation, that is advertised 444 or labeled as containing a cannabinoid for the purpose of conducting an inspection or securing samples to 445 identify potential violations of this subtitle; 446

447 34. Issue a quarterly report that contains information regarding (i) license fees waived or reduced pursuant to § 4.1-606; (ii) licenses issued to or renewed for persons identified in subdivision B 13 of § 448 449 4.1-606; (iii) public education initiatives, including public awareness campaigns regarding driving under the influence, underage consumption and youth awareness, and health risks; (iv) community engagement 450 initiatives; (v) sales and tax revenue; (vi) programs funded by cannabis tax revenue; (vii) efforts made 451 pursuant to subdivisions 8, 9, 11, and 32; and (viii) license denials and disciplinary actions taken. 452

35. Coordinate with the Department of Criminal Justice Services to ensure the exchange of any 453 454 information necessary to comply with the reporting requirements of the Community Policing Reporting Database established pursuant to § 52-30.3; and 455 456

36. Do all acts necessary or advisable to carry out the purposes of this subtitle.

§ 4.1-606. Regulations of the Board.

A. The Board may promulgate reasonable regulations, not inconsistent with this subtitle or the general 458 459 laws of the Commonwealth, that it deems necessary to carry out the provisions of this subtitle and to prevent the illegal cultivation, manufacture processing, transportation, distribution, sale, and testing of marijuana and 460 461 marijuana products. The Board may amend or repeal such regulations. Such Except as otherwise provided by law, such regulations shall be promulgated, amended, or repealed in accordance with the Administrative 462 Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.) and shall have the effect of law. 463

B. The Board shall promulgate regulations that:

1. Govern the outdoor cultivation of marijuana by a marijuana cultivation facility licensee, including 465 security requirements to include lighting, physical security, and alarm requirements, provided that such 466 requirements do not prohibit the cultivation of marijuana outdoors or in a greenhouse; 467

2. Establish requirements for securely transporting marijuana between marijuana establishments; 468

3. Establish sanitary standards for retail marijuana product preparation;

470 4. Establish a testing program for retail manijuana and retail manijuana products pursuant to Chapter 14 (§ 471 4.1-1400 et seq.);

5. Establish an application process for licensure as a marijuana establishment pursuant to this subtitle in a 472 473 way that, when possible, prevents disparate impacts on historically *economically* disadvantaged communities;

474 6. Establish requirements for health and safety warning labels to be placed on retail marijuana and retail marijuana products to be sold or offered for sale by a licensee to a consumer in accordance with the 475 476 provisions of this subtitle;

477 7. Establish a maximum tetrahydrocannabinol level for retail marijuana products, which shall not exceed (i) five 10 milligrams per serving for edible marijuana products and where practicable an equivalent amount 478 479 for other marijuana products or (ii) 50 100 milligrams per package for edible marijuana products and where practicable an equivalent amount for other marijuana products. Such regulations may include other product 480 481 and dispensing limitations on tetrahydrocannabinol;

8. Establish requirements for the form, content, and retention of all records and accounts by all licensees;

483 9. Provide alternative methods for licensees to maintain and store business records that are subject to 484 Board inspection, including methods for Board-approved electronic and offsite storage;

485 10. Establish (i) criteria by which to evaluate new licensees based on the density of retail marijuana stores in the community and (ii) metrics that have similarly shown an association with negative community-level 486

health outcomes or health disparities. In promulgating such regulations, the Board shall coordinate with the
Cannabis Public Health Advisory Council established pursuant to § 4.1-603. Such regulations shall ensure

**489** that marijuana establishment licenses are, as possible and practicable, issued evenly among all areas of the

**490** *Commonwealth*;

491 11. Require retail licensees to file an appeal from any hearing decision rendered by a hearing officer
492 within 30 days of the date the notice of the decision is sent. The notice shall be sent to the licensee at the
493 address on record with the Board by certified mail, return receipt requested, and by regular mail;

494 12. Prescribe the schedule of proration for refunded license fees to licensees who qualify pursuant to495 subsection C of § 4.1-1002;

496 13. Establish criteria by which to evaluate social equity *identify micro business* license applicants, which 497 shall be an applicant who has lived or been domiciled for at least 12 months in the Commonwealth and is 498 either (i) an applicant with that has at least 66 percent ownership and direct control by a person or persons 499 who (i) have been convicted of or adjudicated delinquent for any misdemeanor violation of  $\S$  18.2-248.1, former § 18.2-250.1, or subsection A of § 18.2-265.3 as it relates to marijuana; (ii) an applicant with at least 500 501 <del>66 percent ownership by a person or persons who is are the parent, child, sibling, or spouse of a person who</del> 502 has been convicted of or adjudicated delinquent for any misdemeanor violation of § 18.2-248.1, former § 503 18.2-250.1, or subsection A of § 18.2-265.3 as it relates to marijuana; (iii) an applicant with at least 66 504 percent ownership by a person or persons who have resided for at least three of the past five years in a 505 jurisdiction that is determined by the Board after utilizing census tract data made available by the United 506 States Census Bureau to have been disproportionately policed for marijuana crimes; (iv) an applicant with at 507 least 66 percent ownership by a person or persons who have resided for at least three of the last five years in a 508 jurisdiction determined by the Board after utilizing census tract data made available by the United States 509 Census Bureau to be economically distressed; or (v) an applicant with at least 66 percent ownership by a

510 person or persons who graduated from a historically black historically economically disadvantaged

511 community; (iv) have attended for at least five years a public elementary or secondary school located in a

historically economically disadvantaged community; (v) have received a Federal Pell Grant or attended for
at least two years a college or university located in the Commonwealth at which at least 30 percent of the
students, on average, are eligible for a Federal Pell Grant; or (vi) is a veteran of the Armed Forces of the
United States;

516 14. For the purposes of establishing criteria by which to evaluate social equity license applicants, establish
517 standards by which to determine (i) which jurisdictions have been disproportionately policed for marijuana
518 crimes and (ii) which jurisdictions are economically distressed;

15. Establish For applicants that meet the criteria set forth in subdivision 13, establish standards and 519 520 requirements for (i) any a preference in the licensing process for qualified social equity applicants; (ii) what 521 percentage of application or license fees are waived for a qualified social equity applicant, and to promote 522 participation by micro businesses with an inability to pay standard application and license fees; (iii) a 523 low-interest business loan program for qualified social equity applicants; (iv) a waiver of any requirements to 524 show proof of funds or current possession and control of the proposed licensed premises at the time of application; and (v) to the extent practicable, the proportional distribution of licenses among the applicants 525 526 set forth in clauses (i) through (vi) of subdivision 13. The Board shall establish a process that prioritizes such 527 applicants based on the number of subdivision 13 criteria categories met and ensures that increased priority 528 is provided to applicants that meet the most criteria categories;

529 16. 15. Establish guidelines, in addition to requirements set forth in this subtitle, for the personal
 530 cultivation of marijuana that promote personal and public safety, including child protection, and discourage
 531 personal cultivation practices that create a nuisance, including a nuisance caused by odor;

532 17. 16. Establish reasonable time, place, and manner restrictions on outdoor advertising of retail marijuana
 533 or retail marijuana products, not inconsistent with the provisions of this chapter, so that such advertising
 534 displaces the illicit market and notifies the public of the location of marijuana establishments. Such
 535 regulations shall be promulgated in accordance with § 4.1-1404;

536 18. 17. Establish restrictions on the number of licenses that a person may be granted to operate a
 537 marijuana establishment in single locality or region; and

538 19. Establish restrictions on pharmaceutical processors and industrial hemp processors that have been
 539 granted a license in more than one license category pursuant to subsection C of § 4.1-805 that ensure all
 540 licensees have an equal and meaningful opportunity to participate in the market. Such regulations may limit
 541 the amount of products cultivated or manufactured by the pharmaceutical processor or industrial hemp
 542 processor that such processor may offer for sale in its retail marijuana stores

543 18. Allow micro business licensees to (i) enter into cooperative agreements with other micro business
544 licensees and (ii) lease space and equipment and cultivate, manufacture, and sell marijuana and marijuana
545 products on the premises of another licensee.

**546** C. The Board may promulgate regulations that:

547 1. Limit the number of licenses issued by type or class to operate a marijuana establishment; however, the

- 548 number of licenses issued shall not exceed the following limits:
- 549 a. Retail marijuana stores, 400 350;
- 550 b. Marijuana wholesalers, 25;
- 551 e. Marijuana manufacturing processing facilities, 60 100; and
- d. Marijuana c. Tier I marijuana cultivation facilities, 450 50; 552
- 553 d. Tier II marijuana cultivation facilities, 50;
- 554 e. Tier III marijuana cultivation facilities, 10;
- 555 f. Tier IV marijuana cultivation facilities, 5:
- g. Tier V marijuana cultivation facilities, 10; and 556
- 557 h. Marijuana testing facilities, the maximum number of licenses permitted under Board regulations.
- 558 In determining the number of licenses issued pursuant to this subdivision, the Board shall not consider any license granted pursuant to subsection C of § 4.1-805 to (i) a pharmaceutical processor that has been issued a 559 permit by the Board of Pharmacy pursuant to Article 4.2 (§ 54.1-3442.5 et seq.) of the Drug Control Act or 560 (ii) an industrial hemp processor registered with the Commissioner of Agriculture and Consumer Services 561 pursuant to Chapter 41.1 (§ 3.2-4112 et seq.) of Title 3.2. 562
- 563 2. Prescribe any requirements deemed appropriate for the administration of taxes under §§ § 4.1-1003 and 4.1-1004, including method of filing a return, information required on a return, and form of payment. 564
- 3. Limit the allowable square footage of a retail marijuana store, which shall not exceed 1,500 2,500 565 566 square feet of retail floor space.
- 4. Allow certain persons to be granted or have interest in a license in more than one of the following 567 568 license categories: marijuana cultivation facility license, marijuana manufacturing facility license, marijuana 569 wholesaler license, or retail marijuana store license. Such regulations shall be drawn narrowly to limit vertical integration to small businesses and ensure that all licensees have an equal and meaningful opportunity to 570 571 participate in the market.
- D. Board regulations shall be uniform in their application, except those relating to hours of sale for 572 573 licensees. 574
  - E. Courts shall take judicial notice of Board regulations.
- 575 F. The Board shall consult with the Cannabis Public Health Advisory Council in promulgating any 576 regulations relating to public health, including regulations promulgated pursuant to subdivision B 3, 4, 6, 7, 10, or 16 15, and, except as otherwise provided in § 4.1-603, shall not promulgate any such regulation that 577 has not been approved by a majority of the members of the Cannabis Public Health Advisory Council. 578
- 579 G. With regard to regulations governing licensees that have been issued a permit by the Board of Pharmacy to operate as a pharmaceutical processor or cannabis dispensing facility pursuant to Article 4.2 (§ 580 581 54.1-3442.5 et seq.) of the Drug Control Act Chapter 16 (§ 4.1-1600 et seq.), the Board shall make reasonable efforts (i) to align such regulations with any applicable regulations promulgated by the Board of 582 Pharmacy that establish health, safety, and security requirements for pharmaceutical processors and cannabis 583 dispensing facilities and (ii) to deem in compliance with applicable regulations promulgated pursuant to this 584 subtitle such pharmaceutical processors and cannabis dispensing facilities that have been found to be in 585 586 compliance with regulations promulgated by the Board of Pharmacy that mirror or are more extensive in 587 scope than similar regulations promulgated pursuant to other provisions of this subtitle.
  - H. The Board's power to regulate shall be broadly construed.

# § 4.1-607. Board membership; terms; compensation.

- 590 A. The Authority shall be governed by a Board of Directors, which shall consist of five seven citizens at large as follows: five members appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the affirmative vote of a majority 591 592 of those voting in each house of the General Assembly and two members appointed by the Joint Rules 593 Committee and confirmed by the affirmative vote of a majority of those voting in each house of the General Assembly. Each appointee shall (i) have been a resident of the Commonwealth for a period of at least three 594 595 years next preceding his appointment, and his continued residency shall be a condition of his tenure in office; 596 (ii) hold, at a minimum, a baccalaureate degree in business or a related field of study; and (iii) possess a 597 minimum of seven years of demonstrated experience or expertise in the direct management, supervision, or 598 control of a business or legal affairs. Members shall be appointed in a manner that ensures expertise among 599 the Board members in health, law, agriculture, finance, and law enforcement. Appointees shall reflect the racial, ethnic, gender, and geographic diversity of the Commonwealth. Appointees shall be subject to a 600 601 background check in accordance with § 4.1-609.
- 602 B. After the initial staggering of terms, members shall be appointed for a term of five years. All members 603 shall serve until their successors are appointed. Any appointment to fill a vacancy shall be for the unexpired term. No member appointed by the Governor shall be eligible to serve more than two consecutive terms; 604 605 however, a member appointed to fill a vacancy may serve two additional consecutive terms. Members of the 606 Board may be removed from office by the Governor for cause, including the improper use of its police 607 powers, malfeasance, misfeasance, incompetence, misconduct, neglect of duty, absenteeism, conflict of interests, failure to carry out the policies of the Commonwealth as established in the Constitution or by the 608

609 General Assembly, or refusal to carry out a lawful directive of the Governor.

610 C. The Governor shall appoint the chairman and vice-chairman of the Board from among the membership

611 of the Board. The Board may elect other subordinate officers, who need not be members of the Board. The Board may also form committees and advisory councils, which may include representatives who are not 612

- 613 members of the Board, to undertake more extensive study and discussion of the issues before the Board. A
- majority of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of the Authority's business, and no 614
- vacancy in the membership shall impair the right of a quorum to exercise the rights and perform all duties of 615 the Authority. 616
- 617 D. The Board shall meet at least every 60 days for the transaction of its business. Special meetings may be 618 held at any time upon the call of the chairman of the Board or the Chief Executive Officer or upon the written 619 request of a majority of the Board members.
- 620 E. Members of the Board shall receive annually such salary, compensation, and reimbursement of expenses for the performance of their official duties as set forth in the general appropriation act for members 621 of the House of Delegates when the General Assembly is not in session, except that the chairman of the 622 623 Board shall receive annually such salary, compensation, and reimbursement of expenses for the performance 624 of his official duties as set forth in the general appropriation act for a member of the Senate of Virginia when 625 the General Assembly is not in session.
- F. The provisions of the State and Local Government Conflict of Interests Act (§ 2.2-3100 et seq.) shall 626 apply to the members of the Board, the Chief Executive Officer of the Authority, and the employees of the 627 Authority. 628 629

# § 4.1-611. Seed-to-sale tracking system.

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630 To ensure that no retail marijuana or retail marijuana products grown or processed by a marijuana 631 establishment are sold or otherwise transferred except as authorized by law, the Board shall develop and maintain a seed-to-sale tracking system that tracks retail marijuana from either the seed or immature plant 632 633 stage until the retail marijuana or retail marijuana product is sold to a customer at a retail marijuana store.

# § 4.1-614. Disposition of moneys collected by the Board.

A. All moneys collected by the Board shall be paid directly and promptly into the state treasury, or shall 635 636 be deposited to the credit of the State Treasurer in a state depository, without any deductions on account of 637 salaries, fees, costs, charges, expenses, refunds, or claims of any description whatever, as required by § 638 2.2-1802.

639 All moneys so paid into the state treasury, less the net profits determined pursuant to subsection C, shall 640 be set aside as and constitute an Enterprise Fund, subject to appropriation, for the payment of (i) the salaries and remuneration of the members, agents, and employees of the Board and (ii) all costs and expenses 641 642 incurred in the administration of this subtitle.

643 B. The net profits derived under the provisions of this subtitle shall be transferred by the Comptroller to 644 the general fund of the state treasury quarterly, within 50 days after the close of each quarter or as otherwise 645 provided in the appropriation act. As allowed by the Governor, the Board may deduct from the net profits quarterly a sum for the creation of a reserve fund not exceeding the sum of \$2.5 million in connection with 646 647 the administration of this subtitle and to provide for the depreciation on the buildings, plants, and equipment 648 owned, held, or operated by the Board. After accounting for the Authority's expenses as provided in 649 subsection A, net profits shall be appropriated in the general appropriation act as follows:

650 1. Forty Ten percent to pre-kindergarten programs for at-risk three-year-olds and four-year-olds;

2. Thirty Sixty percent to the Cannabis Equity Reinvestment Fund established pursuant to § 2.2-2499.8; 651

3. Twenty-five percent to the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services, which shall 652 653 distribute such appropriated funds to community services boards for the purpose of administering substance 654 use disorder prevention and treatment programs; and

655 4. Five percent to public health programs, including public awareness campaigns that are designed to prevent drugged driving, discourage consumption by persons younger than 21 years of age, and inform the 656 657 public of other potential risks.

C. As used in this section, "net profits" means the total of all moneys collected by the Board, less local 658 659 marijuana tax revenues collected under subsection B of § 4.1-1004 and distributed pursuant to § 4.1-614 660 4.1-1003 and all costs, expenses, and charges authorized by this section.

D. All local tax revenues collected under subsection B of § 4.1-1004 4.1-1003 shall be paid into the state 661 treasury as provided in subsection A and credited to a special fund, which is hereby created on the 662 Comptroller's books under the name "Collections of Local Marijuana Taxes." The revenues shall be credited 663 to the account of the locality in which they were collected. If revenues were collected from a marijuana 664 665 establishment located in more than one locality by reason of the boundary line or lines passing through the marijuana establishment, tax revenues shall be distributed pro rata among the localities. The Authority shall 666 667 provide to the Comptroller any records and assistance necessary for the Comptroller to determine the locality 668 to which tax revenues are attributable.

669 On a quarterly basis, the Comptroller shall draw his warrant on the Treasurer of Virginia in the proper

670 amount in favor of each locality entitled to the return of its tax revenues, and such payments shall be charged

671 to the account of each such locality under the special fund created by this section. If errors are made in any 672 such payment, or adjustments are otherwise necessary, whether attributable to refunds to taxpayers, or to

673 some other fact, the errors shall be corrected and adjustments made in the payments for the next quarter.

#### § 4.1-621. Certain information not to be made public. 674

675 Neither the Board nor its employees shall divulge any information regarding (i) financial reports or records required pursuant to this subtitle; (ii) the purchase orders and invoices for retail marijuana or retail 676 marijuana products filed with the Board by marijuana wholesaler licensees; (iii) taxes collected from, 677 refunded to, or adjusted for any person; or (iv) information contained in the seed-to-sale tracking system 678 679 maintained by the Board pursuant to § 4.1-611. The provisions of § 58.1-3 shall apply, mutatis mutandis, to 680 taxes collected pursuant to this subtitle and to purchase orders and invoices for retail marijuana or retail marijuana products filed with the Board by marijuana wholesaler licensees. 681

682 Nothing contained in this section shall prohibit the use or release of such information or documents by the 683 Board to any governmental or law-enforcement agency, or when considering the granting, denial, revocation, 684 or suspension of a license or permit, or the assessment of any penalty against a licensee or permittee, nor shall 685 this section prohibit the Board or its employees from compiling and disseminating to any member of the public aggregate statistical information pertaining to (a) tax collection, as long as such information does not 686 reveal or disclose tax collection from any identified licensee; (b) the total amount of retail marijuana or retail 687 marijuana products sales in the Commonwealth by marijuana wholesaler licensees collectively; or (c) the 688 689 total amount of purchases or sales submitted by licensees, provided that such information does not identify 690 the licensee. 691

# § 4.1-629. Local referendum on prohibition of retail marijuana stores.

A. The governing body of a locality may, by resolution, petition the circuit court for the locality for a 692 693 referendum on the question of whether retail marijuana stores should be prohibited in the locality.

Upon the filing of a petition, the circuit court shall order the election officials to conduct a referendum on 694 the question on the date fixed in the order. The date set by the order shall comply with the provisions of § 695 24.2-682, but in no event shall such date be more than 90 days from the date the order is issued. The clerk of 696 697 the circuit court shall publish notice of the referendum in a newspaper of general circulation in the locality 698 once a week for three consecutive weeks prior to the referendum. 699

The question on the ballot shall be:

"Shall the operation of retail marijuana stores be prohibited in \_\_\_\_\_\_ (name of county, city, or 700 701 town)?"

The referendum shall be held and the results certified as provided in § 24.2-684. In addition to the 702 703 certifications required by such section, the secretary of the local electoral board shall certify the results of 704 the referendum to the Board of Directors of the Virginia Cannabis Control Authority and to the governing 705 body of the locality.

706 B. If a majority of the qualified voters voting in such referendum vote "No" on the question of whether 707 retail marijuana stores shall be prohibited in the locality, retail marijuana stores shall be permitted to 708 operate within the locality 60 days after the results are certified or on January 1, 2026, whichever is later, 709 and no subsequent referendum may be held pursuant to this section within such locality.

If a majority of the qualified voters voting in such referendum vote "Yes" on the question of whether retail 710 711 marijuana stores shall be prohibited in the locality, retail marijuana stores shall be prohibited in the locality 712 effective January 1 of the year immediately following the referendum. A referendum on the same question 713 may be held subsequent to a vote to prohibit retail marijuana stores but not earlier than four years following 714 the date of the previous referendum. Any subsequent referendum shall be held pursuant to the provisions of 715 this section.

716 C. When any referendum is held pursuant to this section in a town, separate and apart from the county in 717 which such town or a part thereof is located, such town shall be treated as being separate and apart from such county. When any referendum in held pursuant to this section in a county, any town located within such 718 719 county shall be treated as being part of such county.

D. The legality of any referendum held pursuant to this section shall be subject to the inquiry, 720 721 determination, and judgment of the circuit court that ordered the referendum. The court shall proceed upon the complaint of 15 or more qualified voters of the county, city, or town, filed within 30 days after the date 722 723 the results of the referendum are certified and setting out fully the grounds of contest. The complaint and the proceedings shall conform as nearly as practicable to the provisions of § 15.2-1654, and the judgment of the 724 court entered of record shall be a final determination of the legality of the referendum. 725

E. Referendums held pursuant to this section shall not apply to or prohibit the licensure and operation of 726 727 a marijuana establishment by and on the premises of a pharmaceutical processor or cannabis dispensing 728 facility that holds a valid permit issued by the Board pursuant to Chapter 16 (§ 4.1-1600 et seq.) prior to 729 November 1, 2024.

#### 730 § 4.1-630. Local ordinances or resolutions regulating marijuana or marijuana products.

731 A. No county, city, or town shall, except as provided in §§ 4.1-629 and 4.1-631, adopt any ordinance or

732 resolution that regulates or prohibits the cultivation, processing, possession, sale, distribution, handling,

733 transportation, consumption, use, advertising, or dispensing of marijuana or marijuana products in the 734 Commonwealth.

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735 B. However, the governing body of any county, city, or town may adopt an ordinance that prohibits in its 736 local public parks, playgrounds, public streets, or any sidewalk adjoining any public street the acts described 737 in § 4.1-1108 or the acts described in § 4.1-1109 and may provide a penalty for violation thereof.

738 C. Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to supersede or limit the authority of a locality to adopt and 739 enforce local ordinances to regulate businesses licensed pursuant to this chapter, including local zoning and 740 land use requirements and business license requirements.

741 D. Except as provided in this section, all local acts, including charter provisions and ordinances of 742 counties, cities, and towns, inconsistent with any of the provisions of this subtitle, are repealed to the extent 743 of such inconsistency. 744

# § 4.1-631. Local ordinances regulating time of sale of marijuana and marijuana products.

745 The governing body of each county may adopt ordinances effective in that portion of such county not 746 embraced within the corporate limits of any incorporated town, and the governing body of each city and town 747 may adopt ordinances effective in such city or town, fixing hours during which marijuana and marijuana products may be sold. Such governing bodies shall provide for fines and other penalties for violations of any 748 749 such ordinances, which shall be enforced as if the violations were Class 1 misdemeanors with a right of 750 appeal pursuant to § 16.1-106.

A copy of any ordinance adopted pursuant to this section shall be certified by the clerk of the governing 751 752 body adopting it and transmitted to the Board.

753 On and after the effective date of any ordinance adopted pursuant to this section, no marijuana store shall 754 sell marijuana or marijuana products during the hours limited by the ordinance.

## CHAPTER 7.

# ADMINISTRATION OF LICENSES; GENERAL PROVISIONS.

#### § 4.1-700. Exemptions from licensure.

The licensure requirements of this subtitle shall not apply to (i) a cannabis dispensing facility or 758 759 pharmaceutical processor that has been issued a permit by the Board and is acting in accordance with the 760 provisions of Chapter 16 (§ 4.1-1600 et seq.); (ii) a handler, grower, or processor of industrial hemp that is 761 registered with the Commissioner of Agriculture and Consumer Services pursuant to Chapter 41.1 (§ 762 3.2-4112 et seq.) of Title 3.2 and is acting in accordance with the provisions of Title 3.2; (iii) a person that 763 has been issued a regulated hemp product retail facility registration and is acting in accordance with the 764 provisions of Title 3.2; (iv) a manufacturer of an edible hemp product operating in accordance with Article 5 765 (\$ 3.2-5145.1 et seq.) of Chapter 51 of Title 3.2; or (v) a person who cultivates marijuana at home for personal use pursuant to § 4.1-1101. Nothing in this subtitle shall be construed to (a) prevent any person 766 767 described in clauses (i) through (iv) from obtaining a license pursuant to this subtitle, provided such person 768 satisfies applicable licensing requirements; (b) prevent a licensee from acquiring hemp products from an 769 industrial hemp processor in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 41.1 (§ 3.2-4112 et seq.) of Title 3.2; or (c) prevent a cultivation, processing, transporter, or retail licensee from operating on the licensed 770 771 premises a pharmaceutical processing facility in accordance with Chapter 16 (§ 4.1-1600 et seq.) or an industrial hemp processing facility in accordance with Chapter 41.1 (§ 3.2-4112 et seq.) of Title 3.2. 772 773

§ 4.1-701. To whom privileges conferred by licenses extend; liability for violations of law.

774 The privilege of any licensee to cultivate, process, transport, sell, or test marijuana or marijuana products 775 shall extend to such licensee and to all agents or employees of such licensee for the purpose of operating 776 under such license. The licensee may be held liable for any violation of this subtitle or any Board regulation 777 committed by such agents or employees in connection with their employment.

#### 778 § 4.1-702. Separate license for each place of business; transfer or amendment; posting; expiration; civil penalties. 779

780 A. Each license granted by the Board shall designate the place where the business of the licensee will be 781 carried on. A separate license shall be required for each separate place of business.

B. No license shall be transferable from one location to another or from one person to another unless 782 783 such transfer is conducted in accordance with Board regulations.

784 C. The Board may permit a licensee to amend the classification of an existing license without complying 785 with the posting and publishing procedures required by § 4.1-1000 if the effect of the amendment is to reduce materially the privileges of an existing license. 786

787 D. Each license shall be posted in a location conspicuous to the public at the place where the licensee 788 carries on the business for which the license is granted.

789 E. The privileges conferred by any license granted by the Board shall continue until the last day of the 790 twelfth month next ensuing or the last day of the designated month and year of expiration, except the license 791 may be sooner terminated for any cause for which the Board would be entitled to refuse to grant a license or 792 by operation of law, voluntary surrender, or order of the Board.

793 The Board may grant licenses for one year or for multiple years, not to exceed three years, based on the

794 fees set by the Board pursuant to § 4.1-1001. Qualification for a multiyear license shall be determined on the 795 basis of criteria established by the Board. Fees for multivear licenses shall not be refundable except as provided in § 4.1-1002. The Board may provide a discount for two-year or three-year licenses, not to exceed 796 797 five percent of the applicable license fee, which extends for one fiscal year and shall not be altered or 798 rescinded during such period. 799 *F. The Board may permit a licensee who fails to pay:* 1. The required license fee covering the continuation or reissuance of his license by midnight of the 800 fifteenth day of the twelfth month or of the designated month of expiration, whichever is applicable, to pay the 801 fee in lieu of posting and publishing notice and reapplying, provided payment of the fee is made within 30 802 803 days following that date and is accompanied by a civil penalty of \$25 or 10 percent of such fee, whichever is 804 greater; and 805 2. The fee and civil penalty pursuant to subdivision 1 to pay the fee in lieu of posting and publishing 806 notice and reapplying, provided payment of the fee is made within 45 days following the 30 days specified in subdivision 1 and is accompanied by a civil penalty of \$100 or 25 percent of such fee, whichever is greater. 807

**808** Such civil penalties collected by the Board shall be deposited in accordance with § 4.1-614.

809 § 4.1-703. Records of licensees; inspection of records and places of business.

A. Every licensed marijuana establishment shall keep complete, accurate, and separate records in
 accordance with Board regulations of all marijuana and marijuana products it cultivated, purchased,
 processed, sold, developed, researched, tested, or shipped.

813 B. Every licensed retail marijuana store shall keep complete, accurate, and separate records in
814 accordance with Board regulations of all purchases of marijuana products, the prices charged such licensee
815 therefor, and the names and addresses of the persons from whom purchased. Every licensed retail marijuana
816 store shall also preserve all invoices showing its purchases for a period as specified by Board regulations.
817 The licensee shall also keep an accurate account of daily sales, showing quantities of marijuana products

sold and the total price charged by it therefor. Except as otherwise provided in subsections C and D, such
account need not give the names or addresses of the purchasers thereof, except as may be required by Board
regulation.

Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection D, electronic records of licensed retail marijuana stores may be stored off site, provided that such records are readily retrievable and available for electronic inspection by the Board or its special agents at the licensed premises. However, in the case that such electronic records are not readily available for electronic inspection on the licensed premises, the licensee may obtain Board approval, for good cause shown, to permit the licensee to provide the records to a special agent of the Board within three business days or less, as determined by the Board, after a request is made to inspect the records.

828 *C. Every licensed marijuana testing facility shall keep records of the names and addresses of all licensees* 829 *or persons who submit marijuana or marijuana products to the marijuana testing facility.*

Box D. The Board and its special agents shall be allowed free access during reasonable hours to every place
in the Commonwealth and to the premises of every licensee or for the purpose of examining and inspecting
such place and all records, invoices, and accounts therein.

For the purposes of a Board inspection of the records of any retail marijuana store licensees, "reasonable hours" means the hours between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m.; however, if the licensee generally is not open to the public substantially during the same hours, "reasonable hours" means the business hours when the licensee is open to the public. At any other time of day, if the retail marijuana store licensee's records are not available for inspection, the licensee shall provide the records to a special agent of the Board within 24 hours after a request is made to inspect the records.

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# CHAPTER 8.

# ADMINISTRATION OF LICENSES; LICENSES GRANTED BY BOARD.

# § 4.1-800. Marijuana cultivation facility license.

A. The Board may issue any of the following marijuana cultivation facility licenses, which shall authorize
the licensee to cultivate, label, and package marijuana; to purchase or take possession of marijuana plants
and seeds from other marijuana cultivation facilities; to transfer possession of and sell marijuana, immature
marijuana plants, and marijuana seeds to retail marijuana stores; to transfer possession of and
sell marijuana plants, and marijuana seeds to marijuana transporters; to transfer possession of and
sell marijuana, marijuana plants, and marijuana seeds to other marijuana cultivation facilities; and to
transfer possession of and sell marijuana to marijuana processing facilities:

849 1. Tier I marijuana cultivation facility license, which shall authorize the licensee to cultivate marijuana
850 indoors or outdoors with a canopy that does not exceed 2,000 square feet.

851 2. Tier II marijuana cultivation facility license, which shall authorize the licensee to cultivate marijuana
852 indoors or outdoors with a canopy that does not exceed 10,000 square feet.

853 3. Tier III marijuana cultivation facility license, which shall authorize the licensee to cultivate marijuana
854 indoors with a canopy that does not exceed 25,000 square feet.

*4. Tier IV marijuana cultivation facility license, which shall authorize the licensee to cultivate marijuana*

856 indoors with a canopy that does not exceed 45,000 square feet.

857 5. Tier V marijuana cultivation facility license, which shall authorize the licensee to cultivate marijuana 858 indoors with a canopy that does not exceed 70,000 square feet.

859 The Board may (i) adjust the canopy of marijuana cultivation facilities within the square footage parameters set forth in this subsection if deemed appropriate by the Board in consideration of (a) market 860 861 demand, (b) utilization rates, (c) sales data, (d) product transfers, (e) inventory data, and (f) the volume of 862 license applications and issuances or (ii) increase the canopy of a marijuana cultivation facility beyond the square footage parameters set forth in this subsection if the Board determines that such increase will assist 863 864 or encourage participation by micro businesses in the industry.

865 B. In accordance with the requirements of § 4.1-611, a marijuana cultivation facility licensee shall track 866 the marijuana it cultivates from seed or immature marijuana plant to the point at which the marijuana plant 867 or the marijuana produced by the marijuana plant is delivered or transferred to a marijuana testing facility, 868 a marijuana transporter, another marijuana cultivation facility, a marijuana processor, or a retail marijuana 869 store or is disposed of or destroyed.

870 C. The cultivation of marijuana by a marijuana cultivation facility licensee in a secure agricultural 871 greenhouse shall be considered indoor cultivation and shall be permitted, provided that the secure 872 agricultural greenhouse is surrounded by a privacy fence that is no less than eight feet tall and is subject to 873 monitored ingress and egress.

874 D. All areas within the licensed premises of a marijuana cultivation facility in which marijuana is 875 cultivated, labeled, packaged, or stored shall meet all sanitary standards specified in regulations adopted by 876 the Board. 877

# § 4.1-801. Marijuana processing facility license.

878 A. The Board may issue marijuana processing facility licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to 879 process, label, and package marijuana and marijuana products; to purchase or take possession of marijuana 880 from a marijuana cultivation facility or another marijuana processing facility; to transfer possession of and 881 sell marijuana and marijuana products to retail marijuana stores or other marijuana processing facilities; 882 and to transfer possession of marijuana and marijuana products to marijuana transporters.

883 B. All areas within the licensed premises of a marijuana processing facility in which marijuana and **884** marijuana products are processed shall meet all sanitary standards specified in regulations adopted by the 885 Board. A marijuana processing facility that processes an edible marijuana product shall comply with the 886 requirements of Chapter 51 (§ 3.2-5100 et seq.) of Title 3.2 and any regulations adopted pursuant thereto.

887 C. In accordance with the requirements of 4.1-611, a marijuana processing facility licensee shall track 888 the marijuana it uses in its processing from the point the marijuana is delivered or transferred to the 889 marijuana processing facility by a marijuana transporter licensee to the point the marijuana or marijuana 890 products produced using the marijuana are delivered or transferred to another marijuana processing facility. 891 a marijuana testing facility, or a marijuana transporter or are disposed of or destroyed. 892

# § 4.1-802. Retail marijuana store license.

893 A. The Board may issue retail marijuana store licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to purchase or 894 take possession of marijuana, marijuana products, immature marijuana plants, or marijuana seeds from a 895 marijuana cultivation facility or marijuana processing facility; to take possession of marijuana, marijuana 896 products, immature marijuana plants, or marijuana seeds from a marijuana transporter; and to sell 897 marijuana, marijuana products, immature marijuana plants, or marijuana seeds to consumers on premises 898 approved by the Board. 899

B. Retail marijuana stores shall be operated in accordance with the following provisions:

1. A person shall be 21 years of age or older to make a purchase in a retail marijuana store.

901 2. A retail marijuana store shall be permitted to sell marijuana, marijuana products, immature marijuana 902 plants, or marijuana seeds to consumers only in a direct, face-to-face exchange. Such store shall not be 903 permitted to sell marijuana, marijuana products, immature marijuana plants, or marijuana seeds using: 904

a. An automated dispensing or vending machine;

905 b. A drive-through sales window:

906 c. An Internet-based sales platform; or

907 d. A delivery service.

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908 3. A retail marijuana store shall not be permitted to sell more than two and one-half ounces of marijuana 909 or an equivalent amount of marijuana products as determined by regulation promulgated by the Board 910 during a single transaction to one person.

911 4. A retail marijuana store shall not:

a. Give away any marijuana or marijuana products, except as otherwise permitted by this subtitle; or

913 b. Sell marijuana, marijuana products, immature marijuana plants, or marijuana seeds to any person 914 when at the time of such sale he knows or has reason to believe that the person attempting to purchase the

915 marijuana, marijuana product, immature marijuana plant, or marijuana seeds is intoxicated or is attempting 916 to purchase marijuana for someone younger than 21 years of age.

917 5. In accordance with the requirements of § 4.1-611, a retail marijuana store licensee shall track all

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918 marijuana, marijuana products, immature marijuana plants, or marijuana seeds from the point at which the 919 marijuana, marijuana products, immature marijuana plants, or marijuana seeds are delivered or transferred

920 to the retail marijuana store to the point at which the marijuana, marijuana products, immature marijuana

921 plants, or marijuana seeds are sold to a consumer, delivered or transferred to a marijuana testing facility, or 922 disposed of or destroyed.

923 6. A retail marijuana store shall not be subject to the requirements of Chapter 51 (§ 3.2-5100 et seq.) of 924 *Title 3.2.* 

925 C. Each retail marijuana store licensee shall post in each retail marijuana store notice of the existence of 926 a human trafficking hotline to alert possible witnesses or victims of human trafficking to the availability of a 927 means to report crimes or gain assistance. The notice required by this subsection shall (i) be posted in a 928 place readily visible and accessible to the public and (ii) meet the requirements specified in subsection C of \$929 40.1-11.3.

930 D. Each retail marijuana store licensee shall prominently display and make available for dissemination to 931 consumers Board-approved information regarding the potential risks of marijuana use.

E. Each retail marijuana store licensee shall provide training, established by the Board, to all employees 932 933 educating them on how to discuss the potential risks of marijuana use with consumers.

F. Any retail marijuana store license granted to a pharmaceutical processor that has been issued a permit 934 by the Board pursuant to Chapter 16 (§ 4.1-1600 et seq.) shall authorize the licensee to exercise any 935 privileges set forth in subsection A at the place of business designated in the license, which, notwithstanding 936 subsection A of § 4.1-702, may include, upon request by the licensee, up to five additional retail 937 establishments of the licensee. Such additional retail establishments shall be located at the five cannabis 938 939 dispensing facilities for which the Board has issued a permit pursuant to Chapter 16 (§ 4.1-1600 et seq.) in the health service area in which the pharmaceutical processing facility is located. 940

941 G. All areas within the licensed premises of a retail marijuana store in which marijuana, marijuana 942 products, immature marijuana plants, or marijuana seeds are sold or stored shall meet all sanitary standards 943 specified in regulations adopted by the Board.

# § 4.1-803. Marijuana transporter license.

945 A. The Board may issue marijuana transporter licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to take 946 possession of marijuana, marijuana products, immature marijuana plants, and marijuana seeds from a 947 marijuana cultivation facility, a marijuana processing facility, a retail marijuana store, or another marijuana 948 transporter; to transfer possession of marijuana, marijuana products, immature marijuana plants, and 949 marijuana seeds to a marijuana cultivation facility, marijuana processing facility, retail marijuana store, or another marijuana transporter; and to transport marijuana, marijuana products, immature marijuana plants, 950 951 and marijuana seeds from one licensed establishment to another.

952 B. All areas within the licensed premises of a marijuana transporter in which marijuana and marijuana 953 products are stored shall meet all sanitary standards specified in regulations adopted by the Board.

954 C. In accordance with the requirements of § 4.1-611, a marijuana transporter licensee shall track the 955 marijuana, marijuana products, immature marijuana plants, or marijuana seeds from the point at which the marijuana, marijuana products, plants, or seeds are delivered or transferred to the marijuana transporter to 956 957 the point at which the marijuana, marijuana products, plants, or seeds are transferred to a marijuana 958 processor, marijuana transporter, retail marijuana store, or marijuana testing facility or are disposed of or 959 destroved. 960

#### § 4.1-804. Marijuana testing facility license.

961 A. The Board may issue marijuana testing facility licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to develop, 962 research, or test marijuana, marijuana products, and other substances.

- 963 B. A marijuana testing facility may develop, research, or test marijuana and marijuana products for (i)that facility, (ii) another licensee, or (iii) a person who intends to use the marijuana or marijuana product for 964 965 personal use as authorized under § 4.1-1100.
- C. Neither this subtitle nor the regulations adopted pursuant to this subtitle shall prevent a marijuana 966 967 testing facility from developing, researching, or testing substances that are not marijuana or marijuana 968 products for that facility or for another person.
- 969 D. To obtain licensure from the Board, a marijuana testing facility shall be required to obtain and 970 maintain accreditation pursuant to standard ISO/IEC 17025 of the International Organization for 971 Standardization by a third-party accrediting body.
- 972 E. In accordance with the requirements of § 4.1-611, a marijuana testing facility licensee shall track all 973 marijuana and marijuana products it receives from a licensee for testing purposes from the point at which the 974 marijuana or marijuana products are delivered or transferred to the marijuana testing facility to the point at 975 which the marijuana or marijuana products are disposed of or destroyed.
- 976 F. A person that has an interest in a marijuana testing facility license shall not have any interest in a 977 licensed marijuana cultivation facility, a licensed marijuana processing facility, a licensed marijuana 978 transporter, or a licensed retail marijuana store.

979 G. All areas within the licensed premises of a marijuana testing facility in which marijuana or marijuana

980 products are tested or stored shall meet all sanitary standards specified in regulations adopted by the Board. 981 § 4.1-805. Multiple licenses awarded to one person; limitations.

A. As used in this section, "interest" means an equity ownership interest or a partial equity ownership 982 983 interest or any other type of financial interest, including being an investor or serving in a management position. 984

985 B. A person may possess or hold interest in one or any combination of the following licenses pursuant to **986** Board regulations: tier I marijuana cultivation facility license, tier II marijuana cultivation facility license, 987 tier III marijuana cultivation facility license, tier IV marijuana cultivation facility license, tier V marijuana **988** cultivation facility license, marijuana processing facility license, marijuana transporter license, or retail 989 marijuana store license. Board regulations shall be drawn to ensure that all licensees have an equal and 990 meaningful opportunity to participate in the market. Moreover, (i) no person shall be granted or hold interest 991 in more than five total licenses, not including marijuana transporter licenses, issued pursuant to this subtitle 992 or more than one tier V marijuana cultivation facility license and (ii) no person that has been granted or 993 holds interest in a marijuana cultivation facility license, marijuana processing facility license, marijuana 994 transporter license, or retail marijuana store license shall be issued or hold interest in a marijuana testing 995 facility license. 996

#### § 4.1-806. Temporary permits required in certain instances.

997 A. The Board may grant a permit that shall authorize any person who purchases at a foreclosure, secured 998 creditor's, or judicial auction sale the premises or property of a person licensed by the Board and who has 999 become lawfully entitled to the possession of the licensed premises to continue to operate the marijuana 1000 establishment to the same extent as the license holder for a period not to exceed 60 days or for such longer 1001 period as determined by the Board. Such permit shall be temporary and shall confer the privileges of any 1002 licenses held by the previous owner to the extent determined by the Board. Such temporary permit may be 1003 issued in advance, conditioned on the requirements in this subsection.

1004 B. A temporary permit granted pursuant to subsection A may be revoked summarily by the Board for any 1005 cause set forth in § 4.1-900 without complying with subsection A of § 4.1-903. Revocation of a temporary 1006 permit shall be effective upon service of the order of revocation upon the permittee or upon the expiration of 1007 three business days after the order of the revocation has been mailed to the permittee at either his residence 1008 or the address given for the business in the permit application. No further notice shall be required.

1009 § 4.1-807. Licensee shall maintain possession of premises.

1010 As a condition of licensure, a licensee shall at all times maintain possession of the licensed premises of 1011 the marijuana establishment that the licensee is licensed to operate, whether pursuant to a lease, rental 1012 agreement, or other arrangement for possession of the premises or by virtue of ownership of the premises. If 1013 the licensee fails to maintain possession of the licensed premises, the license shall be revoked by the Board. 1014

# § 4.1-808. Conditions under which the Board shall or may refuse to grant licenses.

1015 A. The Board may refuse to grant any license if it has reasonable cause to believe that the granting of the license would be detrimental to the interest, morals, safety, or welfare of the public or would be inconsistent 1016 1017 with the provisions of this subtitle.

1018 B. The Board shall refuse to grant any license if it has reasonable cause to believe that:

1019 1. The applicant, or if the applicant is a partnership, any general partner thereof, or if the applicant is an 1020 association, any member thereof, or a limited partner of 10 percent or more with voting rights, or if the 1021 applicant is a corporation, any officer, director, or shareholder owning 10 percent or more of its capital 1022 stock, or if the applicant is a limited liability company, any member-manager or any member owning 10 1023 percent or more of the membership interest of the limited liability company:

1024 a. Is not 21 years of age or older;

1025 b. Has been convicted in any court of a felony or any crime or offense involving moral turpitude under the 1026 laws of any state or of the United States within seven years of the date of the application or has not completed 1027 all terms of sentencing and probation resulting from any such conviction;

c. Knowingly employs or allows to volunteer someone younger than 21 years of age; 1028

1029 d. Is not the legitimate owner of the business proposed to be licensed, or other persons have ownership 1030 interests in the business that have not been disclosed;

1031 e. Has not demonstrated financial responsibility sufficient to meet the requirements of the business 1032 proposed to be licensed;

1033 f. Has misrepresented a material fact in applying to the Board for a license;

1034 g. Has defrauded or attempted to defraud the Board, or any federal, state, or local government or governmental agency or authority, by making or filing any report, document, or tax return required by statute 1035 1036 or regulation that is fraudulent or contains a false representation of a material fact; or has willfully deceived 1037 or attempted to deceive the Board, or any federal, state, or local government or governmental agency or 1038 authority, by making or maintaining business records required by statute or regulation that are false or 1039 fraudulent;

1040 h. Is violating or allowing the violation of any provision of this subtitle in his establishment at the time his

1041 application for a license is pending;

1042 i. Is a full-time or part-time employee of the Department of State Police or of a police department or sheriff's office that is a part of or administered by the Commonwealth or any political subdivision thereof, 1043

1044 and who is responsible for the enforcement of the penal, traffic, or motor vehicle laws of the Commonwealth; j. Has been sanctioned by the Board pursuant to § 54.1-3316 and regulations promulgated by the Board 1045 for a violation pursuant to Chapter 16 (§ 4.1-1600 et seq.); or 1046

k. Is physically unable to carry on the business for which the application for a license is filed or has been 1047 1048 adjudicated incapacitated.

2. The applicant is a member or employee of the Board or is a corporation or other business entity in 1049 1050 which a member or employee of the Board is a stockholder or has any other economic interest. Whenever any other elected or appointed official of the Commonwealth or any political subdivision thereof applies for such 1051 a license or continuance thereof, he shall state on the application the official position he holds, and whenever 1052 a corporation or other business entity in which any such official is a stockholder or has any other economic 1053 1054 interest applies for such a license, it shall state on the application the full economic interests of each such 1055 official in such corporation or other business entity.

1056 *3. The place to be occupied by the applicant:* 

a. Does not conform to the requirements of the governing body of the county, city, or town in which such 1057 1058 place is located with respect to sanitation, health, construction, or equipment, or to any similar requirements established by the laws of the Commonwealth or by Board regulation; 1059

b. Is so located that granting a license and operation thereunder by the applicant would result in 1060 violations of this subtitle or Board regulations or violation of the laws of the Commonwealth or local 1061 1062 ordinances relating to peace and good order;

c. When the applicant is applying for a retail marijuana store license, is so located with respect to any 1063 place of religious worship; hospital; public, private, or parochial school or institution of higher education; 1064 public or private playground or other similar recreational facility; child day program; substance use 1065 disorder treatment facility; or federal, state, or local government-operated facility that the operation of such 1066 place under such license will adversely affect or interfere with the normal, orderly conduct of the affairs of 1067 1068 such facilities, programs, or institutions;

1069 d. When the applicant is applying for a retail marijuana store license, is so located with respect to any 1070 residence or residential area that the operation of such place under such license will adversely affect real property values or substantially interfere with the usual quietude and tranquility of such residence or 1071 1072 residential area;

e. When the applicant is applying for a retail marijuana store license, is located within 1,000 feet of an 1073 1074 existing retail marijuana store;

f. When the applicant is applying for a retail marijuana store license, is so constructed, arranged, or 1075 1076 illuminated that law-enforcement officers and special agents of the Board are prevented from ready access to 1077 and reasonable observation of any room or area within which marijuana or marijuana products are to be 1078 sold; or

g. Is an establishment where alcoholic beverages, tobacco, or tobacco products are manufactured, sold, 1079 1080 or used.

Nothing in this subdivision 3 shall be construed to require an applicant to have secured a place or 1081 1082 premises until the final stage of the license approval process.

1083 4. The number of licenses existing in the locality is such that the granting of a license is detrimental to the 1084 interest, morals, safety, or welfare of the public. In reaching such conclusion, the Board shall consider (i) the 1085 criteria established by the Board to evaluate new licensees based on the density of retail marijuana stores in 1086 the community; (ii) the character of, population of, number of similar licenses in, and number of all licenses existent in the particular county, city, or town and the immediate neighborhood concerned; (iii) the effect that 1087 1088 a new license may have on such county, city, town, or neighborhood in conforming with the purposes of this subtitle; and (iv) the objections, if any, that may have been filed by a local governing body or local residents. 1089

1090 5. There exists any law, ordinance, or regulation of the United States, the Commonwealth, or any political 1091 subdivision thereof that warrants refusal by the Board to grant any license.

1092 6. The Board is not authorized under this subtitle to grant such license. 1093

§ 4.1-809. Notice and hearings for refusal to grant licenses; Administrative Process Act; exceptions.

1094 A. The action of the Board in granting or in refusing to grant any license shall be subject to judicial 1095 review in accordance with the Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.), except as provided in subsection B or C. Such review shall extend to the entire evidential record of the proceedings provided by the 1096 Board in accordance with the Administrative Process Act. An appeal shall lie to the Court of Appeals from 1097 1098 any order of the court. Notwithstanding § 8.01-676.1, the final judgment or order of the circuit court shall 1099 not be suspended, stayed, or modified by such circuit court pending appeal to the Court of Appeals. Neither 1100 mandamus nor injunction shall lie in any such case.

1101 B. The Board may refuse a hearing on any application for the granting of any retail marijuana store

**1102** *license, provided that such:* 

1103 *I. License for the applicant has been refused or revoked within a period of 12 months;* 

**1104** *2. License for any premises has been refused or revoked at that location within a period of 12 months; or* 

**1105** *3.* Applicant, within a period of 12 months immediately preceding, has permitted a license granted by the

Board to expire for nonpayment of license fee, and at the time of expiration of such license, there was a
pending and unadjudicated charge, either before the Board or in any court, against the licensee alleging a
violation of this subtitle.

1109 C. If an applicant has permitted a license to expire for nonpayment of license fee, and at the time of
1110 expiration there remained unexecuted any period of suspension imposed upon the licensee by the Board, the
1111 Board may refuse a hearing on an application for a new license until after the date on which the suspension
1112 period would have been executed had the license not been permitted to expire.

## § 4.1-900. Grounds for which Board may suspend or revoke licenses.

1118 association, any member thereof, or a limited partner of 10 percent or more with voting rights, or if the

1120 or if the licensee is a limited liability company, any member-manager or any member owning 10 percent or
1121 more of the membership interest of the limited liability company:

a. Has misrepresented a material fact in applying to the Board for such license;

b. Within the five years immediately preceding the date of the hearing held in accordance with § 4.1-903,

has (i) violated any provision of Chapter 11 (§ 4.1-1100 et seq.), Chapter 12 (§ 4.1-1200 et seq.), or Chapter
13 (§ 4.1-1300 et seq.); (ii) committed a violation of this subtitle in bad faith; (iii) violated or failed or

1126 refused to comply with any regulation, rule, or order of the Board; or (iv) failed or refused to comply with 1127 any of the conditions or restrictions of the license granted by the Board;

1128 *c.* Has been convicted in any court of a felony or of any crime or offense involving moral turpitude under 1129 the laws of any state or of the United States;

d. Is not the legitimate owner of the business conducted under the license granted by the Board, or other
 persons have ownership interests in the business that have not been disclosed;

e. Cannot demonstrate financial responsibility sufficient to meet the requirements of the businessconducted under the license granted by the Board;

1134 *f. Has been intoxicated or under the influence of some self-administered drug while upon the licensed* 1135 *premises;* 

**1136** g. Has maintained the licensed premises in an unsanitary condition, or allowed such premises to become **1137** a meeting place or rendezvous for members of a criminal street gang as defined in § 18.2-46.1 or persons of

1138 ill repute, or has allowed any form of illegal gambling to take place upon such premises;
1139 h. Has allowed any person whom he knew or had reason to believe was intoxicated to loiter upon such

**1140** *licensed premises;* 

i. Has allowed any person to consume upon the licensed premises any marijuana or marijuana product
 except as provided under this subtitle;

*j. Is physically unable to carry on the business conducted under such license or has been adjudicated incapacitated;* 

*k. Has possessed any illegal gambling apparatus, machine, or device upon the licensed premises;* 

1146 *l.* Has upon the licensed premises (i) illegally possessed, distributed, sold, or used, or has knowingly
1147 allowed any employee or agent, or any other person, to illegally possess, distribute, sell, or use, controlled
1148 substances, imitation controlled substances, drug paraphernalia, or controlled paraphernalia as those terms

1149 are defined in Articles 1 (§ 18.2-247 et seq.) and 1.1 (§ 18.2-265.1 et seq.) of Chapter 7 of Title 18.2 and the

**1150** Drug Control Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.); (ii) laundered money in violation of § 18.2-246.3; or (iii) conspired

**1151** to commit any drug-related offense in violation of Article 1 or 1.1 of Chapter 7 of Title 18.2 or the Drug **1152** Control Act. The provisions of this subdivision l shall also apply to any conduct related to the operation of

**1153** the licensed business that facilitates the commission of any of the offenses set forth herein;

1154 m. Has failed to take reasonable measures to prevent (i) the licensed premises, (ii) any premises immediately adjacent to the licensed premises that is owned or leased by the licensee, or (iii) any portion of 1155 public property immediately adjacent to the licensed premises from becoming a place where patrons of the 1156 establishment commit criminal violations of Article 1 (§ 18.2-30 et seq.), 2 (§ 18.2-38 et seq.), 2.1 (§ 1157 1158 18.2-46.1 et seq.), 2.2 (§ 18.2-46.4 et seq.), 3 (§ 18.2-47 et seq.), 4 (§ 18.2-51 et seq.), 5 (§ 18.2-58 et seq.), 6 1159 (§ 18.2-59 et seq.), or 7 (§ 18.2-61 et seq.) of Chapter 4 of Title 18.2; Article 2 (§ 18.2-266 et seq.) of 1160 Chapter 7 of Title 18.2; Article 3 (§ 18.2-346 et seq.) or 5 (§ 18.2-372 et seq.) of Chapter 8 of Title 18.2; or 1161 Article 1 (§ 18.2-404 et seq.), 2 (§ 18.2-415), or 3 (§ 18.2-416 et seq.) of Chapter 9 of Title 18.2 and such

**1162** *violations lead to arrests that are so frequent and serious as to reasonably be deemed a continuing threat to*

n. Has failed to take reasonable measures to prevent an act of violence resulting in death or serious
bodily injury, or a recurrence of such acts, from occurring on (i) the licensed premises, (ii) any premises
immediately adjacent to the licensed premises that is owned or leased by the licensee, or (iii) any portion of

**1167** *public property immediately adjacent to the licensed premises; or* 

**1168** o. Has been sanctioned by the Board pursuant to § 54.1-3316 and regulations promulgated by the Board **1169** for a violation pursuant to Chapter 16 (§ 4.1-1600 et seq.).

**1170** *2. The place occupied by the licensee:* 

a. Does not conform to the requirements of the governing body of the county, city, or town in which such
establishment is located, with respect to sanitation, health, construction, or equipment, or to any similar
requirements established by the laws of the Commonwealth or by Board regulations;

1174 b. Has been adjudicated a common nuisance under the provisions of this subtitle or § 18.2-258; or

c. Has become a meeting place or rendezvous for illegal gambling, illegal users of narcotics, drunks,
prostitutes, pimps, panderers, or habitual law violators or has become a place where illegal drugs are
regularly used or distributed. The Board may consider the general reputation in the community of such
establishment in addition to any other competent evidence in making such determination.

1179 3. The licensee or any employee of the licensee discriminated against any member of the Armed Forces of1180 the United States by prices charged or otherwise.

**1181** *4.* Any cause exists for which the Board would have been entitled to refuse to grant such license had the facts been known.

5. The licensee is delinquent for a period of 90 days or more in the payment of any taxes, or any penalties or interest related thereto, lawfully imposed by the locality where the licensed business is located, as certified by the treasurer, commissioner of the revenue, or finance director of such locality, unless (i) the outstanding amount is de minimis; (ii) the licensee has pending a bona fide application for correction or appeal with respect to such taxes, penalties, or interest; or (iii) the licensee has entered into a payment plan approved by the same locality to settle the outstanding liability.

6. The licensee has been convicted for a violation of 8 U.S.C. § 1324a(f), as amended, for actions of its agents or employees constituting a pattern or practice of employing unauthorized aliens on the licensed premises in the Commonwealth.

**1192** *7. Any other cause authorized by this subtitle.* 

**1193** *B. The Board shall promulgate regulations regarding suspension and revocation standards and protocols.* 

1194 § 4.1-901. Summary suspension in emergency circumstances; grounds; notice and hearing.

A. Notwithstanding any provisions to the contrary in Article 3 (§ 2.2-4018 et seq.) of the Administrative Process Act or § 4.1-806 or 4.1-903, the Board may summarily suspend any license or permit if it has reasonable cause to believe that an act of violence resulting in death or serious bodily injury, or a recurrence of such acts, has occurred on (i) the licensed premises, (ii) any premises immediately adjacent to the licensed premises that is owned or leased by the licensee, or (iii) any portion of public property immediately adjacent to the licensed premises, and the Board finds that there exists a continuing threat to public safety and that summary suspension of the license or permit is justified to protect the health, safety, or welfare of the public.

1202 B. Prior to issuing an order of suspension pursuant to this section, special agents of the Board shall conduct an initial investigation and submit all findings to the Secretary of the Board within 48 hours of any 1203 1204 such act of violence. If the Board determines suspension is warranted, it shall immediately notify the licensee 1205 of its intention to temporarily suspend his license pending the outcome of a formal investigation. Such 1206 temporary suspension shall remain effective for a minimum of 48 hours. After the 48-hour period, the 1207 licensee may petition the Board for a restricted license pending the results of the formal investigation and 1208 proceedings for disciplinary review. If the Board determines that a restricted license is warranted, the Board 1209 shall have discretion to impose appropriate restrictions based on the facts presented.

1210 C. Upon a determination to temporarily suspend a license, the Board shall immediately commence a formal investigation. The formal investigation shall be completed within 10 days of its commencement and 1211 the findings reported immediately to the Secretary of the Board. If, following the formal investigation, the 1212 Secretary of the Board determines that suspension of the license is warranted, a hearing shall be held within 1213 1214 five days of the completion of the formal investigation. A decision shall be rendered within 10 days of the conclusion of the hearing. If a decision is not rendered within 10 days of the conclusion of the hearing, the 1215 1216 order of suspension shall be vacated and the license reinstated. Any appeal by the licensee shall be filed within 10 days of the decision and heard by the Board within 20 days of the decision. The Board shall render 1217 1218 a decision on the appeal within 10 days of the conclusion of the appeal hearing.

1219 D. Service of any order of suspension issued pursuant to this section shall be made by a special agent of 1220 the Board in person and by certified mail to the licensee. The order of suspension shall take effect 1221 immediately upon service.

*E. This section shall not apply to temporary permits granted under § 4.1-806.* 

1223 § 4.1-902. Grounds for which Board shall suspend or revoke licenses.

**1224** The Board shall suspend or revoke any license if it finds that:

1229 statute or regulation that is fraudulent or contains a willful or knowing false representation of a material fact
1230 or has willfully deceived or attempted to deceive the Board, or any federal, state, or local government or
1231 governmental agency or authority, by making or maintaining business records required by statute or
1232 regulation that are false or fraudulent.

1233 § 4.1-903. Suspension or revocation of licenses; notice and hearings; imposition of civil penalties.

A. Before the Board may suspend or revoke any license, reasonable notice of such proposed or
contemplated action shall be given to the licensee in accordance with the provisions of § 2.2-4020 of the
Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.).

1237 Notwithstanding the provisions of § 2.2-4022, the Board shall, upon written request by the licensee, 1238 permit the licensee to inspect and copy or photograph all (i) written or recorded statements made by the 1239 licensee or copies thereof or the substance of any oral statements made by the licensee or a previous or 1240 present employee of the licensee to any law-enforcement officer, the existence of which is known by the Board 1241 and upon which the Board intends to rely as evidence in any adversarial proceeding under this subtitle 1242 against the licensee, and (ii) designated books, papers, documents, tangible objects, buildings, or places, or 1243 copies or portions thereof, that are within the possession, custody, or control of the Board and upon which 1244 the Board intends to rely as evidence in any adversarial proceeding under this subtitle against the licensee. 1245 In addition, any subpoend for the production of documents issued to any person at the request of the licensee or the Board pursuant to § 4.1-604 shall provide for the production of the documents sought within 10 1246 1247 working days, notwithstanding anything to the contrary in § 4.1-604.

1248 If the Board fails to provide for inspection or copying under this section for the licensee after a written
1249 request, the Board shall be prohibited from introducing into evidence any items the licensee would have
1250 lawfully been entitled to inspect or copy under this section.

1251The action of the Board in suspending or revoking any license or in imposing a civil penalty shall be1252subject to judicial review in accordance with the Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.). Such review1253shall extend to the entire evidential record of the proceedings provided by the Board in accordance with the1254Administrative Process Act. An appeal shall lie to the Court of Appeals from any order of the court.1255Notwithstanding § 8.01-676.1, the final judgment or order of the circuit court shall not be suspended, stayed,1256or modified by such circuit court pending appeal to the Court of Appeals. Neither mandamus nor injunction1257shall lie in any such case.

1258 B. In suspending any license, the Board may impose, as a condition precedent to the removal of such 1259 suspension or any portion thereof, a requirement that the licensee pay the cost incurred by the Board in 1260 investigating the licensee and in holding the proceeding resulting in such suspension, or it may impose and 1261 collect such civil penalties as it deems appropriate. In no event shall the Board impose a civil penalty 1262 exceeding \$2,000 for the first violation occurring within five years immediately preceding the date of the 1263 violation or \$5,000 for the second or subsequent violation occurring within five years immediately preceding 1264 the date of the second or subsequent violation. However, if the violation involved selling marijuana or 1265 marijuana products to a person prohibited from purchasing marijuana or marijuana products or allowing 1266 consumption of marijuana or marijuana products, the Board may impose a civil penalty not to exceed \$3,000 1267 for the first violation occurring within five years immediately preceding the date of the violation and \$6,000 1268 for a second or subsequent violation occurring within five years immediately preceding the date of the second 1269 or subsequent violation in lieu of such suspension or any portion thereof, or both. The Board may also 1270 impose a requirement that the licensee pay for the cost incurred by the Board not exceeding \$25,000 in 1271 investigating the licensee and in holding the proceeding resulting in the violation in addition to any

1272 suspension or civil penalty incurred.

1273 C. Following notice to (i) the licensee of a hearing that may result in the suspension or revocation of his 1274 license or (ii) the applicant of a hearing to resolve a contested application, the Board may accept a consent 1275 agreement as authorized in § 4.1-604. The notice shall advise the licensee or applicant of the option to (a)1276 admit the alleged violation or the validity of the objection; (b) waive any right to a hearing or an appeal 1277 under the Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.); and (c) (1) accept the proposed restrictions for 1278 operating under the license, (2) accept the period of suspension of the licensed privileges within the Board's 1279 parameters, (3) pay a civil penalty in lieu of the period of suspension, or any portion of the suspension as 1280 applicable, or (4) proceed to a hearing.

**1281** *D. The Board shall, by regulation or written order:* 

1282 1. Designate those (i) objections to an application or (ii) alleged violations that will proceed to an initial
 1283 hearing;

1284
 2. Designate the violations for which a waiver of a hearing and payment of a civil charge in lieu of
 1285 suspension may be accepted for a first offense occurring within three years immediately preceding the date of

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1314

1286 the violation;

1287 3. Provide for a reduction in the length of any suspension and a reduction in the amount of any civil 1288 penalty for any retail marijuana store licensee where the licensee can demonstrate that it provided to its 1289 employees marijuana seller training certified in advance by the Board;

1290 4. Establish a schedule of penalties for such offenses, prescribing the appropriate suspension of a license 1291 and the civil charge acceptable in lieu of such suspension; and

5. Establish a schedule of offenses for which any penalty may be waived upon a showing that the licensee 1292 1293 has had no prior violations within five years immediately preceding the date of the violation. No waiver shall be granted by the Board, however, for a licensee's willful and knowing violation of this subtitle or Board 1294 1295 regulations.

1296 § 4.1-904. Suspension or revocation; disposition of marijuana or marijuana products on hand; 1297 termination.

1298 A. Marijuana or marijuana products owned by or in the possession of or for sale by any licensee at the 1299 time the license of such person is suspended or revoked may be disposed of as follows:

1300 1. Sold to persons in the Commonwealth licensed to sell such marijuana or marijuana products upon 1301 permits granted by the Board in accordance with § 4.1-806 and conditions specified by the Board; or

1302 2. Destroyed by the Board or its designee.

1303 B. All marijuana or marijuana products owned by or in the possession of any person whose license is suspended or revoked shall be disposed of by such person in accordance with the provisions of this section 1304 1305 within 60 days from the date of such suspension or revocation.

C. Marijuana or marijuana products owned by or in the possession of or for sale by persons whose 1306 1307 licenses have been terminated other than by suspension or revocation may be disposed of in accordance with 1308 subsection A within such time as the Board deems proper. Such period shall not be less than 60 days.

D. All marijuana or marijuana products owned by or remaining in the possession of any person described 1309 in subsection A or C after the expiration of such period shall be deemed contraband and forfeited to the 1310 Commonwealth in accordance with the provisions of  $\S 4.1-1303$ . 1311 CHĂPTER 10. 1312

ADMINISTRATION OF LICENSES; APPLICATIONS FOR LICENSES; FEES; TAXES.

§ 4.1-1000. Applications for licenses; publication; notice to localities; fees; permits.

1315 A. Every person intending to apply for any license authorized by this subtitle shall file with the Board an application on forms provided by the Board and a statement in writing by the applicant swearing and 1316 1317 affirming that all of the information contained therein is true.

B. Such applications, including applications for renewal, shall include any information necessary for the 1318 1319 Board to determine whether the applicant meets or continues to meet the criteria set forth in subdivision B 13 1320 of § 4.1-606.

1321 C. Applicants for licenses for establishments that are otherwise required to obtain an inspection by the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services shall provide proof of inspection or proof of a pending 1322 request for such inspection. If the applicant provides proof of inspection or proof of a pending request for an 1323 inspection, a license may be issued to the applicant. If a license is issued on the basis of a pending 1324 1325 application or inspection, such license shall authorize the licensee to purchase marijuana, marijuana products, immature marijuana plants, or marijuana seeds in accordance with the provisions of this subtitle; 1326 1327 however, the licensee shall not sell marijuana, marijuana products, immature marijuana plants, or marijuana 1328 seeds until an inspection is completed.

1329 D. Each applicant for a license under the provisions of this subtitle shall post a notice of his application 1330 with the Board on the front door of the building, place, or room where he proposes to engage in such 1331 business for no more than 30 days and not less than 10 days. Such notice shall be of a size and contain such information as required by the Board, including a statement that any objections shall be submitted to the 1332 1333 Board not more than 30 days following initial posting of the notice required pursuant to this subsection.

1334 The applicant shall also cause notice to be published at least once a week for two consecutive weeks in a newspaper published in or having a general circulation in the county, city, or town wherein such applicant 1335 proposes to engage in such business. Such notice shall contain such information as required by the Board, 1336 1337 including a statement that any objections to the issuance of the license be submitted to the Board not later than 30 days from the date of the initial newspaper publication. 1338

1339 E. The Board shall conduct a background investigation on each license applicant, which shall include a criminal history records search and may include a fingerprint-based national criminal history records search 1340 and a requirement for the provision of personal descriptive information to be forwarded through the Central 1341 Criminal Records Exchange to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for the purpose of obtaining criminal 1342 1343 history record information regarding such applicant. The Central Criminal Records Exchange shall forward 1344 the results of the criminal history background check to the Board or its designee, which shall be a 1345 governmental entity.

1346 However, the Board may waive, for good cause shown, the requirement for a criminal history records

search and completed personal data form for officers, directors, nonmanaging members, or limited partners
of any applicant corporation, limited liability company, or limited partnership. In considering criminal
history record information, the Board shall not disqualify an applicant because of a past conviction for a
marijuana-related offense.

F. The Board shall notify the local governing body of each license application through the town manager,
city manager, county administrator, or other designee of the locality. Local governing bodies shall submit
objections to the granting of a license within 30 days of the filing of the application.

G. Each applicant shall pay the required application fee at the time the application is filed. The license application fee shall be determined by the Board and shall be in addition to the actual cost charged to the Department of State Police by the Federal Bureau of Investigation or the Central Criminal Records Exchange for processing any fingerprints through the Federal Bureau of Investigation or the Central Criminal Records Exchange for each criminal history records search required by the Board. Application fees shall be in addition to the state license fee required pursuant to § 4.1-1001 and shall not be refunded.

H. Subsection A shall not apply to the continuance of licenses granted under this subtitle; however, all
licensees shall file and maintain with the Board a current, accurate record of the information required by the
Board pursuant to subsection A and notify the Board of any changes to such information in accordance with
Board regulations.

1364 I. Every application for a permit granted pursuant to § 4.1-806 shall be on a form provided by the Board.
1365 Such permits shall confer upon their holders no authority to make solicitations in the Commonwealth as
1366 otherwise provided by law.

1367 The fee for a temporary permit shall be one-twelfth of the combined fees required by this section for
1368 applicable licenses to sell marijuana or marijuana products computed to the nearest cent and multiplied by
1369 the number of months for which the permit is granted.

1370 J. The Board shall have the authority to increase state license fees. The Board shall set the amount of 1371 such increases on the basis of the consumer price index and shall not increase fees more than once every 1372 three years. Prior to implementing any state license fee increase, the Board shall provide notice to all 1373 licensees and the general public of (i) the Board's intent to impose a fee increase and (ii) the new fee that 1374 would be required for any license affected by the Board's proposed fee increases. Such notice shall be 1375 provided on or before November 1 in any year in which the Board has decided to increase state license fees, 1376 and such increases shall become effective July 1 of the following year.

## 1377 § 4.1-1001. Fees for state licenses.

A. Annual fees on state licenses shall be established by the Board in an amount sufficient to cover thecosts of regulating the marijuana establishment.

B. The fee on each license granted or reissued for a period other than 12, 24, or 36 months shall be equal
to one-twelfth of the fees required by subsection A computed to the nearest cent, multiplied by the number of
months in the license period, and then increased by five percent. Such fee shall not be refundable, except as
provided in § 4.1-1002.

1384 C. Nothing in this subtitle shall exempt any licensee from any state merchants' license or state restaurant
1385 license or any other state tax. Every licensee, in addition to the taxes and fees imposed by this subtitle, shall
1386 be liable to state merchants' license taxation, state restaurant license taxation, and other state taxation.

1387 D. In addition to the fees set forth in this section, a fee of \$5 may be imposed on any license purchased in
 1388 person from the Board if such license is available for purchase online.

# 1389 § 4.1-1002. Refund of state license fee.

A. The Board may (i) correct erroneous assessments made by it against any person, (ii) refund any amounts collected through erroneous assessments or collected as fees on licenses applications that are subsequently refused or withdrawn, and (iii) allow credit for any license fees paid for any license that is subsequently merged or changed into another license during the same license period. No refund shall be made of any such amount, however, unless made within three years from the date of collection of the same.

B. In any case where a licensee has changed its name or form of organization during a license period without any change being made in its ownership, and because of such change is required to pay an additional license fee for such period, the Board shall refund to such licensee the amount of such fee so paid in excess of the required license fee for such period.

1399 C. The Board shall make refunds, prorated according to a schedule of its prescription, to licensees of
1400 state license fees paid pursuant to subsection A of § 4.1-1001 if the place of business designated in the license
1401 is destroyed by an act of God, including a fire, earthquake, hurricane, storm, or similar natural disaster or
1402 phenomenon.

**1403** *D.* Any amount required to be refunded under this section shall be paid by the State Treasurer out of moneys appropriated to the Board and in the manner prescribed in § 4.1-614.

# 1405 § 4.1-1003. Marijuana taxes; exceptions.

A. A tax of eight percent is levied on the sale in the Commonwealth of any marijuana, marijuana
 products, or marijuana paraphernalia. Subject to the provisions of subsection C, the tax shall be in addition

1408 to any tax imposed under the Virginia Retail Sales and Use Tax Act (§ 58.1-600 et seq.) or any other 1409 provision of federal, state, or local law. The tax shall not apply to any sale:

1410 1. From a marijuana establishment to another marijuana establishment.

1411 2. Of cannabis products for treatment under the provisions of Chapter 16 (§ 4.1-1600 et seq.).

3. Of industrial hemp by a grower, processor, or handler under the provisions of Chapter 41.1 (§ 1412 1413 3.2-4112 et seq.) of Title 3.2.

1414 4. Of a hemp product.

B. Any locality may by ordinance levy a 2.5 percent tax on any sale taxable under subsection A. Subject to 1415 1416 subsection C, the tax shall be in addition to any local sales tax imposed under the Virginia Retail Sales and Use Tax Act (§ 58.1-600 et seq.), any food and beverage tax imposed under Article 7.1 (§ 58.1-3833 et seq.) 1417 of Chapter 38 of Title 58.1, and any excise tax imposed on meals under § 58.1-3840. Other than the taxes 1418 1419 authorized and identified in this subsection, a locality shall not impose any other tax on a sale taxable under 1420 subsection A. Nothing in this subsection shall be construed to (i) prohibit a locality from imposing any tax authorized by law on a person or property regulated under this subtitle or (ii) limit the authority of any 1421 1422 locality to impose a license or privilege tax or fee on a business engaged in whole or in part in sales taxable 1423 under subsection A if such tax or fee is (a) based on an annual or per-event flat fee authorized by law or (b) 1424 an annual license or privilege tax authorized by law and such tax includes sales or receipts taxable under 1425 subsection A in its taxable measure.

1426 If a locality imposes a tax under this subsection, such tax shall be irrevocable. If a town imposes a tax 1427 under this subsection, any tax imposed by its surrounding county under this subsection shall not apply within 1428 the limits of the town.

1429 Any locality that enacts an ordinance pursuant to this subsection shall, within 30 days, notify the Authority and any retail marijuana store in such locality of the ordinance's enactment. The ordinance shall 1430 1431 take effect on the first day of the second month following its enactment.

C. Any tax imposed under the Virginia Retail Sales and Use Tax Act (§ 58.1-600 et seq.) on a sale taxable 1432 1433 under subsection A shall be limited to a 1.125 percent tax, which shall be distributed as follows: (i) the revenue from the tax at the rate of one percent shall be distributed as provided in subsections B, C, and D of 1434 1435 § 58.1-638 and (ii) the revenue from the tax at the rate of 0.125 percent shall be distributed as provided in 1436 subdivision F 2 of § 58.1-638. No other tax shall be levied pursuant to the Virginia Retail Sales and Use Tax 1437 Act (§ 58.1-600 et seq.) on a sale taxable under subsection A.

1438 D. All revenues remitted to the Authority under this subsection shall be disposed of as provided in § 1439 4.1-614. 1440

# § 4.1-1004. Tax returns and payments; commissions; interest.

A. For any sale taxable under § 4.1-1003, the seller shall be liable for collecting any taxes due. All taxes 1441 collected by a seller shall be deemed to be held in trust for the Commonwealth. The buyer shall not be liable 1442 1443 for collecting or remitting the taxes or filing a return.

1444 B. On or before the tenth day of each month, any person liable for a tax due under § 4.1-1003 shall file a return under oath with the Authority and pay any taxes due. Upon written application by a person filing a 1445 1446 return, the Authority may, if it determines good cause exists, grant an extension to the end of the calendar 1447 month in which the tax is due, or for a period not exceeding 30 days. Any extension shall toll the accrual of any interest or penalties under § 4.1-1007. 1448

1449 C. The Authority may accept payment by any commercially acceptable means, including cash, checks, 1450 credit cards, debit cards, and electronic funds transfers, for any taxes, interest, or penalties due under this 1451 subtitle. The Board may assess a service charge for the use of a credit or debit card.

1452 D. Upon request, the Authority may collect and maintain a record of a person's credit card, debit card, or 1453 automated clearinghouse transfer information and use such information for future payments of taxes, 1454 interest, or penalties due under this subtitle. The Authority may assess a service charge for any payments 1455 made under this subsection. The Authority may procure the services of a third-party vendor for the secure 1456 storage of information collected pursuant to this subsection.

E. If any person liable for tax under § 4.1-1003 sells out his business or stock of goods or quits the 1457 business, such person shall make a final return and payment within 15 days after the date of selling or 1458 1459 quitting the business. Such person's successors or assigns, if any, shall withhold sufficient of the purchase money to cover the amount of such taxes, interest, and penalties due and unpaid until such former owner 1460 1461 produces a receipt from the Authority showing payment or a certificate stating that no taxes, penalties, or interest are due. If the buyer of a business or stock of goods fails to withhold the purchase money as provided 1462 in this subsection, such buyer shall be liable for the payment of the taxes, interest, and penalties due and 1463 1464 unpaid on account of the operation of the business by any former owner.

1465 F. When any person fails to timely pay the full amount of tax due under § 4.1-1003, interest at a rate 1466 determined in accordance with § 58.1-15 shall accrue on the tax until it is paid. Any taxes due under § 1467 4.1-1003 shall, if applicable, be subject to penalties as provided in §§ 4.1-1205 and 4.1-1206.

1468 § 4.1-1005. Bonds.

1469 The Authority may, when deemed necessary and advisable to do so in order to secure the collection of the

1470 taxes levied under § 4.1-1003, require any person subject to such tax to file a bond, with such surety as it 1471 determines is necessary to secure the payment of any tax, penalty, or interest due or that may become due from such person. In lieu of such bond, securities approved by the Authority may be deposited with the State 1472 1473 Treasurer, which securities shall be kept in the custody of the State Treasurer, and shall be sold by the State 1474 Treasurer at the request of the Authority at public or private sale if it becomes necessary to do so in order to 1475 recover any tax, interest, or penalty due the Commonwealth. Upon any such sale, the surplus, if any, above 1476 the amounts due shall be returned to the person who deposited the securities. 1477 § 4.1-1006. Refunds. 1478 A. Whenever it is proved to the satisfaction of the Authority that any taxes levied pursuant to § 4.1-1003

1478 A. whenever it is proved to the satisfaction of the Authority that any taxes levted pursuant to § 4.1-1005
1479 have been paid and that the taxable items were or are (i) damaged, destroyed, or otherwise deemed to be
1480 unsalable by reason of fire or any other providential cause before sale to the consumer; (ii) destroyed
1481 voluntarily, after notice to and approval by the Authority of such destruction, because the taxable items were
1482 defective; or (iii) destroyed in any manner while in the possession of a common, private, or contract carrier,
1483 the Authority shall certify such facts to the Comptroller for approval of a refund payment from the state
1484 treasury to such extent as may be proper.

B. Whenever it is proved to the satisfaction of the Authority that any person has purchased taxable items
that have been sold by such person in such manner as to be exempt from the tax, the Authority shall certify
such facts to the Comptroller for approval of a refund payment from the state treasury to such extent as may
be proper.

1489 C. In the event purchases are returned to the seller by the buyer after a tax imposed under § 4.1-1003 has
1490 been collected or charged to the account of the buyer, the seller shall be entitled to a refund of the amount of
1491 tax so collected or charged in the manner prescribed by the Authority. The amount of tax so refunded to the
1492 seller shall not, however, include the tax paid upon any amount retained by the seller after such return of
1493 merchandise. In case the tax has not been remitted by the seller, the seller may deduct the same in submitting
1494 his return.

1495 § 4.1-1007. Statute of limitations; civil remedies for collecting past-due taxes, interest, and penalties.

A. The taxes imposed under § 4.1-1003 shall be assessed within three years from the date on which such taxes became due and payable. In the case of a false or fraudulent return with intent to defraud the Commonwealth, or a failure to file a return, the taxes may be assessed, or a proceeding in court for the collection of such taxes may be begun without assessment, at any time within six years from such date. The Authority shall not examine any person's records beyond the three-year period of limitations unless it has reasonable evidence of fraud or reasonable cause to believe that such person was required by law to file a return and failed to do so.

B. If any person fails to file a return as required by this section, or files a return that is false or 1503 1504 fraudulent, the Authority may make an estimate for the taxable period of the taxable sales of such person and assess the tax, plus any applicable interest and penalties. The Authority shall give such person 10 days' 1505 1506 notice requiring such person to provide any records as it may require relating to the business of such person 1507 for the taxable period. The Authority may require such person or the agents and employees of such person to 1508 give testimony or to answer interrogatories under oath administered by the Authority respecting taxable 1509 sales, the filing of the return, and any other relevant information. If any person fails to file a required return, 1510 refuses to provide required records, or refuses to answer interrogatories from the Authority, the Authority may make an estimated assessment based upon the information available to it and issue a memorandum of 1511 1512 lien under subsection C for the collection of any taxes, interest, or penalties. The estimated assessment shall 1513 be deemed prima facie correct.

1514 C. 1. If the Authority assesses taxes, interest, or penalties on a person and such person does not pay 1515 within 30 days after the due date, taking into account any extensions granted by the Authority, the Authority 1516 may file a memorandum of lien in the circuit court clerk's office of the county or city in which the person's 1517 place of business is located or in which the person resides. If the person has no place of business or residence within the Commonwealth, the memorandum may be filed in the Circuit Court of the City of Richmond. A 1518 copy of the memorandum may also be filed in the clerk's office of all counties and cities in which the person 1519 1520 owns real estate. Such memorandum shall be recorded in the judgment docket book and shall have the effect of a judgment in favor of the Commonwealth, to be enforced as provided in Article 19 (§ 8.01-196 et seq.) of 1521 1522 Chapter 3 of Title 8.01, except that a writ of fieri facias may issue at any time after the memorandum is filed. The lien on real estate shall become effective at the time the memorandum is filed in the jurisdiction in which 1523 1524 the real estate is located. No memorandum of lien shall be filed unless the person is first given 10 or more 1525 days' prior notice of intent to file a lien; however, in those instances where the Authority determines that the 1526 collection of any tax, penalties, or interest required to be paid pursuant to law will be jeopardized by the 1527 provision of such notice, notification may be provided to the person concurrent with the filing of the 1528 memorandum of lien. Such notice shall be given to the person at his last known address.

1529 2. Recordation of a memorandum of lien under this subsection shall not affect a person's right to appeal
 1530 under § 4.1-1008.

1531 3. If after filing a memorandum of lien the Authority determines that it is in the best interest of the

Commonwealth, it may place padlocks on the doors of any business enterprise that is delinquent in filing or 1532 1533 paying any tax owed to the Commonwealth. The Authority shall also post notices of distraint on each of the doors so padlocked. If, after three business days, the tax deficiency has not been satisfied or satisfactory 1534 1535 arrangements for payment have not been made, the Authority may cause a writ of fieri facias to be issued. It shall be a Class I misdemeanor for anyone to enter the padlocked premises without prior approval of the 1536 Authority. In the event that the person against whom the distraint has been applied subsequently appeals 1537 1538 under § 4.1-1008, the person shall have the right to post bond equaling the amount of liability in lieu of payment until the appeal is resolved. 1539 4. A person may petition the Authority after a memorandum of lien has been filed under this subsection if 1540

1541 the person alleges an error in the filing of the lien. The Authority shall make a determination on such petition within 14 days. If the Authority determines that the filing was erroneous, it shall issue a certificate of release 1542 1543 of the lien within seven days after such determination is made. 1544

## § 4.1-1008. Appeals.

1545 Any tax imposed under § 4.1-1003, any interest imposed under § 4.1-1007, any action of the Authority under § 4.1-1204, and any penalty imposed under § 4.1-1205 or 4.1-1206 shall be subject to review under the 1546 1547 Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.). Such review shall extend to the entire evidential record of the proceedings provided by the Authority in accordance with the Administrative Process Act. An appeal 1548 1549 shall lie to the Court of Appeals from any order of a circuit court. Notwithstanding § 8.01-676.1, the final judgment or order of a circuit court shall not be suspended, stayed, or modified by such circuit court pending 1550 appeal to the Court of Appeals. Neither mandamus nor injunction shall lie in any such case. 1551

§ 4.1-1100. Possession, etc., of marijuana and marijuana products by persons 21 years of age or 1552 1553 older lawful; penalties.

A. Except as otherwise provided in this subtitle and notwithstanding any other provision of law, a person 1554 1555 21 years of age or older may lawfully possess on his person or in any public place not more than one ounce two and one-half ounces of marijuana or an equivalent amount of marijuana product as determined by 1556 regulation promulgated by the Board. 1557

B. Any person who possesses on his person or in any public place marijuana or marijuana products in 1558 1559 excess of the amounts set forth in subsection A is subject to a civil penalty of no more than \$25 except as 1560 otherwise provided in this section. The penalty for any violations of this section by an adult shall be 1561 prepayable according to the procedures in § 16.1-69.40:2.

C. With the exception of possession by a person in his residence or possession by a licensee in the course 1562 of his duties related to such licensee's marijuana establishment, any person who possesses on his person or in 1563 any public place (i) more than four ounces but not more than one pound of marijuana or an equivalent amount 1564 of marijuana product as determined by regulation promulgated by the Board is guilty of a Class 3 1565 misdemeanor and, for a second or subsequent offense, a Class 2 misdemeanor and (ii) more than one pound 1566 of marijuana or an equivalent amount of marijuana product as determined by regulation promulgated by the 1567 Board is guilty of a felony punishable by a term of imprisonment of not less than one year nor more than 10 1568 years and a fine of not more than \$250,000, or both. 1569

D. The provisions of this section shall not apply to members of federal, state, county, city, or town 1570 law-enforcement agencies, jail officers, or correctional officers, as defined in § 53.1-1, certified as handlers of 1571 dogs trained in the detection of controlled substances when possession of marijuana is necessary for the 1572 1573 performance of their duties. 1574

# § 4.1-1101. Home cultivation of marijuana for personal use; penalties.

1575 A. Notwithstanding the provisions of subdivision (c) of § 18.2-248.1, a A person 21 years of age or older 1576 may cultivate up to four marijuana plants for personal use at their place of residence; however, at no point 1577 shall a household contain more than four marijuana plants. For purposes of this section, a "household" means those individuals, whether related or not, who live in the same house or other place of residence. 1578

1579 A person may only cultivate marijuana plants pursuant to this section at such person's main place of 1580 residence. 1581

A violation of this subsection shall be punishable as follows:

1. For possession of more than four marijuana plants but no more than 10 marijuana plants, (i) a civil 1582 penalty of \$250 for a first offense, (ii) a Class 3 misdemeanor for a second offense, and (iii) a Class 2 1583 misdemeanor for a third and any subsequent offense; 1584

2. For possession of more than 10 but no more than 49 marijuana plants, a Class 1 misdemeanor; 1585

3. For possession of more than 49 but no more than 100 marijuana plants, a Class 6 felony; and 1586

4. For possession of more than 100 marijuana plants, a felony punishable by a term of imprisonment of 1587 not less than one year nor more than 10 years or a fine of not more than \$250,000, or both. 1588

B. A person who cultivates marijuana for personal use pursuant to this section shall: 1589

1590 1. Ensure that no marijuana plant is visible from a public way without the use of aircraft, binoculars, or 1591 other optical aids;

2. Take precautions to prevent unauthorized access by persons younger than 21 years of age; and 1592

3. Attach to each marijuana plant a legible tag that includes the person's name, driver's license or 1593

identification number, and a notation that the marijuana plant is being grown for personal use as authorizedunder this section.

Any person who violates this subsection is subject to a civil penalty of no more than \$25. The penalty for any violations of this section by an adult shall be prepayable according to the procedures in § 16.1-69.40:2.

1598 C. A person shall not manufacture marijuana concentrate from home-cultivated marijuana. The owner of a
 1599 property or parcel or tract of land may not intentionally or knowingly allow another person to manufacture
 1600 marijuana concentrate from home-cultivated marijuana within or on that property or land.

\$ 4.1-1102. Illegal cultivation or processing of marijuana or marijuana products; conspiracy; penalties.
 A. Except as otherwise provided in §§ 4.1-700 and 4.1-1101, no person shall cultivate or process
 marijuana or marijuana products in the Commonwealth without being licensed to cultivate or process such
 marijuana or marijuana products.

**1605** *B.* Any person convicted of a violation of this section is guilty of a Class 6 felony.

1606 C. If two or more persons conspire together to do any act that is in violation of subsection A, and one or
1607 more of such persons does any act to effect the object of the conspiracy, each of the parties to such
1608 conspiracy is guilty of a Class 6 felony.

1609 § 4.1-1103. Illegal sale of marijuana or marijuana products in general; penalties.

A. For the purposes of this section, "adult sharing" means transferring marijuana between persons who
are 21 years of age or older without remuneration. "Adult sharing" does not include instances in which (i)
marijuana is given away contemporaneously with another reciprocal transaction between the same parties;
(ii) a gift of marijuana is offered or advertised in conjunction with an offer for the sale of goods or services;
or (iii) a gift of marijuana is contingent upon a separate reciprocal transaction for goods or services.

B. If any person who is not licensed sells, gives, or distributes or possesses with intent to sell, give, or
distribute any marijuana or marijuana products except as permitted by this chapter or provided in subsection
C, he is guilty of a Class 2 misdemeanor.

**1618** A second or subsequent conviction under this section shall constitute a Class 1 misdemeanor.

**1619** *C.* No civil or criminal penalty may be imposed for adult sharing of an amount of marijuana that does not exceed two and one-half ounces or of an equivalent amount of marijuana products.

1621 § 4.1-1104. Persons to whom marijuana or marijuana products may not be sold; proof of legal age; 1622 penalties.

A. No person shall, except as otherwise permitted under Chapter 16 (§ 4.1-1600 et seq.), sell, give, or distribute any marijuana or marijuana products to any individual when at the time of such sale he knows or has reason to believe that the individual to whom the sale is made is (i) younger than 21 years of age or (ii) intoxicated. Any person convicted of a violation of this subsection is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

1627 B. Any person who sells, except as otherwise permitted under Chapter 16 (§ 4.1-1600 et seq.), any 1628 marijuana or marijuana products to an individual who is younger than 21 years of age and at the time of the sale does not require the individual to present bona fide evidence of legal age indicating that the individual is 1629 21 years of age or older is guilty of a violation of this subsection. Bona fide evidence of legal age is limited to 1630 1631 any evidence that is or reasonably appears to be an unexpired driver's license issued by any state of the 1632 United States or the District of Columbia, military identification card, United States passport or foreign government visa, unexpired special identification card issued by the Department of Motor Vehicles, or any 1633 1634 other valid government-issued identification card bearing the individual's photograph, signature, height, weight, and date of birth, or which bears a photograph that reasonably appears to match the appearance of 1635 1636 the purchaser. A student identification card shall not constitute bona fide evidence of legal age for purposes 1637 of this subsection. Any person convicted of a violation of this subsection is guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor.

**1638** *C.* No person shall be convicted of both subsections A and B for the same sale.

# \$ 4.1-1105. Purchasing of marijuana or marijuana products unlawful in certain cases; venue; exceptions; penalties; forfeiture; treatment and education programs and services.

A. No person to whom marijuana or marijuana products may not lawfully be sold under § 4.1-1104 shall
consume, purchase, or possess, or attempt to consume, purchase, or possess, any marijuana or marijuana
products, except (i) pursuant to § 4.1-700 or (ii) by any federal, state, or local law-enforcement officer or his
agent when possession of marijuana or marijuana products is necessary in the performance of his duties.
Such person may be prosecuted either in the county or city in which the marijuana or marijuana products
were possessed or consumed or in the county or city in which the person exhibits evidence of physical indicia
of consumption of marijuana or marijuana products.

1648 B. Any person 18 years of age or older who violates subsection A is subject to a civil penalty of no more
1649 than \$25 and shall be ordered to enter a substance abuse treatment or education program or both, if
1650 available, that in the opinion of the court best suits the needs of the accused.

1651 C. Unless the juvenile is proceeded against informally pursuant to § 16.1-260, any juvenile who violates
1652 subsection A is subject to a civil penalty of no more than \$25 and the court shall require the accused to enter
1653 a substance abuse treatment or education program or both, if available, that in the opinion of the court best

**1654** suits the needs of the accused. For purposes of \$\$ 16.1-266, 16.1-273, 16.1-278.8, 16.1-278.8:01, and

1655 16.1-278.9, the court shall treat the juvenile as delinquent.

1656 D. Any such substance abuse treatment or education program to which a juvenile is ordered pursuant to this section shall be provided by (i) a program licensed by the Department of Behavioral Health and 1657 1658 Developmental Services or (ii) a similar program available through a facility or program operated by or under contract with the Department of Juvenile Justice or a locally operated court services unit or a program 1659 funded through the Virginia Juvenile Community Crime Control Act (§ 16.1-309.2 et seq.). Any such 1660 substance abuse treatment or education program to which a person 18 years of age or older is ordered 1661 pursuant to this section shall be provided by (a) a program licensed by the Department of Behavioral Health 1662 and Developmental Services or (b) a program or services made available through a community-based 1663 1664 probation services agency established pursuant to Article 9 (§ 9.1-173 et seq.) of Chapter 1 of Title 9.1, if one has been established for the locality. When an offender is ordered to a local community-based probation 1665 services agency, the local community-based probation services agency shall be responsible for providing for 1666 services or referring the offender to education or treatment services as a condition of probation. 1667

E. Any civil penalties collected pursuant to this section shall be deposited into the Drug Offender 1668 1669 Assessment and Treatment Fund established pursuant to § 18.2-251.02. No person younger than 21 years of 1670 age shall use or attempt to use any (i) altered, fictitious, facsimile, or simulated license to operate a motor vehicle; (ii) altered, fictitious, facsimile, or simulated document, including a birth certificate or student 1671 1672 identification card; or (iii) motor vehicle driver's license or other document issued under Chapter 3 (§ 1673 46.2-300 et seq.) of Title 46.2 or the comparable law of another jurisdiction, birth certificate, or student 1674 identification card of another person in order to establish a false identification or false age for himself to consume, purchase, or attempt to consume or purchase marijuana or marijuana products. Any person 1675 1676 convicted of a violation of this subsection is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

F. Any marijuana or marijuana product purchased or possessed in violation of this section shall be 1677 1678 deemed contraband and forfeited to the Commonwealth in accordance with § 4.1-1303.

G. Any retail marijuana store licensee who in good faith promptly notifies the Board or any state or local 1679 law-enforcement agency of a violation or suspected violation of this section shall be accorded immunity from 1680 an administrative penalty for a violation of § 4.1-1104. 1681

1682 § 4.1-1106. Purchasing marijuana or marijuana products for one to whom they may not be sold; 1683 penalties; forfeiture.

1684 A. Any person who purchases marijuana or marijuana products for another person and at the time of such purchase knows or has reason to believe that the person for whom the marijuana or marijuana products were 1685 1686 purchased was intoxicated is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

B. Any person who purchases for, or otherwise gives, provides, or assists in the provision of marijuana or 1687 1688 marijuana products to, another person when he knows or has reason to know that such person is younger than 21 years of age, except by any federal, state, or local law-enforcement officer when possession of 1689 1690 marijuana or marijuana products is necessary in the performance of his duties, is guilty of a Class I 1691 misdemeanor.

1692 C. Any marijuana or marijuana products purchased in violation of this section shall be deemed 1693 contraband and forfeited to the Commonwealth in accordance with § 4.1-1303. 1694

## § 4.1-1113. Maintaining common nuisances; penalties.

A. All houses, boathouses, buildings, club or fraternity or lodge rooms, boats, cars, and places of every 1695 1696 description where marijuana or marijuana products are manufactured, processed, stored, sold, dispensed, 1697 given away, or used contrary to law, by any scheme or device whatsoever, shall be deemed common 1698 nuisances.

1699 No person shall maintain, aid, abet, or knowingly associate with others in maintaining a common 1700 nuisance.

Any person convicted of a violation of this subsection is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor. 1701

1702 B. In addition, after due notice and an opportunity to be heard on the part of any owner or lessor not 1703 involved in the original offense, by a proceeding analogous to that provided in § 4.1-1303 and upon proof of 1704 guilty knowledge, judgment may be given that such house, boathouse, building, boat, car, or other place, or any room or part thereof, be closed. The court may, upon the owner or lessor giving bond in the penalty of 1705 1706 not less than \$500 and with security to be approved by the court, conditioned that the premises shall not be used for unlawful purposes, or in violation of the provisions of this subtitle for a period of five years, turn the 1707 same over to its owner or lessor, or proceeding may be had in equity as provided in § 4.1-1300. 1708

1709 C. In a proceeding under this section, judgment shall not be entered against the owner, lessor, or 1710 lienholder of the property unless it is proved that he (i) knew of the unlawful use of the property and (ii) had the right, because of such unlawful use, to enter and repossess the property. 1711

#### 1712 § 4.1-1114. Maintaining a fortified drug house; penalty.

1713 Any office, store, shop, restaurant, dance hall, theater, poolroom, clubhouse, storehouse, warehouse, 1714 dwelling house, apartment, or building or structure of any kind that is (i) substantially altered from its 1715 original status by means of reinforcement with the intent to impede, deter, or delay lawful entry by a

1716 law-enforcement officer into such structure; (ii) being used for the purpose of illegally manufacturing,

1717 processing, or distributing marijuana; and (iii) the object of a valid search warrant shall be considered a
1718 fortified drug house. Any person who maintains or operates a fortified drug house is guilty of a Class 5
1719 felony.

1720 § 4.1-1115. Disobeying subpoena; hindering conduct of hearing; penalty.

No person shall (i) fail or refuse to obey any subpoena issued by the Board, any Board member, or any agent authorized by the Board to issue such subpoena or (ii) hinder the orderly conduct and decorum of any hearing held and conducted by the Board, any Board member, or any agent authorized by the Board to hold and conduct such hearing.

1725 Any person convicted of a violation of this section is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

# 1726 § 4.1-1117. Delivery of marijuana or marijuana products to prisoners; penalty.

1727 No person shall deliver, or cause to be delivered, to any prisoner in any state, local, or regional
1728 correctional facility or any person committed to the Department of Juvenile Justice in any juvenile
1729 correctional center any marijuana or marijuana products.

Any person convicted of a violation of this section is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

# 1731 § 4.1-1118. Separation of plant resin by butane extraction; penalty.

A. No person shall separate plant resin by butane extraction or another method that utilizes a substance
with a flashpoint below 100 degrees Fahrenheit in any public place, motor vehicle, or within the curtilage of
any residential structure.

1735 B. Any person convicted of a violation of this section is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

1736 § 4.1-1119. Attempts; aiding or abetting; penalty.

1737 No person shall attempt to do any of the things prohibited by this subtitle or to aid or abet another in1738 doing, or attempting to do, any of the things prohibited by this subtitle.

1739 On an indictment, information, or warrant for the violation of this subtitle, the jury or the court may find 1740 the defendant guilty of an attempt, or being an accessory, and the punishment shall be the same as if the 1741 defendant were solely guilty of such violation.

# 1742 § 4.1-1121. Issuance of summonses for certain offenses; civil penalties.

1743 Any violation under this subtitle that is subject to a civil penalty is a civil offense and, except in the case 1744 of a violation alleged to have been committed by a juvenile, in which case the juvenile shall be proceeded 1745 against pursuant to § 16.1-260, shall be charged by summons. A summons for a violation under this subtitle 1746 that is subject to a civil penalty may be executed by a law-enforcement officer when such violation is 1747 observed by such officer. The summons used by a law-enforcement officer pursuant to this section shall be in a form the same as the uniform summons for motor vehicle law violations as prescribed pursuant to  $\S$ 1748 1749 46.2-388. Any civil penalties collected pursuant to this subtitle shall be deposited into the Drug Offender 1750 Assessment and Treatment Fund established pursuant to § 18.2-251.02.

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#### CHAPTER 12. PROHIBITED PRACTICES BY LICENSEES.

# § 4.1-1200. Illegal cultivation, etc., of marijuana or marijuana products by licensees; penalty.

1753 § 4.1-1200. Illegal cultivation, etc., of marijuana or marijuana
1754 A. No licensee or any agent or employee of such licensee shall:

1755 1. Cultivate, process, transport, sell, or test any marijuana or marijuana products of a kind other than 1756 that which such license or this subtitle authorizes him to cultivate, process, transport, sell, or test;

1757 2. Sell marijuana or marijuana products to any person other than a person to whom such license or this
1758 subtitle authorizes him to sell;

1759 3. Cultivate, process, transport, sell, or test marijuana or marijuana products that such license or this
1760 subtitle authorizes him to sell, but in any place or in any manner other than such license or this subtitle
1761 authorizes him to cultivate, process, transport, sell, or test;

**1762** *4. Cultivate, process, transport, sell, or test any marijuana or marijuana products when forbidden by this subtitle;* 

1764 5. Keep or allow to be kept, other than in his residence and for his personal use, any marijuana or
1765 marijuana products other than that which he is authorized to cultivate, process, transport, sell, or test by
1766 such license or by this subtitle;

1767 6. Keep any marijuana or marijuana product other than in the container in which it was purchased by1768 him; or

1769 7. Allow a person younger than 21 years of age to be employed by or volunteer for such licensee.

1770 B. Any person convicted of a violation of this section is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

1771 § 4.1-1201. Prohibited acts by employees of marijuana store licensees; civil penalty.

A. In addition to the provisions of § 4.1-1200, no retail marijuana store licensee or his agent or employee shall use or consume any marijuana or marijuana products (i) on the licensed premises, except for certain sampling for quality control purposes in accordance with Board regulations or (ii) while on duty and in a position that is involved in the selling of marijuana or marijuana products to consumers.

1776 B. No retail marijuana store licensee or his agent or employee shall make any gift of any marijuana or

1777 marijuana products.

 $\hat{C}$ . Any person convicted of a violation of this section shall be subject to a civil penalty in an amount not to 1778 1779 exceed \$500.

§ 4.1-1202. Sale of; purchase for resale; marijuana or marijuana products from a person without a 1780 1781 license; penalty.

1782 Except as otherwise provided in § 4.1-805, no retail marijuana store licensee shall purchase for resale or 1783 sell any marijuana, marijuana products, immature marijuana plants, or marijuana seeds purchased from 1784 anyone other than a marijuana cultivation facility or marijuana processing facility.

Any person convicted of a violation of this section is guilty of a Class I misdemeanor. 1785

1786 § 4.1-1203. Prohibiting transfer of marijuana or marijuana products by licensees; penalty.

1787 A. No licensed marijuana establishment shall transfer any marijuana or marijuana products from one 1788 licensed place of business to another licensed place of business unless such transfer is completed by a 1789 marijuana transporter licensee.

1790 B. Any person convicted of a violation of this section is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

1791 § 4.1-1204. Illegal advertising materials; civil penalty.

1792 No person subject to the jurisdiction of the Board shall induce, attempt to induce, or consent to any 1793 licensee selling, renting, lending, buying for, or giving to any person any advertising materials or decorations under circumstances prohibited by this title or Board regulations. 1794

1795 Any person found by the Board to have violated this section shall be subject to a civil penalty as 1796 authorized in § 4.1-903.

1797 § 4.1-1205. Failure of licensee to pay tax or to deliver, keep, and preserve records and accounts or to 1798 allow examination and inspection; penalty.

1799 A. No licensee shall fail or refuse to (i) pay any tax provided for in § 4.1-1003; (ii) deliver, keep, and 1800 preserve such records, invoices, and accounts as are required by § 4.1-703 or Board regulation; or (iii) allow such records, invoices, and accounts or his place of business to be examined and inspected in 1801 accordance with § 4.1-703. Any person convicted of a violation of this subsection is guilty of a Class 1 1802 misdemeanor. 1803

1804 B. After reasonable notice to a licensee that failed to make a return or pay taxes due, the Authority may 1805 suspend or revoke any license of such licensee that was issued by the Authority.

1806 § 4.1-1206. Nonpayment of marijuana tax; penalties.

A. No person shall make a sale taxable under § 4.1-1003 without paying all applicable taxes due. No 1807 1808 retail marijuana store licensee shall purchase, receive, transport, store, or sell any marijuana or marijuana products on which such retailer has reason to know such tax has not been paid and may not be paid. Any 1809 1810 person convicted of a violation of this subsection is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

B. Any person who fails to file a return required for a tax due under § 4.1-1003 is subject to a civil 1811 penalty to be added to the tax in the amount of five percent of the proper tax due if the failure is for not more 1812 than 30 days, with an additional five percent for each additional 30 days, or fraction thereof, during which 1813 the failure continues. Such civil penalty shall not exceed 25 percent in the aggregate. 1814

C. In the case of a false or fraudulent return, where willful intent exists to defraud the Commonwealth of 1815 1816 any tax due on marijuana or marijuana products, a civil penalty of 50 percent of the amount of the proper tax due shall be assessed. Such penalty shall be in addition to any penalty imposed under subsection B. It shall 1817 1818 be prima facie evidence of willful intent to defraud the Commonwealth when any person reports its taxable 1819 sales to the Authority at 50 percent or less of the actual amount.

1820 D. If any check tendered for any amount due under § 4.1-1003 or this section is not paid by the bank on 1821 which it is drawn, and the person that tendered the check fails to pay the Authority the amount due within five 1822 days after the Authority gives it notice that such check was returned unpaid, the person that tendered the 1823 check is guilty of a violation of § 18.2-182.1.

1824 E. All penalties shall be payable to the Authority and if not so paid shall be collectible in the same manner 1825 as if they were a part of the tax imposed. 1826

# § 4.1-1300. Enjoining nuisances.

A. In addition to the penalties imposed by § 4.1-1113, the Board, its special agents, the attorney for the 1827 1828 Commonwealth, or any citizen of the county, city, or town where a common nuisance as defined in § 4.1-1113 exists may maintain a suit in equity in the name of the Commonwealth to enjoin the common nuisance. 1829

1830 B. The courts of equity shall have jurisdiction, and in every case where the bill charges, on the knowledge or belief of the complainant, and is sworn to by two reputable citizens, that marijuana or marijuana products 1831 1832 are cultivated, processed, stored, sold, dispensed, given away, or used in such house, building, or other place described in § 4.1-1113 contrary to the laws of the Commonwealth, an injunction shall be granted as soon as 1833 1834 the bill is presented to the court. The injunction shall enjoin and restrain the owners and tenants and their 1835 agents and employees, and any person connected with such house, building, or other place, and all persons 1836 whomsoever from cultivating, processing, storing, selling, dispensing, giving away, or using marijuana or 1837 marijuana products on such premises. The injunction shall also restrain all persons from removing any

1838 marijuana or marijuana products then on such premises until the further order of the court. If the court is
1839 satisfied that the material allegations of the bill are true, although the premises complained of may not then
1840 be unlawfully used, it shall continue the injunction against such place for a period of time as the court deems
1841 proper. The injunction may be dissolved if a proper case is shown for dissolution.

# 1842 § 4.1-1301. Contraband marijuana or marijuana products and other articles subject to forfeiture.

1843 A. All apparatus and materials for the cultivation or processing of marijuana or marijuana products, all 1844 marijuana or marijuana products and materials used in their manufacture or processing, and all containers 1845 in which marijuana or marijuana products may be found that are kept, stored, possessed, or in any manner 1846 used in violation of the provisions of this subtitle, and any dangerous weapons as described in § 18.2-308 that may be used or that may be found upon the person, or in any vehicle that such person is using, to aid 1847 1848 such person in the unlawful cultivation, manufacture, processing, transportation, or sale of marijuana or 1849 marijuana products, or found in the possession of such person, or any horse, mule, or other beast of burden 1850 or any wagon, automobile, truck, or vehicle of any nature whatsoever that is found in the immediate vicinity 1851 of any place where marijuana or marijuana products are being unlawfully manufactured or processed and 1852 where such animal or vehicle is being used to aid in the unlawful manufacture or processing, shall be deemed 1853 contraband and shall be forfeited to the Commonwealth.

B. Proceedings for the confiscation of the property in subsection A shall be in accordance with § 4.1-1303
for all such property except motor vehicles, which proceedings shall be in accordance with Chapter 22.1 (§ 19.2-386.1 et seq.) of Title 19.2.

## § 4.1-1303. Confiscation proceedings; disposition of forfeited articles.

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1858 A. All proceedings for the confiscation of articles, except motor vehicles, declared contraband and1859 forfeited to the Commonwealth under this subtitle shall be as provided in this section.

B. Whenever any article declared contraband under the provisions of this subtitle and required to be forfeited to the Commonwealth has been seized, with or without a warrant, by any officer charged with the enforcement of this subtitle, he shall produce the contraband article and any person in whose possession it was found. In those cases where no person is found in possession of such articles, the return shall so state and a copy of the warrant shall be posted on the door of the buildings or room where the articles were found, or if there is no door, then in any conspicuous place upon the premises.

1866 In case of seizure of any item for any offense involving its forfeiture where it is impracticable to remove 1867 such item to a place of safe storage from the place where seized, the seizing officer may destroy such item 1868 only as necessary to prevent use of all or any part thereof. The destruction shall be in the presence of at least 1869 one credible witness, and such witness shall join the officer in a sworn report of the seizure and destruction 1870 to be made to the Board. The report shall set forth the grounds of the claim of forfeiture, the reasons for 1871 seizure and destruction, an estimate of the fair cash value of the item destroyed, and the materials remaining 1872 after such destruction. The report shall include a statement that, from facts within their own knowledge, the 1873 seizing officer and witness have no doubt whatever that the item was set up for use, or had been used in the unlawful cultivation, processing, or manufacture of marijuana, and that it was impracticable to remove such 1874 1875 apparatus to a place of safe storage.

1876 In case of seizure of any quantity of marijuana or marijuana products for any offense involving forfeiture 1877 of the same, the seizing officer may destroy them to prevent the use of all or any part thereof for the purpose 1878 of unlawful cultivation, processing, or manufacture of marijuana or marijuana products or any other 1879 violation of this subtitle. The destruction shall be in the presence of at least one credible witness, and such 1880 witness shall join the officer in a sworn report of the seizure and destruction to be made to the Board. The 1881 report shall set forth the grounds of the claim of forfeiture, the reasons for seizure and destruction, and a 1882 statement that, from facts within their own knowledge, the seizing officer and witness have no doubt whatever 1883 that the marijuana or marijuana products were intended for use in the unlawful cultivation, processing, or 1884 manufacture of marijuana or marijuana products or were intended for use in violation of this subtitle.

1885 C. Upon the return of the warrant as provided in this section, the court shall fix a time not less than 10 days, unless waived by the accused in writing, and not more than 30 days thereafter, for the hearing on such return to determine whether or not the articles seized, or any part thereof, were used or in any manner kept, stored, or possessed in violation of this subtitle.

1889 At such hearing, if no claimant appears, the court shall declare the articles seized forfeited to the 1890 Commonwealth and, if such articles are not necessary as evidence in any pending prosecution, shall turn 1891 them over to the Board. Any person claiming an interest in any of the articles seized may appear at the 1892 hearing and file a written claim setting forth particularly the character and extent of his interest. The court 1893 shall certify the warrant and the articles seized along with any claim filed to the circuit court to hear and 1894 determine the validity of such claim.

1895 If the evidence warrants, the court shall enter a judgment of forfeiture and order the articles seized to be
1896 turned over to the Board. Action under this section and the forfeiture of any articles hereunder shall not be a
1897 bar to any prosecution under any other provision of this subtitle.

**1898** D. Any articles forfeited to the Commonwealth and turned over to the Board in accordance with this

1899 section shall be destroyed or sold by the Board as it deems proper. The net proceeds from such sales shall be 1900 paid into the Literary Fund.

If the Board believes that any foodstuffs forfeited to the Commonwealth and turned over to the Board in 1901 1902 accordance with this section are usable, should not be destroyed, and cannot be sold, or whose sale would be impractical, it may give such foodstuffs to any institution in the Commonwealth and shall prefer a gift to the 1903 1904 local jail or other local correctional facility in the jurisdiction where seizure took place. A record shall be made showing the nature of the foodstuffs and amount given, to whom given, and the date when given and 1905 1906 shall be kept in the offices of the Board.

#### § 4.1-1304. Contraband marijuana or marijuana products. 1907

1908 Failure to maintain on a conveyance or vehicle a permit or other indicia of permission issued by the Board authorizing the transportation of marijuana or marijuana products within the Commonwealth when 1909 other Board regulations applicable to such transportation have been complied with shall not be cause for 1910 1911 deeming such marijuana or marijuana products contraband.

#### 1912 § 4.1-1305. Punishment for violations of title or regulations; bond.

1913 A. Any person convicted of a misdemeanor under the provisions of this subtitle without specification as to 1914 the class of offense or penalty, or convicted of violating any other provision thereof, or convicted of violating any Board regulation is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor. 1915

B. In addition to the penalties imposed by this subtitle for violations, any court before whom any person is 1916 convicted of a violation of any provision of this subtitle may require such defendant to execute bond based 1917 1918 upon his ability to pay, with approved security, in the penalty of not more than \$1,000, with the condition that the defendant will not violate any of the provisions of this subtitle for the term of one year. If any such bond is 1919 1920 required and is not given, the defendant shall be committed to jail until it is given, or until he is discharged by the court, provided that he shall not be confined for a period longer than six months. If any such bond 1921 required by a court is not given during the term of the court by which conviction is had, it may be given 1922 before any judge or before the clerk of such court. 1923

C. The provisions of this subtitle shall not prevent the Board from suspending, revoking, or refusing to 1924 1925 continue the license of any person convicted of a violation of any provision of this subtitle.

1926 D. No court shall hear such a case unless the respective attorney for the Commonwealth or his assistant 1927 has been notified that such a case is pending.

#### 1928 § 4.1-1306. Witness not excused from testifying because of self-incrimination.

1929 No person shall be excused from testifying or from producing books, papers, correspondence, memoranda, 1930 or other records for the Commonwealth as to any offense alleged to have been committed by another under this subtitle by reason of his testimony or other evidence tending to incriminate himself, but the testimony 1931 1932 given and evidence so produced by such person on behalf of the Commonwealth when called for by the trial judge or court trying the case, or by the attorney for the Commonwealth, or when summoned by the 1933 1934 Commonwealth and sworn as a witness by the court or the clerk and sent before the grand jury, shall be in no 1935 case used against him nor shall he be prosecuted as to the offense as to which he testifies. 1936

# § 4.1-1307. Previous convictions.

In any indictment, information, or warrant charging any person with a violation of any provision of this 1937 1938 subtitle, it may be alleged and evidence may be introduced at the trial of such person to prove that such 1939 person has been previously convicted of a violation of this subtitle.

#### 1940 § 4.1-1308. Label on sealed container prima facie evidence of marijuana content.

1941 In any prosecution for violations of this subtitle, where a sealed container is labeled as containing 1942 marijuana or marijuana products, such labeling shall be prima facie evidence of the marijuana content of the 1943 container. Nothing shall preclude the introduction of other relevant evidence to establish the marijuana 1944 content of a container, whether sealed or not. 1945

# § 4.1-1309. No recovery for marijuana or marijuana products illegally sold.

1946 No action to recover the price of any marijuana or marijuana products sold in contravention of this 1947 subtitle may be maintained. 1948

# § 4.1-1403. Board to establish regulations for marijuana testing.

The Board shall establish a testing program for marijuana and marijuana products. Except as otherwise 1949 1950 provided in this subtitle or otherwise provided by law, the program shall require a licensee, prior to selling or distributing marijuana or a marijuana product to a consumer or to another licensee, to submit a 1951 1952 representative sample of the marijuana or marijuana product, not to exceed 10 percent of the total harvest or batch, to a licensed marijuana testing facility for testing to ensure that the marijuana or marijuana product 1953 1954 does not exceed the maximum level of allowable contamination for any contaminant that is injurious to health and for which testing is required and to ensure correct labeling. The Board shall adopt regulations (i) 1955 1956 establishing a testing program pursuant to this section; (ii) establishing acceptable testing and research practices, including regulations relating to testing practices, methods, and standards; quality control 1957 1958 analysis; equipment certification and calibration; marijuana testing facility recordkeeping, documentation, and business practices; disposal of used, unused, and waste marijuana and marijuana products; and 1959

1960 reporting of test results; (iii) identifying the types of contaminants that are injurious to health for which
1961 marijuana and marijuana products shall be tested under this subtitle; and (iv) establishing the maximum
1962 level of allowable contamination for each contaminant.

1963 § 4.1-1404. Mandatory testing; scope; recordkeeping; notification; additional testing not required; 1964 required destruction; random testing.

A. A licensee may not sell or distribute marijuana or a marijuana product to a consumer or to another
licensee under this subtitle unless a representative sample of the marijuana or marijuana product has been
tested pursuant to this subtitle and the regulations adopted pursuant to this subtitle and the mandatory testing
has demonstrated that (i) the marijuana or marijuana product does not exceed the maximum level of
allowable contamination for any contaminant that is injurious to health and for which testing is required and
(ii) the labeling on the marijuana or marijuana product is correct.

**1971** B. Mandatory testing of marijuana and marijuana products under this section shall include testing for:

1972 *1. Residual solvents;* 

**1973** *2. Heavy metals;* 

*1974 3. Microbiological contaminants;* 

**1975** *4. Mycotoxins;* 

**1976** *5. Pesticide chemical residue; and* 

**1977** *6. Active ingredient analysis.* 

**1978** Testing shall be performed on the final form in which the marijuana or marijuana product will be **1979** consumed.

1980 C. A licensee shall maintain a record of all mandatory testing that includes a description of the marijuana
1981 or marijuana product provided to the marijuana testing facility, the identity of the marijuana testing facility,
1982 and the results of the mandatory test.

D. If the results of a mandatory test conducted pursuant to this section indicate that the tested marijuana or marijuana product exceeds the maximum level of allowable tetrahydrocannabinol or contamination for any contaminant that is injurious to health and for which testing is required, the marijuana testing facility shall immediately quarantine, document, and properly destroy the marijuana or marijuana product and within seven days of completing the test shall notify the Board of the test results.

**1988** A marijuana testing facility is not required to notify the Board of the results of any test:

1989 1. Conducted on marijuana or a marijuana product at the direction of a licensee pursuant to this section
1990 that demonstrates that the marijuana or marijuana product does not exceed the maximum level of allowable
1991 tetrahydrocannabinol or contamination for any contaminant that is injurious to health and for which testing
1992 is required;

1993 2. Conducted on marijuana or a marijuana product at the direction of a licensee for research and
1994 development purposes only, so long as the licensee notifies the marijuana testing facility prior to the
1995 performance of the test that the testing is for research and development purposes only; or

**1996** *3.* Conducted on marijuana or a marijuana product at the direction of a person who is not a licensee.

1997 E. Notwithstanding the foregoing, a licensee may sell or furnish to a consumer or to another licensee
1998 marijuana or a marijuana product that the licensee has not submitted for testing in accordance with this
1999 subtitle and regulations adopted pursuant to this subtitle if the following conditions are met:

1. The marijuana or marijuana product has previously undergone testing in accordance with this subtitle
and regulations adopted pursuant to this subtitle at the direction of another licensee and the testing
demonstrated that the marijuana or marijuana product does not exceed the maximum level of allowable
tetrahydrocannabinol or contamination for any contaminant that is injurious to health and for which testing
is required;

2005 2. The mandatory testing process and the test results for the marijuana or marijuana product are
2006 documented in accordance with the requirements of this subtitle and all applicable regulations adopted
2007 pursuant to this subtitle;

2008 3. Tracking from immature marijuana plant to the point of retail sale has been maintained for the
 2009 marijuana or marijuana product and transfers of the marijuana or marijuana product to another licensee or
 2010 to a consumer can be easily identified; and

4. The marijuana or marijuana product has not undergone any further processing, manufacturing, oralteration subsequent to the performance of the prior testing under subsection A.

2013 F. Licensees shall be required to destroy harvested batches of marijuana or batches of marijuana
2014 products whose testing samples indicate noncompliance with the health and safety standards required by this
2015 subtitle and the regulations adopted by the Board pursuant to this subtitle, unless remedial measures can
2016 bring the marijuana or marijuana product into compliance with such required health and safety standards.

2017 G. A licensee shall comply with all requests for samples of marijuana and marijuana products for the purpose of random testing by a state-owned laboratory or state-approved private laboratory.

2019 § 4.1-1405. Labeling and packaging requirements; prohibitions.

2020 A. Marijuana and marijuana products to be sold or offered for sale by a licensee to a consumer shall be

**2021** *labeled with the following information:* 

2022 1. Identification of the type of marijuana or marijuana product;

2023 2. The license numbers of the marijuana cultivation facility, the marijuana processing facility, and the 2024 retail marijuana store where the marijuana or marijuana product was cultivated, processed, and offered for 2025 sale, as applicable;

2026 *3. A statement of the net weight of the marijuana or marijuana product;* 

4. In English and in a font no less than 1/16 of an inch, information concerning (i) all ingredients,
including pharmacologically active ingredients, tetrahydrocannabinol, cannabidiol, and other cannabinoid
content; (ii) all possible allergens; (iii) the amount of servings in the package; (iv) if the product contains
tetrahydrocannabinol, the total percentage and milligrams of all tetrahydrocannabinols included in the
package and the total number of milligrams of all tetrahydrocannabinols contained in each serving; and (v)
the potency of the tetrahydrocannabinol and other cannabinoid content;

2033 5. Information on gases, solvents, and chemicals used in marijuana extraction, if applicable;

2034 6. Instructions on usage, including information regarding the amount of marijuana or marijuana product
 2035 that constitutes a single serving;

**2036** 7. A recommended use by date or expiration date;

8. For marijuana and marijuana products, the following statement, prominently displayed in bold print 2037 and in a clear and legible fashion: "GOVERNMENT WARNING: THIS PACKAGE CONTAINS MARIJUANA 2038 AND TETRAHYDROCANNABINOL (THC). MARIJUANA MAY ONLY BE SOLD TO AND USED BY 2039 ADULTS 21 YEARS OF AGE OR OLDER. KEEP OUT OF REACH OF CHILDREN. CONSUMPTION OF 2040 MARIJUANA IMPAIRS COGNITION AND YOUR ABILITY TO DRIVE AND MAY BE HABIT-FORMING. 2041 2042 MARIJUANA SHOULD NOT BE USED WHILE PREGNANT OR BREASTFEEDING. PLEASE USE 2043 CAUTION AND VISIT \_\_\_\_\_ (website maintained by the Board pursuant to § 4.1-604) FOR MORE 2044 INFORMATION.";

2045 9. A universal symbol stamped or embossed on the packaging of any marijuana and marijuana products;

2046 10. A certificate of analysis, produced by licensed marijuana testing facility, that states the total
 2047 tetrahydrocannabinol concentration of the substance or the total tetrahydrocannabinol concentration of the
 2048 batch from which the substance originates; and

**2049** *11.* Any other information required by Board regulations.

2050 B. Marijuana and marijuana products to be sold or offered for sale by a licensee to a consumer in accordance with the provisions of this subtitle shall be packaged in the following manner:

2052 1. Marijuana and marijuana products shall be prepackaged in child-resistant, tamper-evident, and
2053 resealable packaging that is opaque or shall be placed at the final point of sale to a consumer in
2054 child-resistant, tamper-evident, and resealable packaging that is opaque;

2055 2. Packaging for multiserving liquid marijuana products shall include an integral measurement 2056 component; and

*3. Packaging shall comply with any other requirements imposed by Board regulations.* 

**2058** *C.* Marijuana and marijuana products to be sold or offered for sale by a licensee to a consumer in accordance with the provisions of this subtitle shall not:

1. (i) Without authorization, bear, be packaged in a container or wrapper that bears, or otherwise be
labeled to bear the trademark, trade name, famous mark as defined in 15 U.S.C. § 1125, or other identifying
mark, imprint, or device, or any likeness thereof, of a manufacturer, processor, packer, or distributor of a
product intended for human consumption other than the manufacturer, processor, packer, or distributor that
did in fact so manufacture, process, pack, or distribute such substance or (ii) otherwise be packaged or
labeled in violation of a federal trademark law or regulation;

2066 2. Be labeled or packaged in a manner that appeals particularly to persons younger than 21 years of age;

*3. Be labeled or packaged in a manner that obscures identifying information on the label;* 

**2068** *4. Be labeled or packaged using a false or misleading label;* 

**2069** 5. Depict, model the shape of, or use a label or package that depicts or models the shape of a human, **2070** animal, vehicle, or fruit; and

2071 6. Be labeled or packaged in violation of any other labeling or packaging requirements imposed by Board2072 regulations.

2073 § 4.1-1406. Other health and safety requirements for edible marijuana products and other marijuana 2074 products deemed applicable by the Authority; health and safety regulations.

**2075** *A. In addition to all other applicable provisions of this subtitle, edible marijuana products and other* **2076** *marijuana products deemed applicable by the Authority to be sold or offered for sale by a licensee to a* **2077** *consumer:* 

2078 1. Shall be processed and manufactured by an approved source, as determined by § 3.2-5145.3;

2079 2. Shall comply with the provisions of Chapter 51 (§ 3.2-5100 et seq.) of Title 3.2;

2080 3. Shall be processed and manufactured in a manner that results in the cannabinoid content within the
 2081 product being homogeneous throughout the product or throughout each element of the product that has a

2082 *cannabinoid content;* 

4. Shall be processed and manufactured in a manner that results in the amount of marijuana concentrate
within the product being homogeneous throughout the product or throughout each element of the product
that contains marijuana concentrate;

**2086** 5. Shall have a universal symbol stamped or embossed on the packaging of each product;

2087 6. Shall not contain more than 10 milligrams of tetrahydrocannabinol per serving of the product and shall
2088 not contain more than 100 milligrams of tetrahydrocannabinol per package of the product;

2089 7. Shall not contain additives that (i) are toxic or harmful to human beings, (ii) are specifically designed
2090 to make the product more addictive, (iii) contain alcohol or nicotine, (iv) are misleading to consumers, or (v)
2091 are specifically designed to make the product appeal particularly to persons younger than 21 years of age;
2092 and

2093 8. Shall not involve the addition of marijuana to a trademarked food or drink product, except when the
2094 trademarked product is used as a component of or ingredient in the edible marijuana product and the edible
2095 marijuana product is not advertised or described for sale as containing the trademarked product.

B. The Board shall adopt any additional labeling, packaging, or other health and safety regulations that it
deems necessary for marijuana and marijuana products to be sold or offered for sale by a licensee to a
consumer in accordance with this subtitle. Regulations adopted pursuant to this subsection shall establish
mandatory health and safety standards applicable to the cultivation of marijuana, the processing and
manufacture of marijuana products, and the packaging and labeling of marijuana and marijuana products
sold by a licensee to a consumer. Such regulations shall address:

2102 1. Requirements for the storage, warehousing, and transportation of marijuana and marijuana products2103 by licensees;

- 2104 2. Sanitary standards for marijuana establishments, including sanitary standards for the processing and
   2105 manufacture of marijuana and marijuana products; and
- *3. Limitations on the display of marijuana and marijuana products at retail marijuana stores.*
- 2107 § 4.1-1500. Definitions.
- **2108** As used in this chapter, unless the context requires a different meaning:

2109 "CDFI" means a community development financial institution that provides credit and financial services2110 for underserved communities.

- 2111 "Fund" means the Virginia Cannabis Equity Business Loan Fund established in § 4.1-1501.
- 2112 "Funding" means loans *and grants* made from the Fund.
- 2113 "Program" means the Virginia Cannabis Equity Business Loan Program established in § 4.1-1502.

2114 "Social equity qualified cannabis licensee" means a person or business who meets the criteria in § 4.1-606
2115 to qualify as a social equity applicant and who either holds or is in the final stages of acquiring, as determined
2116 by the Board, a license to operate a marijuana establishment.

2117 § 4.1-1501. Virginia Cannabis Equity Business Loan Fund.

There is hereby created in the state treasury a special nonreverting fund to be known as the Virginia 2118 Cannabis Equity Business Loan Fund, referred to in this section as "the Fund." The Fund shall be established 2119 2120 on the books of the Comptroller. All funds appropriated for such purpose and any gifts, donations, grants, bequests, and other funds received on its behalf shall be paid into the state treasury and credited to the Fund. 2121 2122 Interest earned on moneys in the Fund shall remain in the Fund and be credited to it. Any moneys remaining 2123 in the Fund, including interest thereon, at the end of each fiscal year shall not revert to the general fund but 2124 shall remain in the Fund. Moneys in the Fund shall be used solely for the purposes of providing grants, 2125 low-interest and loans, zero-interest loans, and other supports and services to social equity qualified cannabis 2126 *micro business* licensees in order to foster business ownership and economic growth within communities that 2127 have been the most disproportionately impacted by the former prohibition of cannabis. Expenditures and 2128 disbursements from the Fund shall be made by the State Treasurer on warrants issued by the Comptroller 2129 upon written request signed by the Chief Executive Officer of the Authority.

## 2130 § 4.1-1502. Program requirements; guidelines for management of the Fund; selection of CDFI.

2131 A. The Authority shall establish a Program to provide loans, grants, and other supports and services to 2132 qualified social equity cannabis micro business licensees for the purpose of promoting business ownership and economic growth by communities that have been disproportionately impacted by the prohibition of 2133 2134 cannabis. The For the purposes of issuing loans, the Authority shall may select and work in collaboration 2135 with a CDFI to assist in administering the Program and carrying out the purposes of the Fund. The If the Authority utilizes a CDFI for issuing loans, the CDFI selected by the Authority shall have (i) a statewide 2136 2137 presence in Virginia, (ii) experience in business lending, (iii) a proven track record of working with 2138 disadvantaged communities, and (iv) the capability to dedicate sufficient staff to manage the Program. 2139 Working with the selected CDFI, the The Authority shall establish monitoring and accountability 2140 mechanisms for *micro* businesses receiving funding and shall report annually the number of businesses 2141 funded; the geographic distribution of the businesses; the costs of the Program; and the outcomes, including 2142 the number and types of jobs created.

**2143** B. The Program shall:

- 1. Identify social equity qualified cannabis micro business licensees who are in need of capital or other
- 2145 supports and services for the start-up of a cannabis business properly licensed pursuant to the provisions of 2146 this subtitle;
- 2147 2. Provide loans, grants, and other supports and services for the purposes described in subsection A and §
   2148 4.1-1501;
- **2149** 3. Provide technical assistance; and
- **2150** 4. Bring together community partners to sustain the Program.
- 2151 § 4.1-1601. Certification for use of cannabis for treatment.

A. A practitioner in the course of his professional practice may issue a written certification for the use of 2152 2153 cannabis products for treatment or to alleviate the symptoms of any diagnosed condition or disease determined by the practitioner to benefit from such use. The practitioner shall use his professional judgment 2154 to determine the manner and frequency of patient care and evaluation and may employ the use of 2155 telemedicine, provided that the use of telemedicine includes the delivery of patient care through real-time 2156 interactive audiovisual technology. No practitioner may issue a written certification while such practitioner is 2157 2158 on the premises of a pharmaceutical processor or cannabis dispensing facility. A pharmaceutical processor 2159 shall not endorse or promote any practitioner who issues certifications to patients. If a practitioner determines it is consistent with the standard of care to dispense botanical cannabis to a minor, the written certification 2160 2161 shall specifically authorize such dispensing. If not specifically included on the initial written certification, 2162 authorization for botanical cannabis may be communicated verbally or in writing to the pharmacist at the 2163 time of dispensing. A practitioner who issues written certifications shall not directly or indirectly accept, 2164 solicit, or receive anything of value from a pharmaceutical processor, cannabis dispensing facility, or any 2165 person associated with a pharmaceutical processor, cannabis dispensing facility, or provider of paraphernalia, excluding information on products or educational materials on the benefits and risks of cannabis products. 2166

B. The written certification shall be on a form provided by the Authority. Such written certification shall contain the name, address, and telephone number of the practitioner, the name and address of the patient issued the written certification, the date on which the written certification was made, and the signature or authentic electronic signature of the practitioner. Such written certification issued pursuant to subsection A shall expire one year after its issuance unless the practitioner provides in such written certification an earlier expiration. A written certification shall not be issued to a patient by more than one practitioner during any given time period.

C. No practitioner shall be prosecuted under *Chapter 11 (§ 4.1-1100 et seq.) or* § 18.2-248 or 18.2-248.1 for the issuance of a certification for the use of cannabis products for the treatment or to alleviate the symptoms of a patient's diagnosed condition or disease pursuant to a written certification issued pursuant to subsection A. Nothing in this section shall preclude a practitioner's professional licensing board from sanctioning the practitioner for failing to properly evaluate or treat a patient's medical condition or otherwise violating the applicable standard of care for evaluating or treating medical conditions.

2180 D. A practitioner who issues a written certification to a patient pursuant to this section (i) shall hold 2181 sufficient education and training to exercise appropriate professional judgment in the certification of patients; (ii) shall not offer a discount or any other thing of value to a patient or a patient's parent, guardian, or 2182 2183 registered agent that is contingent on or encourages the person's decision to use a particular pharmaceutical processor or cannabis product; (iii) shall not issue a certification to himself or his family members, 2184 2185 employees, or coworkers; (iv) shall not provide product samples containing cannabis other than those approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration; and (v) shall not accept compensation from a 2186 2187 pharmaceutical processor or cannabis dispensing facility. The Board shall not limit the number of patients to 2188 whom a practitioner may issue a written certification. The Board may report information to the applicable 2189 licensing board on unusual patterns of certifications issued by a practitioner.

E. No patient shall be required to physically present the written certification after the initial dispensing by any pharmaceutical processor or cannabis dispensing facility under each written certification, provided that the pharmaceutical processor or cannabis dispensing facility maintains an electronic copy of the written certification. Pharmaceutical processors and cannabis dispensing facilities shall electronically transmit on a monthly basis all new written certifications received by the pharmaceutical processor or cannabis dispensing facility to the Authority.

F. A patient, or, if such patient is a minor or a vulnerable adult as defined in § 18.2-369, such patient's parent or legal guardian, may designate an individual to act as his registered agent for the purposes of receiving cannabis products pursuant to a valid written certification. Such designated individual shall register with the Board unless the individual's name listed on the patient's written certification. An individual may, on the basis of medical need and in the discretion of the patient's registered practitioner, be listed on the patient's written certification upon the patient's request. The Board may set a limit on the number of patients for whom any individual is authorized to act as a registered agent.

G. Upon delivery of a cannabis product by a pharmaceutical processor or cannabis dispensing facility to a
 designated caregiver facility, any employee or contractor of a designated caregiver facility who is licensed or

2205 registered by a health regulatory board and who is authorized to possess, distribute, or administer medications

2206 may accept delivery of the cannabis product on behalf of a patient or resident for subsequent delivery to the 2207 patient or resident and may assist in the administration of the cannabis product to the patient or resident as 2208 necessary.

2209 H. Information obtained under the patient certification or agent registration process shall be confidential 2210 and shall not be subject to the disclosure provisions of the Virginia Freedom of Information Act (§ 2.2-3700 2211 et seq.). However, reasonable access to registry information shall be provided to (i) the Chairmen of the 2212 House and Senate Committees for Courts of Justice, (ii) state and federal agencies or local law enforcement 2213 for the purpose of investigating or prosecuting a specific individual for a specific violation of law, (iii) licensed practitioners or pharmacists, or their agents, for the purpose of providing patient care and drug 2214 2215 therapy management and monitoring of drugs obtained by a patient, (iv) a pharmaceutical processor or 2216 cannabis dispensing facility involved in the treatment of a patient, or (v) a patient's registered agent, but only 2217 with respect to information related to such patient.

#### 2218 § 4.1-1604. Criminal liability; exceptions.

2219 No agent or employee of a pharmaceutical processor or cannabis dispensing facility shall be prosecuted 2220 under Chapter 11 (§ 4.1-1100 et seq.) or § 18.2-248, 18.2-248.1, or 18.2-250 for possession or manufacture of 2221 marijuana or for possession, manufacture, or distribution of cannabis products, subject to any civil penalty, 2222 denied any right or privilege, or subject to any disciplinary action by a professional licensing board if such 2223 agent or employee (i) possessed or manufactured such marijuana for the purposes of producing cannabis 2224 products in accordance with the provisions of this chapter and Board regulations or (ii) possessed, 2225 manufactured, or distributed such cannabis products that are consistent with generally accepted cannabis 2226 industry standards in accordance with the provisions of this chapter and Board regulations.

#### 2227 § 5.1-13. Operation of aircraft while under influence of intoxicating liquors or drugs; reckless 2228 operation.

2229 Any person who shall operate operates any aircraft within the airspace over, above, or upon the lands or 2230 waters of this the Commonwealth, while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or of any narcotic or 2231 *marijuana* or any habit-forming drugs shall be is guilty of a felony and shall be confined in a state 2232 correctional facility not less than one nor more than five years, or, in the discretion of the court or jury trying 2233 the case, be confined in jail not exceeding twelve 12 months and fined not exceeding \$500, or both such fine 2234 and imprisonment.

2235 Any person who shall operate operates any aircraft within the airspace over, above, or upon the lands or 2236 waters of this the Commonwealth carelessly or heedlessly in willful or wanton disregard of the rights or 2237 safety of others, or without due caution and circumspection and in a manner so as to endanger any person or 2238 property, shall be is guilty of a misdemeanor. 2239

#### § 6.2-108. Financial services for licensed marijuana establishments.

2240 A. As used in this section, "licensed" and "marijuana establishment" have the same meanings as provided 2241 in § 4.1-600.

2242 B. A bank or credit union that provides a financial service to a licensed marijuana establishment, and the 2243 officers, directors, and employees of that bank or credit union, shall not be held liable pursuant to any state law or regulation solely for providing such a financial service or for further investing any income derived 2244 2245 from such a financial service.

2246 C. Nothing in this section shall require a bank or credit union to provide financial services to a licensed 2247 *marijuana establishment.* 

#### § 9.1-1101. Powers and duties of the Department.

2249 A. It shall be the responsibility of the Department to provide forensic laboratory services upon request of 2250 the Superintendent of State Police; the Chief Medical Examiner, the Assistant Chief Medical Examiners, and 2251 local medical examiners; any attorney for the Commonwealth; any chief of police, sheriff, or sergeant responsible for law enforcement in the jurisdiction served by him; any local fire department; the head of any 2252 2253 private police department that has been designated as a criminal justice agency by the Department of 2254 Criminal Justice Services as defined by § 9.1-101; or any state agency in any criminal matter. The 2255 Department shall provide such services to any federal investigatory agency within available resources.

2256 B. The Department shall:

2248

2257 1. Provide forensic laboratory services to all law-enforcement agencies throughout the Commonwealth 2258 and provide laboratory services, research, and scientific investigations for agencies of the Commonwealth as 2259 needed;

2. Establish and maintain a DNA testing program in accordance with Article 1.1 (§ 19.2-310.2 et seq.) of 2260 2261 Chapter 18 of Title 19.2 to determine identification characteristics specific to an individual; and

3. Test the accuracy of equipment used to test the blood alcohol content of breath at least once every six 2262 2263 months. Only equipment found to be accurate shall be used to test the blood alcohol content of breath; and

2264 4. Determine the proper methods for detecting the concentration of tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) in 2265 substances for the purposes of Chapter 11 (§ 4.1-1100 et seq.) of Title 4.1 and §§ 54.1-3401 and 54.1-3446.

2266 The testing methodology shall use post-decarboxylation testing or other equivalent method and shall consider
2267 the potential conversion of tetrahydrocannabinol acid (THC-A) into THC. The test result shall include the
2268 total available THC derived from the sum of the THC and THC-A content.

2269 C. The Department shall have the power and duty to:

1. Receive, administer, and expend all funds and other assistance available for carrying out the purposesof this chapter;

2272 2. Make and enter into all contracts and agreements necessary or incidental to the performance of its
2273 duties and execution of its powers under this chapter including, but not limited to, contracts with the United
2274 States, units of general local government or combinations thereof in Virginia or other states, and with
2275 agencies and departments of the Commonwealth; and

2276 3. Perform such other acts as may be necessary or convenient for the effective performance of its duties.

2277 D. The Director may appoint and employ a deputy director and such other personnel as are needed to 2278 carry out the duties and responsibilities conferred by this chapter.

## \$ 16.1-69.40:1. Traffic infractions within authority of traffic violations clerk; schedule of fines; prepayment of local ordinances.

2281 A. The Supreme Court shall by rule, which may from time to time be amended, supplemented or repealed, but which shall be uniform in its application throughout the Commonwealth, designate the traffic infractions 2282 2283 for which a pretrial waiver of appearance, plea of guilty and fine payment may be accepted. Such designated infractions shall include violations of §§ 46.2-830.1, 46.2-878.2 and 46.2-1242 or any parallel local 2284 2285 ordinances. Notwithstanding any rule of the Supreme Court, a person charged with a traffic offense that is listed as prepayable in the Uniform Fine Schedule may prepay his fines and costs without court appearance 2286 2287 whether or not he was involved in an accident. The prepayable fine amount for a violation of § 46.2-878.2 shall be \$200 plus an amount per mile-per-hour in excess of posted speed limits, as authorized in § 2288 2289 46.2-878.3.

2290 Such infractions shall not include:

- **2291** 1. Indictable offenses;
- 2292 2. [Repealed.]

3. Operation of a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor, *marijuana*, or a narcotic
 or habit-producing drug, or permitting another person, who is under the influence of intoxicating liquor,
 *marijuana*, or a narcotic or habit-producing drug, to operate a motor vehicle owned by the defendant or in his
 custody or control;

- **2297** 4. Reckless driving;
- **2298** 5. Leaving the scene of an accident;
- **2299** 6. Driving while under suspension or revocation of driving privileges;
- **2300** 7. Driving without being licensed to drive.
- **2301** 8. [Repealed.]

B. An appearance may be made in person or in writing by mail to a clerk of court or in person before a magistrate, prior to any date fixed for trial in court. Any person so appearing may enter a waiver of trial and a plea of guilty and pay the fine and any civil penalties established for the offense charged, with costs. He shall, prior to the plea, waiver, and payment, be informed of his right to stand trial, that his signature to a plea of guilty will have the same force and effect as a judgment of court, and that the record of conviction will be sent to the Commissioner of the Department of Motor Vehicles.

2308 C. The Supreme Court, upon the recommendation of the Committee on District Courts, shall establish a 2309 schedule, within the limits prescribed by law, of the amounts of fines and any civil penalties to be imposed, designating each infraction specifically. The schedule, which may from time to time be amended, 2310 2311 supplemented or repealed, shall be uniform in its application throughout the Commonwealth. Such schedule 2312 shall not be construed or interpreted so as to limit the discretion of any trial judge trying individual cases at 2313 the time fixed for trial. The rule of the Supreme Court establishing the schedule shall be prominently posted in the place where the fines are paid. Fines and costs shall be paid in accordance with the provisions of this 2314 2315 Code or any rules or regulations promulgated thereunder.

D. Fines imposed under local traffic infraction ordinances that do not parallel provisions of state law and 2316 2317 fulfill the criteria set out in subsection A may be prepayable in the manner set forth in subsection B if such ordinances appear in a schedule entered by order of the local circuit courts. The chief judge of each circuit 2318 2319 may establish a schedule of the fines, within the limits prescribed by local ordinances, to be imposed for prepayment of local ordinances designating each offense specifically. Upon the entry of such order it shall be 2320 forwarded within 10 days to the Supreme Court of Virginia by the clerk of the local circuit court. The 2321 schedule, which from time to time may be amended, supplemented or repealed, shall be uniform in its 2322 2323 application throughout the circuit. Such schedule shall not be construed or interpreted so as to limit the 2324 discretion of any trial judge trying individual cases at the time fixed for trial. This schedule shall be 2325 prominently posted in the place where fines are paid. Fines and costs shall be paid in accordance with the 2326 provisions of this Code or any rules or regulations promulgated thereunder.

**2327** § 16.1-260. Intake; petition; investigation.

2328 A. All matters alleged to be within the jurisdiction of the court shall be commenced by the filing of a petition, except as provided in subsection H and in § 16.1-259. The form and content of the petition shall be 2329 2330 as provided in § 16.1-262. No individual shall be required to obtain support services from the Department of Social Services prior to filing a petition seeking support for a child. Complaints, requests, and the processing 2331 2332 of petitions to initiate a case shall be the responsibility of the intake officer. However, (i) the attorney for the 2333 Commonwealth of the city or county may file a petition on his own motion with the clerk; (ii) designated 2334 nonattorney employees of the Department of Social Services may complete, sign, and file petitions and 2335 motions relating to the establishment, modification, or enforcement of support on forms approved by the 2336 Supreme Court of Virginia with the clerk; (iii) designated nonattorney employees of a local department of 2337 social services may complete, sign, and file with the clerk, on forms approved by the Supreme Court of 2338 Virginia, petitions for foster care review, petitions for permanency planning hearings, petitions to establish 2339 paternity, motions to establish or modify support, motions to amend or review an order, and motions for a 2340 rule to show cause; and (iv) any attorney may file petitions on behalf of his client with the clerk except 2341 petitions alleging that the subject of the petition is a child alleged to be in need of services, in need of 2342 supervision, or delinquent. Complaints alleging abuse or neglect of a child shall be referred initially to the 2343 local department of social services in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 15 (§ 63.2-1500 et seq.) of 2344 Title 63.2. Motions and other subsequent pleadings in a case shall be filed directly with the clerk. The intake officer or clerk with whom the petition or motion is filed shall inquire whether the petitioner is receiving 2345 2346 child support services or public assistance. No individual who is receiving support services or public 2347 assistance shall be denied the right to file a petition or motion to establish, modify, or enforce an order for 2348 support of a child. If the petitioner is seeking or receiving child support services or public assistance, the 2349 clerk, upon issuance of process, shall forward a copy of the petition or motion, together with notice of the 2350 court date, to the Division of Child Support Enforcement. If a petitioner is seeking to establish child support, 2351 the intake officer shall provide the petitioner information on the possible availability of medical assistance 2352 through the Family Access to Medical Insurance Security (FAMIS) plan or other government-sponsored 2353 coverage through the Department of Medical Assistance Services.

2354 B. The appearance of a child before an intake officer may be by (i) personal appearance before the intake officer or (ii) use of two-way electronic video and audio communication. If two-way electronic video and 2355 2356 audio communication is used, an intake officer may exercise all powers conferred by law. All 2357 communications and proceedings shall be conducted in the same manner as if the appearance were in person, 2358 and any documents filed may be transmitted by facsimile process. The facsimile may be served or executed 2359 by the officer or person to whom sent, and returned in the same manner, and with the same force, effect, 2360 authority, and liability as an original document. All signatures thereon shall be treated as original signatures. Any two-way electronic video and audio communication system used for an appearance shall meet the 2361 2362 standards as set forth in subsection B of § 19.2-3.1.

When the court service unit of any court receives a complaint alleging facts which may be sufficient to
invoke the jurisdiction of the court pursuant to § 16.1-241, the unit, through an intake officer, may proceed
informally to make such adjustment as is practicable without the filing of a petition or may authorize a
petition to be filed by any complainant having sufficient knowledge of the matter to establish probable cause
for the issuance of the petition.

2368 An intake officer may proceed informally on a complaint alleging a child is in need of services, in need of 2369 supervision, or delinquent only if the juvenile (a) is not alleged to have committed a violent juvenile felony or 2370 (b) has not previously been proceeded against informally or adjudicated delinquent for an offense that would 2371 be a felony if committed by an adult. A petition alleging that a juvenile committed a violent juvenile felony 2372 shall be filed with the court. A petition alleging that a juvenile is delinquent for an offense that would be a 2373 felony if committed by an adult shall be filed with the court if the juvenile had previously been proceeded 2374 against informally by intake or had been adjudicated delinquent for an offense that would be a felony if 2375 committed by an adult.

2376 If a juvenile is alleged to be a truant pursuant to a complaint filed in accordance with § 22.1-258 and the 2377 attendance officer has provided documentation to the intake officer that the relevant school division has 2378 complied with the provisions of  $\S$  22.1-258, then the intake officer shall file a petition with the court. The 2379 intake officer may defer filing the petition and proceed informally by developing a truancy plan, provided 2380 that (1) the juvenile has not previously been proceeded against informally or adjudicated in need of 2381 supervision on more than two occasions for failure to comply with compulsory school attendance as provided 2382 in § 22.1-254 and (2) the immediately previous informal action or adjudication occurred at least three 2383 calendar years prior to the current complaint. The juvenile and his parent or parents, guardian, or other person 2384 standing in loco parentis must agree, in writing, for the development of a truancy plan. The truancy plan may include requirements that the juvenile and his parent or parents, guardian, or other person standing in loco 2385 2386 parentis participate in such programs, cooperate in such treatment, or be subject to such conditions and 2387 limitations as necessary to ensure the juvenile's compliance with compulsory school attendance as provided 2388 in § 22.1-254. The intake officer may refer the juvenile to the appropriate public agency for the purpose of

developing a truancy plan using an interagency interdisciplinary team approach. The team may include qualified personnel who are reasonably available from the appropriate department of social services, community services board, local school division, court service unit, and other appropriate and available public and private agencies and may be the family assessment and planning team established pursuant to § 2.2-5207. If at the end of the deferral period the juvenile has not successfully completed the truancy plan or the truancy program, then the intake officer shall file the petition.

2395 Whenever informal action is taken as provided in this subsection on a complaint alleging that a child is in 2396 need of services, in need of supervision, or delinguent, the intake officer shall (A) develop a plan for the 2397 juvenile, which may include restitution, the performance of community service, or on a complaint alleging 2398 that a child has committed a delinquent act other than an act that would be a felony or a Class I misdemeanor 2399 if committed by an adult and with the consent of the juvenile's parent or legal guardian, referral to a youth 2400 justice diversion program established pursuant to § 16.1-309.11, based upon community resources and the 2401 circumstances which resulted in the complaint, (B) create an official record of the action taken by the intake officer and file such record in the juvenile's case file, and (C) advise the juvenile and the juvenile's parent, 2402 2403 guardian, or other person standing in loco parentis and the complainant that any subsequent complaint 2404 alleging that the child is in need of supervision or delinquent based upon facts which may be sufficient to invoke the jurisdiction of the court pursuant to § 16.1-241, or in the case of a referral to a youth justice 2405 2406 diversion program established pursuant to § 16.1-309.11, that any subsequent report from the youth justice 2407 diversion program alleging that the juvenile failed to comply with the youth justice diversion program's 2408 sentence within 180 days of the sentencing date, may result in the filing of a petition with the court.

2409 C. The intake officer shall accept and file a petition in which it is alleged that (i) the custody, visitation, or 2410 support of a child is the subject of controversy or requires determination, (ii) a person has deserted, 2411 abandoned, or failed to provide support for any person in violation of law, (iii) a child or such child's parent, 2412 guardian, legal custodian, or other person standing in loco parentis is entitled to treatment, rehabilitation, or 2413 other services which are required by law, (iv) family abuse has occurred and a protective order is being sought pursuant to § 16.1-253.1, 16.1-253.4, or 16.1-279.1, or (v) an act of violence, force, or threat has 2414 occurred, a protective order is being sought pursuant to § 19.2-152.8, 19.2-152.9, or 19.2-152.10, and either 2415 the alleged victim or the respondent is a juvenile. If any such complainant does not file a petition, the intake 2416 2417 officer may file it. In cases in which a child is alleged to be abused, neglected, in need of services, in need of 2418 supervision, or delinquent, if the intake officer believes that probable cause does not exist, or that the 2419 authorization of a petition will not be in the best interest of the family or juvenile or that the matter may be 2420 effectively dealt with by some agency other than the court, he may refuse to authorize the filing of a petition. 2421 The intake officer shall provide to a person seeking a protective order pursuant to § 16.1-253.1, 16.1-253.4, 2422 or 16.1-279.1 a written explanation of the conditions, procedures and time limits applicable to the issuance of protective orders pursuant to § 16.1-253.1, 16.1-253.4, or 16.1-279.1. If the person is seeking a protective 2423 2424 order pursuant to § 19.2-152.8, 19.2-152.9, or 19.2-152.10, the intake officer shall provide a written 2425 explanation of the conditions, procedures, and time limits applicable to the issuance of protective orders pursuant to § 19.2-152.8, 19.2-152.9, or 19.2-152.10. 2426

D. Prior to the filing of any petition alleging that a child is in need of supervision, the matter shall be 2427 2428 reviewed by an intake officer who shall determine whether the petitioner and the child alleged to be in need 2429 of supervision have utilized or attempted to utilize treatment and services available in the community and have exhausted all appropriate nonjudicial remedies which are available to them. When the intake officer 2430 determines that the parties have not attempted to utilize available treatment or services or have not exhausted 2431 2432 all appropriate nonjudicial remedies which are available, he shall refer the petitioner and the child alleged to 2433 be in need of supervision to the appropriate agency, treatment facility, or individual to receive treatment or 2434 services, and a petition shall not be filed. Only after the intake officer determines that the parties have made a 2435 reasonable effort to utilize available community treatment or services may he permit the petition to be filed.

2436 E. If the intake officer refuses to authorize a petition relating to an offense that if committed by an adult 2437 would be punishable as a Class 1 misdemeanor or as a felony, when such refusal is based solely upon a finding that no probable cause exists, the complainant shall be notified in writing at that time of the 2438 2439 complainant's right to apply to a magistrate for a warrant. The application for a warrant to the magistrate shall 2440 be filed within 10 days of the issuance of the written notification. The written notification shall indicate that 2441 the intake officer made a finding that no probable cause exists and shall provide notice that the complainant 2442 has 10 days to apply for a warrant to the magistrate. The complainant shall provide the magistrate with a copy of the written notification upon application to the magistrate. If a magistrate determines that probable cause 2443 exists, he shall issue a warrant returnable to the juvenile and domestic relations district court. The warrant 2444 2445 shall be delivered forthwith to the juvenile court, and the intake officer shall accept and file a petition 2446 founded upon the warrant. If the court is closed and the magistrate finds that the criteria for detention or 2447 shelter care set forth in § 16.1-248.1 have been satisfied, the juvenile may be detained pursuant to the warrant 2448 issued in accordance with this subsection. If the intake officer refuses to authorize a petition relating to a 2449 child in need of services or in need of supervision, a status offense, or a misdemeanor other than Class 1, his

2450 decision is final. If the intake officer refuses to authorize a petition relating to an offense that if committed by

an adult would be punishable as a Class 1 misdemeanor or as a felony when such refusal is based upon a
finding that (i) probable cause exists, but that (ii) the matter is appropriate for diversion, his decision is final
and the complainant shall not have a right to apply to a magistrate for a warrant.

- 2454 Upon delivery to the juvenile court of a warrant issued pursuant to subdivision 2 of § 16.1-256, the intake 2455 officer shall accept and file a petition founded upon the warrant.
- F. The intake officer shall notify the attorney for the Commonwealth of the filing of any petition whichalleges facts of an offense which would be a felony if committed by an adult.

G. Notwithstanding the provisions of Article 12 (§ 16.1-299 et seq.), the intake officer shall file a report with the division superintendent of the school division in which any student who is the subject of a petition alleging that such student who is a juvenile has committed an act, wherever committed, which would be a crime if committed by an adult, or that such student who is an adult has committed a crime and is alleged to be within the jurisdiction of the court. The report shall notify the division superintendent of the filing of the petition and the nature of the offense, if the violation involves:

- **2464** 1. A firearm offense pursuant to Article 4 (§ 18.2-279 et seq.), 5 (§ 18.2-288 et seq.), 6 (§ 18.2-299 et seq.), 6.1 (§ 18.2-307.1 et seq.), or 7 (§ 18.2-308.1 et seq.) of Chapter 7 of Title 18.2;
- 2466 2. Homicide, pursuant to Article 1 (§ 18.2-30 et seq.) of Chapter 4 of Title 18.2;

- 7. Arson and related crimes, pursuant to Article 1 (§ 18.2-77 et seq.) of Chapter 5 of Title 18.2;
- **2475** 8. Burglary and related offenses, pursuant to §§ 18.2-89 through 18.2-93;
- **2476** 9. Robbery pursuant to § 18.2-58;
- 10. Prohibited criminal street gang activity pursuant to § 18.2-46.2;

- 2482 The failure to provide information regarding the school in which the student who is the subject of the2483 petition may be enrolled shall not be grounds for refusing to file a petition.
- The information provided to a division superintendent pursuant to this section may be disclosed only asprovided in § 16.1-305.2.
- 2486 H. The filing of a petition shall not be necessary:

1. In the case of violations of the traffic laws, including offenses involving bicycles, hitchhiking and other pedestrian offenses, game and fish laws, or a violation of the ordinance of any city regulating surfing or any ordinance establishing curfew violations, animal control violations, or littering violations. In such cases the court may proceed on a summons issued by the officer investigating the violation in the same manner as provided by law for adults. Additionally, an officer investigating a motor vehicle accident may, at the scene of the accident or at any other location where a juvenile who is involved in such an accident may be located, proceed on a summons in lieu of filing a petition.

2494 2. In the case of seeking consent to apply for the issuance of a work permit pursuant to subsection H of § 2495 16.1-241.

2496 3. In the case of a misdemeanor violation of § 18.2-266, 18.2-266.1, or 29.1-738 or the commission of any 2497 other alcohol-related offense, provided that the juvenile is released to the custody of a parent or legal 2498 guardian pending the initial court date. The officer releasing a juvenile to the custody of a parent or legal 2499 guardian shall issue a summons to the juvenile and shall also issue a summons requiring the parent or legal 2500 guardian to appear before the court with the juvenile. Disposition of the charge shall be in the manner provided in § 16.1-278.8, 16.1-278.8:01, or 16.1-278.9. If the juvenile so charged with a violation of § 2501 2502 18.2-51.4, 18.2-266, 18.2-266.1, 18.2-272, or 29.1-738 refuses to provide a sample of blood or breath or 2503 samples of both blood and breath for chemical analysis pursuant to §§ 18.2-268.1 through 18.2-268.12 or 2504 29.1-738.2, the provisions of these sections shall be followed except that the magistrate shall authorize 2505 execution of the warrant as a summons. The summons shall be served on a parent or legal guardian and the 2506 juvenile, and a copy of the summons shall be forwarded to the court in which the violation is to be tried. 2507 When a violation of § 4.1-305 or 4.1-1105 is charged by summons, the juvenile shall be entitled to have the 2508 charge referred to intake for consideration of informal proceedings pursuant to subsection B, provided that 2509 such right is exercised by written notification to the clerk not later than 10 days prior to trial. At the time such 2510 summons alleging a violation of § 4.1-305 or 4.1-1105 is served, the officer shall also serve upon the juvenile

2511 written notice of the right to have the charge referred to intake on a form approved by the Supreme Court and

2512 make return of such service to the court. If the officer fails to make such service or return, the court shall 2513 dismiss the summons without prejudice.

However, in the case of a juvenile adjudicated delinquent on the basis of an 2532 act committed on or after January 1, 2000, which would be (a) a felony if committed by an adult, or (b) a violation under Article 1 (§ 18.2-247 et seq.) or Article 1.1 (§ 18.2-265.1 et seq.) of Chapter 7 of Title 18.2 2533 and such offense would be punishable as a Class 1 or Class 2 misdemeanor if committed by an adult, or (c) a 2534 2535 violation of § 4.1-1105, the court shall order the juvenile to undergo a drug screening. If the drug screening 2536 indicates that the juvenile has a substance abuse or dependence problem, an assessment shall be completed by a certified substance abuse counselor as defined in § 54.1-3500 employed by the Department of Juvenile 2537 2538 Justice or by a locally operated court services unit or by an individual employed by or currently under 2539 contract to such agencies and who is specifically trained to conduct such assessments under the supervision 2540 of such counselor.

B. The court also shall, on motion of the attorney for the Commonwealth with the consent of the victim, or may in its discretion, require the preparation of a victim impact statement in accordance with the provisions of § 19.2-299.1 if the court determines that the victim may have suffered significant physical, psychological, or economic injury as a result of the violation of law.

If a court has found facts which would justify a finding that a child at least 13 years of age at the time of the offense is delinquent and such finding involves (i) a violation of § 18.2-266 or of a similar ordinance of 2548 any county, city, or town; (ii) a refusal to take a breath test in violation of § 18.2-268.2; (iii) a felony violation 2549 of Chapter 11 (§ 4.1-1100 et seq.) of Title 4.1 or § 18.2-248, 18.2-248.1, or 18.2-250; (iv) a misdemeanor 2550 violation of Chapter 11 (§ 4.1-1100 et seq.) of Title 4.1 or § 18.2-248, 18.2-248, or 18.2-250 or a violation 2551 of § 4.1-1105; (v) the unlawful purchase, possession, or consumption of alcohol in violation of § 4.1-305 or 2552 the unlawful drinking or possession of alcoholic beverages in or on public school grounds in violation of § 2553 2554 4.1-309; (vi) public intoxication in violation of § 18.2-388 or a similar ordinance of a county, city, or town; 2555 (vii) the unlawful use or possession of a handgun or possession of a "streetsweeper" as defined below; or 2556 (viii) a violation of § 18.2-83, the court shall order, in addition to any other penalty that it may impose as 2557 provided by law for the offense, that the child be denied a driver's license. In addition to any other penalty authorized by this section, if the offense involves a violation designated under clause (i) and the child was 2558 2559 transporting a person 17 years of age or younger, the court shall impose the additional fine and order community service as provided in § 18.2-270. If the offense involves a violation designated under clause (i), 2560 2561 (ii), (iii), or (viii), the denial of a driver's license shall be for a period of one year or until the juvenile reaches 2562 the age of 17, whichever is longer, for a first such offense or for a period of one year or until the juvenile 2563 reaches the age of 18, whichever is longer, for a second or subsequent such offense. If the offense involves a violation designated under clause (iv), (v), or (vi) the denial of driving privileges shall be for a period of six 2564 months unless the offense is committed by a child under the age of 16 years and three months, in which case 2565 the child's ability to apply for a driver's license shall be delayed for a period of six months following the date 2566 2567 he reaches the age of 16 and three months. If the offense involves a first violation designated under clause (v) 2568 or (vi), the court shall impose the license sanction and may enter a judgment of guilt or, without entering a 2569 judgment of guilt, may defer disposition of the delinquency charge until such time as the court disposes of the 2570 case pursuant to subsection F. If the offense involves a violation designated under clause (iii) or (iv), the 2571 court shall impose the license sanction and shall dispose of the delinquency charge pursuant to the provisions

2572 of this chapter or § 18.2-251. If the offense involves a violation designated under clause (vii), the denial of

**2573** driving privileges shall be for a period of not less than 30 days, except when the offense involves possession **2574** of a concealed handgun or a striker 12, commonly called a "streetsweeper," or any semi-automatic folding

2575 stock shotgun of like kind with a spring tension drum magazine capable of holding 12 shotgun shells, in

2576 which case the denial of driving privileges shall be for a period of two years unless the offense is committed

2577 by a child under the age of 16 years and three months, in which event the child's ability to apply for a driver's 2578 license shall be delayed for a period of two years following the date he reaches the age of 16 and three

2578 license s2579 months.

A1. If a court finds that a child at least 13 years of age has failed to comply with school attendance and
meeting requirements as provided in § 22.1-258, the court shall order the denial of the child's driving
privileges for a period of not less than 30 days. If such failure to comply involves a child under the age of 16
years and three months, the child's ability to apply for a driver's license shall be delayed for a period of not
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If the court finds a second or subsequent such offense, it may order the denial of a driver's license for a period of one year or until the juvenile reaches the age of 18, whichever is longer, or delay the child's ability to apply for a driver's license for a period of one year following the date he reaches the age of 16 and three months, as may be appropriate.

A2. If a court finds that a child at least 13 years of age has refused to take a blood test in violation of §
18.2-268.2, the court shall order that the child be denied a driver's license for a period of one year or until the
juvenile reaches the age of 17, whichever is longer, for a first such offense or for a period of one year or until
the juvenile reaches the age of 18, whichever is longer, for a second or subsequent such offense.

B. Any child who has a driver's license at the time of the offense or at the time of the court's finding as
provided in subsection A1 or A2 shall be ordered to surrender his driver's license, which shall be held in the
physical custody of the court during any period of license denial.

C. The court shall report any order issued under this section to the Department of Motor Vehicles, which shall preserve a record thereof. The report and the record shall include a statement as to whether the child was represented by or waived counsel or whether the order was issued pursuant to subsection A1 or A2. Notwithstanding the provisions of Article 12 (§ 16.1-299 et seq.) or the provisions of Title 46.2, this record shall be available only to all law-enforcement officers, attorneys for the Commonwealth and courts. No other record of the proceeding shall be forwarded to the Department of Motor Vehicles unless the proceeding results in an adjudication of guilt pursuant to subsection F.

The Department of Motor Vehicles shall refuse to issue a driver's license to any child denied a driver's license until such time as is stipulated in the court order or until notification by the court of withdrawal of the order of denial under subsection E.

D. If the finding as to the child involves a violation designated under clause (i), (ii), (iii) or (vi) of subsection A or a violation designated under subsection A2, the child may be referred to a certified alcohol safety action program in accordance with § 18.2-271.1 upon such terms and conditions as the court may set forth. If the finding as to such child involves a violation designated under clause (iii), (iv), (v), (vii) or (viii) of subsection A, such child may be referred to appropriate rehabilitative or educational services upon such terms and conditions as the court may set forth.

The court, in its discretion and upon a demonstration of hardship, may authorize the use of a restricted 2612 2613 permit to operate a motor vehicle by any child who has a driver's license at the time of the offense or at the 2614 time of the court's finding as provided in subsection A1 or A2 for any of the purposes set forth in subsection 2615 E of § 18.2-271.1 or for travel to and from school, except that no restricted license shall be issued for travel to 2616 and from home and school when school-provided transportation is available and no restricted license shall be 2617 issued if the finding as to such child involves a violation designated under clause (iii) or (iv) of subsection A, 2618 or if it involves a second or subsequent violation of any offense designated in subsection A, a second finding 2619 by the court of failure to comply with school attendance and meeting requirements as provided in subsection 2620 A1, or a second or subsequent finding by the court of a refusal to take a blood test as provided in subsection 2621 A2. The issuance of the restricted permit shall be set forth within the court order, a copy of which shall be 2622 provided to the child, and shall specifically enumerate the restrictions imposed and contain such information regarding the child as is reasonably necessary to identify him. The child may operate a motor vehicle under 2623 2624 the court order in accordance with its terms. Any child who operates a motor vehicle in violation of any 2625 restrictions imposed pursuant to this section is guilty of a violation of § 46.2-301.

E. Upon petition made at least 90 days after issuance of the order, the court may review and withdraw any order of denial of a driver's license if for a first such offense or finding as provided in subsection A1 or A2.
For a second or subsequent such offense or finding, the order may not be reviewed and withdrawn until one year after its issuance.

F. If the finding as to such child involves a first violation designated under clause (vii) of subsection A, upon fulfillment of the terms and conditions prescribed by the court and after the child's driver's license has been restored, the court shall or, in the event the violation resulted in the injury or death of any person or if

2652 "Predicate criminal act" means (i) an act of violence; (ii) any violation of § 18.2-42, 18.2-46.3, 18.2-56.1, 2653 18.2-57, 18.2-57.2, 18.2-59, 18.2-83, 18.2-95, 18.2-103.1, 18.2-108.1, 18.2-121, 18.2-127, 18.2-128, 2654 18.2-137, 18.2-138, 18.2-146, 18.2-147, 18.2-248.01, 18.2-248.03, 18.2-255, 18.2-255.2, 18.2-287.4, 18.2-300, 18.2-308.1, 18.2-308.2, 18.2-308.2:01, 18.2-308.4, or 18.2-357.1; (iii) a felony violation of § 2655 2656 18.2-60.3, 18.2-346.01, 18.2-348, or 18.2-349; (iv) a felony violation of § 4.1-1101- or 18.2-248- or 18.2-248.1 or a conspiracy to commit a felony violation of § 4.1-1101, or 18.2-248, or 18.2-248.1; (v) any 2657 violation of a local ordinance adopted pursuant to § 15.2-1812.2; or (vi) any substantially similar offense 2658 under the laws of another state or territory of the United States, the District of Columbia, or the United States. 2659

\$ 18.2-247. Use of terms "controlled substances," "Schedules I, II, III, IV, V, and VI," "imitation
 controlled substance," and "counterfeit controlled substance" in Title 18.2.

A. Wherever the terms "controlled substances" and "Schedules I, II, III, IV, V, and VI" are used in Title 18.2, such terms refer to those terms as they are used or defined in the Drug Control Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.).

2665 B. The term "imitation controlled substance" when used in this article means (i) a counterfeit controlled
2666 substance or (ii) a pill, capsule, tablet, or substance in any form whatsoever which that is not a controlled
2667 substance subject to abuse, and:

1. Which by overall dosage unit appearance, including color, shape, size, marking, and packaging or by representations made, would cause the likelihood that such a pill, capsule, tablet, or substance in any other form whatsoever will be mistaken for a controlled substance unless such substance was introduced into commerce prior to the initial introduction into commerce of the controlled substance which it is alleged to imitate; or

2673 2. Which by express or implied representations purports to act like a controlled substance as a stimulant or
2674 depressant of the central nervous system and which is not commonly used or recognized for use in that
2675 particular formulation for any purpose other than for such stimulant or depressant effect, unless marketed,
2676 promoted, or sold as permitted by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.

C. In determining whether a pill, capsule, tablet, or substance in any other form whatsoever, is an "imitation controlled substance," there shall be considered, in addition to all other relevant factors, comparisons with accepted methods of marketing for legitimate nonprescription drugs for medicinal purposes rather than for drug abuse or any similar nonmedicinal use, including consideration of the packaging of the drug and its appearance in overall finished dosage form, promotional materials or representations, oral or written, concerning the drug, and the methods of distribution of the drug and where and how it is sold to the public.

2684 D. The term "marijuana" when used in this article means any part of a plant of the genus Cannabis, whether growing or not, its seeds or resin; and every compound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture, or 2685 2686 preparation of such plant, its seeds, its resin, or any extract containing one or more cannabinoids. "Marijuana" does not include (i) the mature stalks of such plant, fiber produced from such stalk, oil or cake made from the 2687 seed of such plant, unless such stalks, fiber, oil or cake is combined with other parts of plants of the genus 2688 Cannabis; (ii) industrial hemp, as defined in § 3.2-4112, that is possessed by a person registered pursuant to 2689 2690 subsection A of § 3.2-4115 or his agent; (iii) industrial hemp, as defined in § 3.2-4112, that is possessed by a 2691 person who holds a hemp producer license issued by the U.S. Department of Agriculture pursuant to 7 C.F.R. Part 990; (iv) a hemp product, as defined in § 3.2-4112; (v) an industrial hemp extract, as defined in § 2692 3.2-5145.1; or (vi) any substance containing a tetrahydrocannabinol isomer, ester, ether, salt or salts of such 2693

isomer, ester, or ether that has been placed by the Board of Pharmacy into one of the schedules set forth in the
 Drug Control Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.) pursuant to § 54.1-3443.

2696 E. The term "counterfeit controlled substance" means a controlled substance that, without authorization,
2697 bears, is packaged in a container or wrapper that bears, or is otherwise labeled to bear, the trademark, trade
2698 name, or other identifying mark, imprint or device or any likeness thereof, of a drug manufacturer, processor,
2699 packer, or distributor other than the manufacturer, processor, packer, or distributor who did in fact so
2700 manufacture, process, pack or distribute such drug.

F. E. The term "tetrahydrocannabinol" means any naturally occurring or synthetic tetrahydrocannabinol,
including its salts, isomers, and salts of isomers whenever the existence of such salts, isomers, and salts of
isomers is possible within the specific chemical designation and any preparation, mixture, or substance
containing, or mixed or infused with, any detectable amount of tetrahydrocannabinol. For the purposes of this
definition, "isomer" means the optical, position, and geometric isomers.

2706 G. F. The term "total tetrahydrocannabinol" means the sum, after the application of any necessary
 2707 conversion factor, of the percentage by weight of tetrahydrocannabinol and the percentage by weight of tetrahydrocannabinolic acid.

**2709** H. G. The Department of Forensic Science shall determine the proper methods for detecting the concentration of tetrahydrocannabinol in substances for the purposes of this title, Chapter 11 (§ 4.1-1100 et seq.) of Title 4.1, and § 54.1-3401. The testing methodology shall use post-decarboxylation testing or other equivalent method and shall consider the potential conversion of tetrahydrocannabinolic acid into tetrahydrocannabinol.

# § 18.2-248. Manufacturing, selling, giving, distributing, or possessing with intent to manufacture, sell, give, or distribute a controlled substance or an imitation controlled substance prohibited; penalties.

A. Except as authorized in the Drug Control Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.), it shall be *is* unlawful for any person to manufacture, sell, give, distribute, or possess with intent to manufacture, sell, give or distribute a controlled substance or an imitation controlled substance.

2720 B. In determining whether any person intends to manufacture, sell, give or distribute an imitation 2721 controlled substance, the court may consider, in addition to all other relevant evidence, whether any 2722 distribution or attempted distribution of such pill, capsule, tablet or substance in any other form whatsoever 2723 included an exchange of or a demand for money or other property as consideration, and, if so, whether the 2724 amount of such consideration was substantially greater than the reasonable value of such pill, capsule, tablet 2725 or substance in any other form whatsoever, considering the actual chemical composition of such pill, capsule, 2726 tablet or substance in any other form whatsoever and, where applicable, the price at which over-the-counter 2727 substances of like chemical composition sell.

2728 C. Except as provided in subsection C1, any person who violates this section with respect to a controlled 2729 substance classified in Schedule I or II shall upon conviction be imprisoned for not less than five nor more 2730 than 40 years and fined not more than \$500,000. Upon a second conviction of such a violation, and it is 2731 alleged in the warrant, indictment, or information that the person has been before convicted of such an 2732 offense or of a substantially similar offense in any other jurisdiction, which offense would be a felony if 2733 committed in the Commonwealth, and such prior conviction occurred before the date of the offense alleged in 2734 the warrant, indictment, or information, any such person may, in the discretion of the court or jury imposing the sentence, be sentenced to imprisonment for life or for any period not less than five years, three years of 2735 2736 which shall be a mandatory minimum term of imprisonment to be served consecutively with any other 2737 sentence, and he shall be fined not more than \$500,000.

When a person is convicted of a third or subsequent offense under this subsection and it is alleged in the warrant, indictment or information that he has been before convicted of two or more such offenses or of substantially similar offenses in any other jurisdiction which offenses would be felonies if committed in the Commonwealth and such prior convictions occurred before the date of the offense alleged in the warrant, indictment, or information, he shall be sentenced to imprisonment for life or for a period of not less than 10 years, 10 years of which shall be a mandatory minimum term of imprisonment to be served consecutively with any other sentence, and he shall be fined not more than \$500,000.

Any person who manufactures, sells, gives, distributes or possesses with the intent to manufacture, sell, give, or distribute the following is guilty of a felony punishable by a fine of not more than \$1 million and imprisonment for five years to life, five years of which shall be a mandatory minimum term of imprisonment to be served consecutively with any other sentence:

- 1. 100 grams or more of a mixture or substance containing a detectable amount of heroin;
- 2750 2. 500 grams or more of a mixture or substance containing a detectable amount of:

a. Coca leaves, except coca leaves and extracts of coca leaves from which cocaine, ecgonine, and
derivatives of ecgonine or their salts have been removed;

- b. Cocaine, its salts, optical and geometric isomers, and salts of isomers;
- c. Ecgonine, its derivatives, their salts, isomers, and salts of isomers; or
- d. Any compound, mixture, or preparation that contains any quantity of any of the substances referred to

**2756** in subdivisions  $\frac{2a}{a}$  through  $\frac{2e}{a}$ , b, and c;

3. 250 grams or more of a mixture or substance described in subdivisions  $\frac{2a}{2a} 2a$  through  $\frac{2d}{2d} d$  that contain cocaine base; or

4. 10 grams or more of methamphetamine, its salts, isomers, or salts of its isomers or 20 grams or more of
a mixture or substance containing a detectable amount of methamphetamine, its salts, isomers, or salts of its
isomers.

The mandatory minimum term of imprisonment to be imposed for a violation of this subsection shall not be applicable if the court finds that:

a. The person does not have a prior conviction for an offense listed in subsection C of § 17.1-805;

b. The person did not use violence or credible threats of violence or possess a firearm or other dangerousweapon in connection with the offense or induce another participant in the offense to do so;

c. The offense did not result in death or serious bodily injury to any person;

d. The person was not an organizer, leader, manager, or supervisor of others in the offense, and was not engaged in a continuing criminal enterprise as defined in subsection I; and

e. Not later than the time of the sentencing hearing, the person has truthfully provided to the Commonwealth all information and evidence the person has concerning the offense or offenses that were part of the same course of conduct or of a common scheme or plan, but the fact that the person has no relevant or useful other information to provide or that the Commonwealth already is aware of the information shall not preclude a determination by the court that the defendant has complied with this requirement.

2775 C1. Any person who violates this section with respect to the manufacturing of methamphetamine, its salts, isomers, or salts of its isomers or less than 200 grams of a mixture or substance containing a detectable 2776 2777 amount of methamphetamine, its salts, isomers, or salts of its isomers shall, upon conviction, be imprisoned for not less than 10 nor more than 40 years and fined not more than \$500,000. Upon a second conviction of 2778 2779 such a violation, any such person may, in the discretion of the court or jury imposing the sentence, be sentenced to imprisonment for life or for any period not less than 10 years, and be fined not more than 2780 \$500,000. #### § 18.2-248.01. Transporting controlled substances into the Commonwealth; penalty.

No individual shall be subject to arrest or prosecution for the unlawful purchase, possession, or2987consumption of alcohol pursuant to § 4.1-305, unlawful purchase, possession, or consumption of marijuana2988pursuant to § 4.1-1105.1 4.1-1105, possession of a controlled substance pursuant to § 18.2-250, intoxication2989in public pursuant to § 18.2-388, or possession of controlled paraphernalia pursuant to § 54.1-3466 if:

2990 1. Such individual (i) in good faith, seeks or obtains emergency medical attention (a) for himself, if he is 2991 experiencing an overdose, or (b) for another individual, if such other individual is experiencing an overdose; 2992 (ii) is experiencing an overdose and another individual, in good faith, seeks or obtains emergency medical 2993 attention for such individual, by contemporaneously reporting such overdose to a firefighter, as defined in § 2994 65.2-102, emergency medical services personnel, as defined in § 32.1-111.1, a law-enforcement officer, as 2995 defined in § 9.1-101, or an emergency 911 system; or (iii) in good faith, renders emergency care or 2996 assistance, including cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) or the administration of naloxone or other opioid 2997 antagonist for overdose reversal, to an individual experiencing an overdose while another individual seeks or 2998 obtains emergency medical attention in accordance with this subdivision;

2999 2. Such individual remains at the scene of the overdose or at any alternative location to which he or the3000 person requiring emergency medical attention has been transported until a law-enforcement officer responds

**3001** to the report of an overdose. If no law-enforcement officer is present at the scene of the overdose or at the **3002** alternative location, then such individual shall cooperate with law enforcement as otherwise set forth herein;

3003 3. Such individual identifies himself to the law-enforcement officer who responds to the report of the 3004 overdose; and

4. The evidence for the prosecution of an offense enumerated in this subsection was obtained as a result ofthe individual seeking or obtaining emergency medical attention or rendering emergency care or assistance.

C. The provisions of this section shall not apply to any person who seeks or obtains emergency medical attention for himself or another individual, to a person experiencing an overdose when another individual seeks or obtains emergency medical attention for him, or to a person who renders emergency care or assistance to an individual experiencing an overdose while another person seeks or obtains emergency medical attention during the execution of a search warrant or during the conduct of a lawful search or a lawful arrest.

3013 D. This section does not establish protection from arrest or prosecution for any individual or offense other 3014 than those listed in subsection B.

3015 E. No law-enforcement officer acting in good faith shall be found liable for false arrest if it is later 3016 determined that the person arrested was immune from prosecution under this section.

No person employed by a nursing home, hospice, hospice facility, or assisted living facility and authorized to possess, distribute, or administer medications to patients or residents shall be prosecuted under Chapter 11 (§ 4.1-1100 et seq.) of Title 4.1 or § 18.2-248, 18.2-248.1, or 18.2-250 for the possession or distribution of cannabis oil for the purposes of storing, dispensing, or administering cannabis oil to a patient or resident who has been issued a valid written certification for the use of cannabis oil in accordance with § 4.1-1601.

## § 18.2-251.1:3. Possession or distribution of cannabis oil, or industrial hemp; laboratories; 3034 Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, Department of Law employees.

The trial judge or court trying the case of any person found guilty of a criminal violation of any law 3050 concerning the use, in any manner, of drugs, controlled substances, narcotics, marijuana, noxious chemical 3051 3052 substances and like substances shall condition any suspended sentence by first requiring such person to agree to undergo a substance abuse screening pursuant to § 18.2-251.01 and to submit to such periodic substance 3053 3054 abuse testing, to include alcohol testing, as may be directed by the court. Such testing shall be conducted by the supervising probation agency or by personnel of any program or agency approved by the supervising 3055 probation agency. Whenever any person who has not previously been convicted of any criminal offense under this article 3068 or under any statute of the United States or of any state relating to narcotic drugs, marijuana, stimulant, 3069 depressant, or hallucinogenic drugs or has not previously had a proceeding against him for violation of such 3070 an offense dismissed as provided in § 18.2-251 is found guilty of violating any law concerning the use, in any 3071 manner, of drugs, controlled substances, narcotics, marijuana, noxious chemical substances, and like 3072 substances, the judge or court shall require such person to undergo a substance abuse screening pursuant to § 3073 18.2-251.01 and to submit to such periodic substance abuse testing, to include alcohol testing, as may be 3074 directed by the court. The cost of such testing ordered by the court shall be paid by the Commonwealth and taxed as a part of the costs of the criminal proceedings. The judge or court shall also order the person to 3075 3076 undergo such treatment or education for substance abuse, if available, as the judge or court deems appropriate 3077 based upon consideration of the substance abuse assessment. The treatment or education shall be provided by 3078 a program or agency licensed by the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services or by a 3079 similar program or services available through the Department of Corrections if the court imposes a sentence 3080 of one year or more or, if the court imposes a sentence of 12 months or less, by a similar program or services 3081 available through a local or regional jail, a local community-based probation services agency established 3082 pursuant to § 9.1-174, or an ASAP program certified by the Commission on VASAP.

3083 B. The court trying the case of any person alleged to have committed any criminal offense designated by 3084 this article or by the Drug Control Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.) or in any other criminal case in which the commission of the offense was motivated by or closely related to the use of drugs and determined by the 3085 3086 court, pursuant to a substance abuse screening and assessment, to be in need of treatment for the use of drugs 3087 may commit, based upon a consideration of the substance abuse assessment, such person, upon his 3088 conviction, to any facility for the treatment of persons with substance abuse, licensed by the Department of 3089 Behavioral Health and Developmental Services, if space is available in such facility, for a period of time not 3090 in excess of the maximum term of imprisonment specified as the penalty for conviction of such offense or, if sentence was determined by a jury, not in excess of the term of imprisonment as set by such jury. 3091 3092 Confinement under such commitment shall be, in all regards, treated as confinement in a penal institution and 3093 the person so committed may be convicted of escape if he leaves the place of commitment without authority. 3094 A charge of escape may be prosecuted in either the jurisdiction where the treatment facility is located or the jurisdiction where the person was sentenced to commitment. The court may revoke such commitment at any 3095 3096 time and transfer the person to an appropriate state or local correctional facility. Upon presentation of a 3097 certified statement from the director of the treatment facility to the effect that the confined person has 3098 successfully responded to treatment, the court may release such confined person prior to the termination of 3099 the period of time for which such person was confined and may suspend the remainder of the term upon such 3100 conditions as the court may prescribe.

C. The court trying a case in which commission of the criminal offense was related to the defendant's 3101 3102 habitual abuse of alcohol and in which the court determines, pursuant to a substance abuse screening and 3103 assessment, that such defendant is in need of treatment, may commit, based upon a consideration of the 3104 substance abuse assessment, such person, upon his conviction, to any facility for the treatment of persons with substance abuse licensed by the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services, if space 3105 3106 is available in such facility, for a period of time not in excess of the maximum term of imprisonment 3107 specified as the penalty for conviction. Confinement under such commitment shall be, in all regards, treated 3108 as confinement in a penal institution and the person so committed may be convicted of escape if he leaves the 3109 place of commitment without authority. The court may revoke such commitment at any time and transfer the person to an appropriate state or local correctional facility. Upon presentation of a certified statement from 3110 3111 the director of the treatment facility to the effect that the confined person has successfully responded to 3112 treatment, the court may release such confined person prior to the termination of the period of time for which such person was confined and may suspend the remainder of the term upon such conditions as the court may 3113 3114 prescribe.

#### 3115 § 18.2-255. Distribution of certain drugs to persons under 18 prohibited; penalty.

A. Except as authorized in the Drug Control Act<del>, Chapter 34</del> (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.) of Title 54.1, it shall be is unlawful for any person who is at least 18 years of age to knowingly or intentionally (i) distribute any drug classified in Schedule I, II, III, or IV or marijuana to any person under 18 years of age who is at least three years his junior or (ii) cause any person under 18 years of age to assist in such distribution of any drug classified in Schedule I, II, III, or IV or marijuana. Any person violating this provision shall upon conviction be imprisoned in a state correctional facility for a period not less than 10 nor more than 50 years, and fined not more than \$100,000. Five years of the sentence imposed for a conviction under this section involving a

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3123 Schedule I or II controlled substance or one ounce or more of marijuana shall be a mandatory minimum

3124 sentence. Two years of the sentence imposed for a conviction under this section involving less than one ounce of marijuana shall be a mandatory minimum sentence. 3125

B. It shall be is unlawful for any person who is at least 18 years of age to knowingly or intentionally (i) 3126 distribute any imitation controlled substance to a person under 18 years of age who is at least three years his 3127

junior or (ii) cause any person under 18 years of age to assist in such distribution of any imitation controlled 3128 substance. Any person violating this provision shall be is guilty of a Class 6 felony. 3129

§ 18.2-255.1. Distribution, sale or display of printed material advertising instruments for use in 3130 administering controlled substances to minors; penalty. 3131

It shall be is a Class 1 misdemeanor for any person knowingly to sell, distribute, or display for sale to a 3132 minor any book, pamphlet, periodical, or other printed matter which that he knows advertises for sale any 3133 3134 instrument, device, article, or contrivance for advertised use in unlawfully ingesting, smoking, administering, 3135 preparing, or growing marijuana or a controlled substance.

#### § 18.2-255.2. Prohibiting the sale or manufacture of drugs on or near certain properties; penalty.

3137 A. It shall be is unlawful for any person to manufacture, sell or distribute or possess with intent to sell, 3138 give, or distribute any controlled substance, or imitation controlled substance, or marijuana while:

3139 1. Upon the property, including buildings and grounds, of any public or private elementary or secondary school, any institution of higher education, or any clearly marked licensed child day center as defined in § 3140 3141 22.1-289.02;

3142 2. Upon public property or any property open to public use within 1,000 feet of the property described in 3143 subdivision 1;

3144 3. On any school bus as defined in § 46.2-100;

4. Upon a designated school bus stop, or upon either public property or any property open to public use 3145 3146 which is within 1,000 feet of such school bus stop, during the time when school children are waiting to be picked up and transported to or are being dropped off from school or a school-sponsored activity; 3147

5. Upon the property, including buildings and grounds, of any publicly owned or publicly operated 3148 recreation or community center facility or any public library; or 3149

6. Upon the property of any state facility as defined in § 37.2-100 or upon public property or property 3150 3151 open to public use within 1,000 feet of such an institution facility. It is a violation of the provisions of this 3152 section if the person possessed the controlled substance, or imitation controlled substance, or marijuana on the property described in subdivisions 1 through 6, regardless of where the person intended to sell, give, or 3153 3154 distribute the controlled substance, or imitation controlled substance, or marijuana. Nothing in this section 3155 shall prohibit the authorized distribution of controlled substances.

3156 B. Violation of this section shall constitute a separate and distinct felony. Any person violating the provisions of this section shall, upon conviction, be imprisoned for a term of not less than one year nor more 3157 than five years and fined not more than \$100,000. A second or subsequent conviction hereunder for an 3158 offense involving a controlled substance classified in Schedule I, II, or III of the Drug Control Act (§ 3159 3160 54.1-3400 et seg.) or more than one-half ounce of marijuana shall be punished by a mandatory minimum term of imprisonment of one year to be served consecutively with any other sentence. However, if such person 3161 3162 proves that he sold such controlled substance or marijuana only as an accommodation to another individual and not with intent to profit thereby from any consideration received or expected nor to induce the recipient 3163 3164 or intended recipient of the controlled substance or marijuana to use or become addicted to or dependent upon 3165 such controlled substance or marijuana, he is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

3166 C. If a person commits an act violating the provisions of this section, and the same act also violates 3167 another provision of law that provides for penalties greater than those provided for by this section, then 3168 nothing in this section shall prohibit or bar any prosecution or proceeding under that other provision of law or the imposition of any penalties provided for thereby. 3169 3170

## § 18.2-258. Certain premises deemed common nuisance; penalty.

Any office, store, shop, restaurant, dance hall, theater, poolroom, clubhouse, storehouse, warehouse, 3171 3172 dwelling house, apartment, building of any kind, vehicle, vessel, boat, or aircraft, which with the knowledge of the owner, lessor, agent of any such lessor, manager, chief executive officer, operator, or tenant thereof, is 3173 3174 frequented by persons under the influence of illegally obtained controlled substances or marijuana, as defined in § 54.1-3401, or for the purpose of illegally obtaining possession of, manufacturing, or distributing 3175 controlled substances or marijuana, or is used for the illegal possession, manufacture, or distribution of 3176 controlled substances or marijuana shall be deemed a common nuisance. Any such owner, lessor, agent of 3177 3178 any such lessor, manager, chief executive officer, operator, or tenant who knowingly permits, establishes, keeps or maintains such a common nuisance is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor and, for a second or 3179 3180 subsequent offense, a Class 6 felony.

#### § 18.2-258.02. Maintaining a fortified drug house; penalty. 3181

3182 Any office, store, shop, restaurant, dance hall, theater, poolroom, clubhouse, storehouse, warehouse, dwelling house, apartment or building or structure of any kind which that is (i) substantially altered from its 3183

**3184** original status by means of reinforcement with the intent to impede, deter or delay lawful entry by a **3185** law-enforcement officer into such structure, (ii) being used for the purpose of manufacturing or distributing **3186** controlled substances or marijuana, and (iii) the chiest of a valid security warrant, shall be considered a

controlled substances or marijuana, and (iii) the object of a valid search warrant, shall be considered a
fortified drug house. Any person who maintains or operates a fortified drug house is guilty of a Class 5
felony.

#### 3189 § 18.2-258.1. Obtaining drugs, procuring administration of controlled substances, etc., by fraud, 3190 deceit or forgery.

A. It shall be is unlawful for any person to obtain or attempt to obtain any drug or procure or attempt to procure the administration of any controlled substance or marijuana: (i) by fraud, deceit, misrepresentation, embezzlement, or subterfuge; (ii) by the forgery or alteration of a prescription or of any written order; (iii) by the concealment of a material fact; or (iv) by the use of a false name or the giving of a false address.

3195 B. It shall be is unlawful for any person to furnish false or fraudulent information in or omit any 3196 information from, or willfully make a false statement in, any prescription, order, report, record, or other 3197 document required by Chapter 34 the Drug Control Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.) of Title 54.1.

3198 C. It shall be is unlawful for any person to use in the course of the manufacture or distribution of a
 3199 controlled substance or marijuana a license number which that is fictitious, revoked, suspended, or issued to
 3200 another person.

3201 D. It shall be is unlawful for any person, for the purpose of obtaining any controlled substance or
 3202 marijuana to falsely assume the title of, or represent himself to be, a manufacturer, wholesaler, pharmacist,
 3203 physician, dentist, veterinarian or other authorized person.

E. It shall be *is* unlawful for any person to make or utter any false or forged prescription or false or forged written order.

F. It shall be is unlawful for any person to affix any false or forged label to a package or receptaclecontaining any controlled substance.

3208 G. This section shall not apply to officers and employees of the United States, of this Commonwealth or 3209 of a political subdivision of this Commonwealth acting in the course of their employment, who obtain such 3210 drugs for investigative, research or analytical purposes, or to the agents or duly authorized representatives of any pharmaceutical manufacturer who obtain such drugs for investigative, research or analytical purposes and 3211 3212 who are acting in the course of their employment; provided that such manufacturer is licensed under the 3213 provisions of the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act; and provided further, that such pharmaceutical 3214 manufacturer, its agents and duly authorized representatives file with the Board such information as the 3215 Board may deem appropriate.

H. Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, any person who shall violate any provision herein
 shall be is guilty of a Class 6 felony.

Whenever any person who has not previously been convicted of any offense under this article or under any statute of the United States or of any state relating to narcotic drugs; marijuana, or stimulant, depressant, or hallucinogenic drugs, or has not previously had a proceeding against him for violation of such an offense dismissed, or reduced as provided in this section, pleads guilty to or enters a plea of not guilty to the court for violating this section, upon such plea if the facts found by the court would justify a finding of guilt, the court may place him on probation upon terms and conditions.

3224 As a term or condition, the court shall require the accused to be evaluated and enter a treatment and/or 3225 education program, if available, such as, in the opinion of the court, may be best suited to the needs of the 3226 accused. This program may be located in the judicial circuit in which the charge is brought or in any other 3227 judicial circuit as the court may provide. The services shall be provided by a program certified or licensed by 3228 the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services. The court shall require the person entering 3229 such program under the provisions of this section to pay all or part of the costs of the program, including the 3230 costs of the screening, evaluation, testing and education, based upon the person's ability to pay unless the 3231 person is determined by the court to be indigent.

As a condition of supervised probation, the court shall require the accused to remain drug free during the period of probation and submit to such tests during that period as may be necessary and appropriate to determine if the accused is drug free. Such testing may be conducted by the personnel of any screening, evaluation, and education program to which the person is referred or by the supervising agency.

3236 Unless the accused was fingerprinted at the time of arrest, the court shall order the accused to report to the3237 original arresting law-enforcement agency to submit to fingerprinting.

3238 Upon violation of a term or condition, the court may enter an adjudication of guilt upon the felony and
 3239 proceed as otherwise provided. Upon fulfillment of the terms and conditions of probation, the court shall find
 3240 the defendant guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

#### 3241 § 18.2-265.1. Definition.

As used in this article, the term "drug paraphernalia" means all equipment, products, and materials of any kind which are either designed for use or which are intended by the person charged with violating § 18.2-265.3 for use in planting, propagating, cultivating, growing, harvesting, manufacturing, compounding,

3245 converting, producing, processing, preparing, strength testing, analyzing, packaging, repackaging, storing,
 3246 containing, concealing, injecting, ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing into the human body
 3247 marijuana or a controlled substance. It includes, but is not limited to:

3248 1. Kits intended for use or designed for use in planting, propagating, cultivating, growing or harvesting of
 3249 marijuana or any species of plant which is a controlled substance or from which a controlled substance can be
 3250 derived;

3251 2. Kits intended for use or designed for use in manufacturing, compounding, converting, producing,
 3252 processing, or preparing marijuana or controlled substances;

3253 3. Isomerization devices intended for use or designed for use in increasing the potency of marijuana or 3254 any species of plant which that is a controlled substance;

3255 4. Testing equipment intended for use or designed for use in identifying or in analyzing the strength or
 3256 effectiveness of marijuana or controlled substances, other than narcotic testing products used to determine
 3257 whether a controlled substance contains fentanyl or a fentanyl analog;

3258 5. Scales and balances intended for use or designed for use in weighing or measuring marijuana or
 3259 controlled substances;

3260 6. Diluents and adulterants, such as quinine hydrochloride, mannitol, or mannite, intended for use or3261 designed for use in cutting controlled substances;

3262 7. Separation gins and sifters intended for use or designed for use in removing twigs and seeds from, or in
 3263 otherwise cleaning or refining, marijuana;

3264 8. Blenders, bowls, containers, spoons, and mixing devices intended for use or designed for use in
 3265 compounding controlled substances;

3266 9. 8. Capsules, balloons, envelopes, and other containers intended for use or designed for use in packaging
 3267 small quantities of marijuana or controlled substances;

3268 10.9. Containers and other objects intended for use or designed for use in storing or concealing marijuana
 3269 or controlled substances;

3270 11. 10. Hypodermic syringes, needles, and other objects intended for use or designed for use in
 3271 parenterally injecting controlled substances into the human body;

3272 12. 11. Objects intended for use or designed for use in ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing
 3273 marijuana, cocaine, hashish, or hashish oil into the human body, such as:

a. Metal, wooden, acrylic, glass, stone, plastic, or ceramic pipes with or without screens, permanent
 screens, hashish heads, or punctured metal bowls;

3276 b. Water pipes;

3277 c. Carburetion tubes and devices;

3278 d. Smoking and carburetion masks;

8279 e. Roach clips, meaning objects used to hold burning material, such as a marijuana eigarette, that has
8280 become too small or too short to be held in the hand;

**3281** f. Miniature cocaine spoons, and cocaine vials;

3282 g. Chamber pipes;

3283 h. Carburetor pipes;

3284 i. Electric pipes;

3285 j. Air-driven pipes;

3286 k. Chillums;

**3287** 1. Bongs;

3288 m. Ice pipes or chillers.

#### 3289 § 18.2-265.2. Evidence to be considered in cases under this article.

3290 In determining whether an object is drug paraphernalia, the court may consider, in addition to all other 3291 relevant evidence, the following:

3292 1. Constitutionally admissible statements by the accused concerning the use of the object;

3293 2. The proximity of the object to marijuana or controlled substances, which proximity is actually known to3294 the accused;

3295 3. Instructions, oral or written, provided with the object concerning its use;

3296 4. Descriptive materials accompanying the object which that explain or depict its use;

5. National and local advertising within the actual knowledge of the accused concerning its use;

**3298** 6. The manner in which the object is displayed for sale;

3299 7. Whether the accused is a legitimate supplier of like or related items to the community, such as a3300 licensed distributor or dealer of tobacco products;

8. Evidence of the ratio of sales of the objects defined in § 18.2-265.1 to the total sales of the business
enterprise;

- 3303 9. The existence and scope of legitimate uses for the object in the community;
- 10. Expert testimony concerning its use or the purpose for which it was designed; *and*
- 3305 11. Relevant evidence of the intent of the accused to deliver it to persons who he knows, or should

reasonably know, intend to use the object with an illegal drug. The innocence of an owner, or of anyone in
control of the object, as to a direct violation of this article shall not prevent a finding that the object is
intended for use or designed for use as drug paraphernalia.

### 3309 § 18.2-265.3. Penalties for sale, etc., of drug paraphernalia.

A. Any person who sells or possesses with intent to sell drug paraphernalia, knowing, or under circumstances where one reasonably should know, that it is either designed for use or intended by such person for use to illegally plant, propagate, cultivate, grow, harvest, manufacture, compound, convert, produce, process, prepare, test, analyze, pack, repack, store, contain, conceal, inject, ingest, inhale, or otherwise introduce into the human body marijuana or a controlled substance, shall be is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

B. Any person eighteen 18 years of age or older who violates subsection A hereof by selling drug
paraphernalia to a minor who is at least three years junior to the accused in age shall be is guilty of a Class 6
felony.

3319 C. Any person eighteen 18 years of age or older who distributes drug paraphernalia to a minor shall be is
3320 guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

#### 3321 § 18.2-287.2. Wearing of body armor while committing a crime; penalty.

Any person who, while committing a crime of violence as defined in § 18.2-288 (2) or a felony violation of § 18.2-248 or subdivision (a) 2 or 3 of § 18.2-248.1, has in his possession a firearm or knife and is wearing body armor designed to diminish the effect of the impact of a bullet or projectile shall be *is* guilty of a Class 4 felony.

#### 3326 § 18.2-308.012. Prohibited conduct.

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3327 A. Any person permitted to carry a concealed handgun who is under the influence of alcohol, marijuana, 3328 or illegal drugs while carrying such handgun in a public place is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor. Conviction 3329 of any of the following offenses shall be prima facie evidence, subject to rebuttal, that the person is "under 3330 the influence" for purposes of this section: manslaughter in violation of § 18.2-36.1, maining in violation of § 18.2-51.4, driving while intoxicated in violation of § 18.2-266, public intoxication in violation of § 3331 18.2-388, or driving while intoxicated in violation of § 46.2-341.24. Upon such conviction that court shall 3332 3333 revoke the person's permit for a concealed handgun and promptly notify the issuing circuit court. A person 3334 convicted of a violation of this subsection shall be ineligible to apply for a concealed handgun permit for a 3335 period of five years.

B. No person who carries a concealed handgun onto the premises of any restaurant or club as defined in § 4.1-100 for which a license to sell and serve alcoholic beverages for on-premises consumption has been granted by the Virginia Alcoholic Beverage Control Authority under Title 4.1 may consume an alcoholic beverage while on the premises. A person who carries a concealed handgun onto the premises of such a restaurant or club and consumes alcoholic beverages is guilty of a Class 2 misdemeanor. However, nothing in this subsection shall apply to a federal, state, or local law-enforcement officer.

#### 3342 § 18.2-308.4. Possession of firearms while in possession of certain substances.

A. It shall be *is* unlawful for any person unlawfully in possession of a controlled substance classified in Schedule I or II of the Drug Control Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.) of Title 54.1 to simultaneously with knowledge and intent possess any firearm. A violation of this subsection is a Class 6 felony and constitutes a separate and distinct felony.

B. It shall be is unlawful for any person unlawfully in possession of a controlled substance classified in Schedule I or II of the Drug Control Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.) to simultaneously with knowledge and intent possess any firearm on or about his person. A violation of this subsection is a Class 6 felony and constitutes a separate and distinct felony and any person convicted hereunder shall be sentenced to a mandatory minimum term of imprisonment of two years. Such punishment shall be separate and apart from, and shall be made to run consecutively with, any punishment received for the commission of the primary felony.

3353 C. It shall be is unlawful for any person to possess, use, or attempt to use any pistol, shotgun, rifle, or 3354 other firearm or display such weapon in a threatening manner while committing or attempting to commit the 3355 illegal manufacture, sale, distribution, or the possession with the intent to manufacture, sell, or distribute a 3356 controlled substance classified in Schedule I or Schedule II of the Drug Control Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.) or more than one pound of marijuana. A violation of this subsection is a Class 6 felony, and constitutes a 3357 3358 separate and distinct felony and any person convicted hereunder shall be sentenced to a mandatory minimum 3359 term of imprisonment of five years. Such punishment shall be separate and apart from, and shall be made to 3360 run consecutively with, any punishment received for the commission of the primary felony.

#### § 18.2-460. Obstructing justice; resisting arrest; fleeing from a law-enforcement officer; penalties.

A. If any person without just cause knowingly obstructs a judge, magistrate, justice, juror, attorney for the Commonwealth, witness, any law-enforcement officer, or animal control officer employed pursuant to §
3.2-6555 in the performance of his duties as such or fails or refuses without just cause to cease such obstruction when requested to do so by such judge, magistrate, justice, juror, attorney for the Commonwealth, witness, law-enforcement officer, or animal control officer employed pursuant to § 3.2-6555, he is guilty of a

3367 Class 1 misdemeanor.

B. Except as provided in subsection C, any person who, by threats or force, knowingly attempts to 3368 3369 intimidate or impede a judge, magistrate, justice, juror, attorney for the Commonwealth, witness, any 3370 law-enforcement officer, or an animal control officer employed pursuant to § 3.2-6555 lawfully engaged in 3371 his duties as such, or to obstruct or impede the administration of justice in any court, is guilty of a Class 1 3372 misdemeanor.

3373 C. If any person by threats of bodily harm or force knowingly attempts to intimidate or impede a judge, magistrate, justice, juror, attorney for the Commonwealth, witness, any or law-enforcement officer, lawfully 3374 3375 engaged in the discharge of his duty, or to obstruct or impede the administration of justice in any court 3376 relating to a violation of or conspiracy to violate § 18.2-248 or subdivision (a)(3), (b) or (c) of § 18.2-248.1, 3377  $\Theta$  + 18.2-46.2, or 18.2-46.3, or relating to the violation of or conspiracy to violate any violent felony 3378 offense listed in subsection C of § 17.1-805, he is guilty of a Class 5 felony.

3379 D. Any person who knowingly and willfully makes any materially false statement or representation to a 3380 law-enforcement officer or an animal control officer employed pursuant to § 3.2-6555 who is in the course of 3381 conducting an investigation of a crime by another is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

3382 E. Any person who intentionally prevents or attempts to prevent a law-enforcement officer from lawfully 3383 arresting him, with or without a warrant, is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor. For purposes of this subsection, 3384 intentionally preventing or attempting to prevent a lawful arrest means fleeing from a law-enforcement 3385 officer when (i) the officer applies physical force to the person, or (ii) the officer communicates to the person that he is under arrest and (a) the officer has the legal authority and the immediate physical ability to place 3386 3387 the person under arrest, and (b) a reasonable person who receives such communication knows or should know 3388 that he is not free to leave. 3389

#### § 18.2-474.1. Delivery of drugs, firearms, explosives, etc., to prisoners or committed persons.

3390 Notwithstanding the provisions of  $\S$  18.2-474, any person who shall willfully in any manner deliver, 3391 attempt to deliver, or conspire with another to deliver to any prisoner confined under authority of the Commonwealth of Virginia, or of any political subdivision thereof, or to any person committed to the 3392 3393 Department of Juvenile Justice in any juvenile correctional center, any drug which that is a controlled 3394 substance regulated by the Drug Control Act in Chapter 34 (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.) of Title 54.1 or marijuana is guilty of a Class 5 felony. Any person who shall willfully in any manner so deliver or attempt to deliver or 3395 3396 conspire to deliver to any such prisoner or confined or committed person, firearms, ammunitions, or 3397 explosives of any nature is guilty of a Class 3 felony.

3398 Nothing herein contained shall be construed to repeal or amend § 18.2-473.

#### 3399 § 19.2-66. When Attorney General or Chief Deputy Attorney General may apply for order 3400 authorizing interception of communications.

A. The Attorney General or Chief Deputy Attorney General, if the Attorney General so designates in 3401 3402 writing, in any case where the Attorney General is authorized by law to prosecute or pursuant to a request in 3403 his official capacity of an attorney for the Commonwealth in any city or county, may apply to a judge of competent jurisdiction for an order authorizing the interception of wire, electronic or oral communications by 3404 the Department of State Police, when such interception may reasonably be expected to provide evidence of 3405 3406 the commission of a felonious offense of extortion, bribery, kidnapping, murder, any felony violation of § 18.2-248 or 18.2-248.1, any felony violation of Chapter 29 (§ 59.1-364 et seq.) of Title 59.1, any felony 3407 3408 violation of Article 2 (§ 18.2-38 et seq.), Article 2.1 (§ 18.2-46.1 et seq.), Article 2.2 (§ 18.2-46.4 et seq.), 3409 Article 5 (§ 18.2-58 et seq.), Article 6 (§ 18.2-59 et seq.) or any felonies that are not Class 6 felonies in Article 7 (§ 18.2-61 et seq.) of Chapter 4 of Title 18.2, or any conspiracy to commit any of the foregoing 3410 3411 offenses. The Attorney General or Chief Deputy Attorney General may apply for authorization for the 3412 observation or monitoring of the interception by a police department of a county or city, by a sheriff's office, or by law-enforcement officers of the United States. Such application shall be made, and such order may be 3413 3414 granted, in conformity with the provisions of § 19.2-68.

B. The application for an order under subsection B of § 19.2-68 shall be made as follows:

3416 1. In the case of an application for a wire or electronic interception, a judge of competent jurisdiction shall have the authority to issue an order under subsection B of § 19.2-68 if there is probable cause to believe that an offense was committed, is being committed, or will be committed or the person or persons whose 3417 3418 3419 communications are to be intercepted live, work, subscribe to a wire or electronic communication system, 3420 maintain an address or a post office box, or are making the communication within the territorial jurisdiction 3421 of the court.

2. In the case of an application for an oral intercept, a judge of competent jurisdiction shall have the 3422 3423 authority to issue an order under subsection B of § 19.2-68 if there is probable cause to believe that an 3424 offense was committed, is being committed, or will be committed or the physical location of the oral 3425 communication to be intercepted is within the territorial jurisdiction of the court.

3426 C. For the purposes of an order entered pursuant to subsection B of § 19.2-68 for the interception of a wire 3427 or electronic communication, such communication shall be deemed to be intercepted in the jurisdiction where

3428 the order is entered, regardless of the physical location or the method by which the communication is3429 captured or routed to the monitoring location.

#### 3430 § 19.2-81. Arrest without warrant authorized in certain cases.

- 3431 A. The following officers shall have the powers of arrest as provided in this section:
- **3432** 1. Members of the State Police force of the Commonwealth;
- 3433 2. Sheriffs of the various counties and cities, and their deputies;
- 3434 3. Members of any county police force or any duly constituted police force of any city or town of the 3435 Commonwealth;
- 3436 4. The Commissioner, members and employees of the Marine Resources Commission granted the power3437 of arrest pursuant to § 28.2-900;
- **3438** 5. Regular conservation police officers appointed pursuant to § 29.1-200;
- 3439 6. United States Coast Guard and United States Coast Guard Reserve commissioned, warrant, and petty
  3440 officers authorized under § 29.1-205 to make arrests;
- **3441** 7. Conservation officers appointed pursuant to § 10.1-115;
- 8. Full-time sworn members of the enforcement division of the Department of Motor Vehicles appointed
  pursuant to § 46.2-217;
- 3444 9. Special agents of the Virginia Alcoholic Beverage Control Authority or the Virginia Cannabis Control
   3445 Authority;
- 10. Campus police officers appointed under Article 3 (§ 23.1-809 et seq.) of Chapter 8 of Title 23.1; and
- 3447 11. Members of the Division of Capitol Police.
- 3448 B. Such officers may arrest without a warrant any person who commits any crime in the presence of the
  3449 officer and any person whom he has reasonable grounds or probable cause to suspect of having committed a
  3450 felony not in his presence.
- Such officers may arrest without a warrant any person whom the officer has probable cause to suspect of operating any watercraft or motorboat while (i) intoxicated in violation of subsection B of § 29.1-738 or a substantially similar ordinance of any county, city, or town in the Commonwealth or (ii) in violation of an order issued pursuant to § 29.1-738.4 and may thereafter transfer custody of the person arrested to another officer, who may obtain a warrant based upon statements made to him by the arresting officer.
- 3456 C. Any such officer may, at the scene of any accident involving a motor vehicle, watercraft as defined in § 29.1-733.2 or motorboat, or at any hospital or medical facility to which any person involved in such accident 3457 3458 has been transported, or in the apprehension of any person charged with the theft of any motor vehicle, on 3459 any of the highways or waters of the Commonwealth, upon reasonable grounds to believe, based upon 3460 personal investigation, including information obtained from eyewitnesses, that a crime has been committed by any person then and there present, apprehend such person without a warrant of arrest. For purposes of this 3461 section, "the scene of any accident" shall include a reasonable location where a vehicle or person involved in 3462 3463 an accident has been moved at the direction of a law-enforcement officer to facilitate the clearing of the 3464 highway or to ensure the safety of the motoring public.
- D. Such officers may, within three hours of the alleged offense, arrest without a warrant at any location 3465 3466 any person whom the officer has probable cause to suspect of driving or operating a motor vehicle, watercraft or motorboat while intoxicated in violation of § 18.2-266, 18.2-266.1, 46.2-341.24, or subsection B of § 3467 3468 29.1-738; or a substantially similar ordinance of any county, city, or town in the Commonwealth, whether or 3469 not the offense was committed in such officer's presence. Such officers may, within three hours of the alleged 3470 offense, arrest without a warrant at any location any person whom the officer has probable cause to suspect of 3471 operating a watercraft or motorboat in violation of an order issued pursuant to  $\S$  29.1-738.4, whether or not 3472 the offense was committed in such officer's presence.
- E. Such officers may arrest, without a warrant or a capias, persons duly charged with a crime in another jurisdiction upon receipt of a photocopy of a warrant or a capias, telegram, computer printout, facsimile printout, a radio, telephone or teletype message, in which photocopy of a warrant, telegram, computer printout, facsimile printout, radio, telephone or teletype message shall be given the name or a reasonably accurate description of such person wanted and the crime alleged.
- 3478 F. Such officers may arrest, without a warrant or a capias, for an alleged misdemeanor not committed in
  3479 his presence when the officer receives a radio message from his department or other law-enforcement agency
  3480 within the Commonwealth that a warrant or capias for such offense is on file.
- 3481 G. Such officers may also arrest without a warrant for an alleged misdemeanor not committed in their 3482 presence involving (i) shoplifting in violation of § 18.2-96 or 18.2-103 or a similar local ordinance, (ii) carrying a weapon on school property in violation of § 18.2-308.1, (iii) assault and battery, (iv) brandishing a 3483 3484 firearm in violation of § 18.2-282, or (v) destruction of property in violation of § 18.2-137, when such 3485 property is located on premises used for business or commercial purposes, or a similar local ordinance, when 3486 any such arrest is based on probable cause upon reasonable complaint of the person who observed the alleged 3487 offense. The arresting officer may issue a summons to any person arrested under this section for a 3488 misdemeanor violation involving shoplifting.
- 3489 § 19.2-81.1. Arrest without warrant by correctional officers in certain cases.

#### 58 of 82

Any correctional officer, as defined in § 53.1-1, may arrest, in the same manner as provided in § 19.2-81,persons for crimes involving:

**3492** (a) *1*. The escape of an inmate from a correctional institution, as defined in  $\S$  53.1-1;

3493 (b) 2. Assisting an inmate to escape from a correctional institution, as defined in  $\S$  53.1-1;

3494 (c) 3. The delivery of contraband to an inmate in violation of § 4.1-1117, 18.2-474, or § 18.2-474.1; and

(d) 4. Any other criminal offense which *that* may contribute to the disruption of the safety, welfare, or security of the population of a correctional institution.

#### 3497 § 19.2-83.1. Report of arrest of school employees and adult students for certain offenses.

A. Every state official or agency and every sheriff, police officer, or other local law-enforcement officer 3498 3499 or conservator of the peace having the power to arrest for a felony, upon arresting a person who is known or discovered by the arresting official to be a full-time, part-time, permanent, or temporary teacher or any other 3500 3501 employee in any local school division in the Commonwealth for a felony or a Class 1 misdemeanor or an 3502 equivalent offense in another state, shall file a report of such arrest with the division safety official designated pursuant to subsection F of § 22.1-279.8 in the school division in which such person is employed as soon as 3503 3504 practicable but no later than 48 hours after such arrest. The contents of the report required pursuant to this 3505 subsection shall be utilized by the local school division solely to implement the provisions of subsection B of 3506 § 22.1-296.2 and § 22.1-315.

B. The report required pursuant to subsection A shall be transmitted to the division safety official (i) via certified mail, return receipt requested, to the mailing address identified by the division superintendent pursuant to subsection F of § 22.1-279.8 or (ii) via fax and email to the fax number and email address identified by the division superintendent pursuant to subsection F of § 22.1-279.8. Any certified mail return receipt shall be retained in the case file.

C. (Expires July 1, 2027) In the event that the law-enforcement agency has existing access to Virginia
 Employment Commission records, each arresting official shall request in writing that the Virginia
 Employment Commission provide the name of the current employer of each person arrested for an offense set
 forth in § 9.1-902 for purposes of determining whether a report is required pursuant to subsection A.

3516 D. Every state official or agency and every sheriff, police officer, or other local law-enforcement officer
3517 or conservator of the peace having the power to arrest for a felony shall file a report, as soon as practicable,
3518 with the division superintendent of the school division in which the student is enrolled upon arresting a
3519 person who is known or discovered by the arresting official to be a student age 18 or older in any local school
3520 division in the Commonwealth for:

**3521** 1. A firearm offense pursuant to Article 4 (§ 18.2-279 et seq.), 5 (§ 18.2-288 et seq.), 6 (§ 18.2-299 et seq.), 6.1 (§ 18.2-307.1 et seq.), or 7 (§ 18.2-308.1 et seq.) of Chapter 7 of Title 18.2;

3523 2. Homicide, pursuant to Article 1 (§ 18.2-30 et seq.) of Chapter 4 of Title 18.2;

3524 3. Felonious assault and bodily wounding, pursuant to Article 4 (§ 18.2-51 et seq.) of Chapter 4 of Title 3525 18.2;

4. Criminal sexual assault, pursuant to Article 7 (§ 18.2-61 et seq.) of Chapter 4 of Title 18.2;

5. Manufacture, sale, gift, distribution or possession of Schedule I or II controlled substances, pursuant to Article 1 (§ 18.2-247 et seq.) of Chapter 7 of Title 18.2;

6. Manufacture, sale or distribution of marijuana pursuant to Article 1 Chapter 11 (§ 18.2-247 4.1-1100 et seq.) of Chapter 7 of Title 18.2 4.1;

- **3531** 7. Arson and related crimes, pursuant to Article 1 (§ 18.2-77 et seq.) of Chapter 5 of Title 18.2;
- **3532** 8. Burglary and related offenses, pursuant to §§ 18.2-89 through 18.2-93;
- **3533** 9. Robbery pursuant to § 18.2-58;
- **3534** 10. Prohibited criminal street gang activity pursuant to § 18.2-46.2;
- **3535** 11. Recruitment of juveniles for criminal street gang pursuant to § 18.2-46.3;
- 3536 12. An act of violence by a mob pursuant to  $\S$  18.2-42.1; or
- **3537** 13. Abduction of any person pursuant to § 18.2-47 or 18.2-48.
- 3538 § 19.2-188.1. Testimony regarding identification of controlled substances.

A. In any preliminary hearing on a violation of Chapter 11 (§ 4.1-1100 et seq.) of Title 4.1, Article 1 (§ 18.2-247 et seq.) of Chapter 7 of Title 18.2, or subdivision 6 of § 53.1-203, any law-enforcement officer shall be permitted to testify as to the results of field tests that have been approved by the Department of Forensic Science pursuant to regulations adopted in accordance with the Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.), regarding whether or not any substance the identity of which is at issue in such hearing is a controlled substance, *as defined in § 18.2-247*, or marijuana, as defined in § <del>18.2-247</del> 4.1-600.

B. In any trial for a violation of § 4.1-1105.1 4.1-1104 or 4.1-1105, any law-enforcement officer shall be permitted to testify as to the results of any marijuana field test approved as accurate and reliable by the Department of Forensic Science pursuant to regulations adopted in accordance with the Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.), regarding whether or not any plant material, the identity of which is at issue, is marijuana provided the defendant has been given written notice of his right to request a full chemical

3551 analysis. Such notice shall be on a form approved by the Supreme Court and shall be provided to the 3552 defendant prior to trial.

In any case in which the person accused of a violation of § 4.1-1105.1 4.1-1104 or 4.1-1105, or the 3553 3554 attorney of record for the accused, desires a full chemical analysis of the alleged plant material, he may, by 3555 motion prior to trial before the court in which the charge is pending, request such a chemical analysis. Upon such motion, the court shall order that the analysis be performed by the Department of Forensic Science in 3556 accordance with the provisions of § 18.2-247 9.1-1101 and shall prescribe in its order the method of custody, 3557 3558 transfer, and return of evidence submitted for chemical analysis.

#### 3559 § 19.2-303.01. Reduction of sentence; substantial assistance to prosecution.

3560 Notwithstanding any other provision of law or rule of court, upon motion of the attorney for the 3561 Commonwealth, the sentencing court may reduce the defendant's sentence if the defendant, after entry of the final judgment order, provided substantial assistance in investigating or prosecuting another person for (i) an 3562 act of violence as defined in § 19.2-297.1, an act of larceny of a firearm in violation of § 18.2-95, or any 3563 violation of § 18.2-248, 18.2-248.01, 18.2-248.02, 18.2-248.03, 18.2-248.1, 18.2-248.5, 18.2-251.2, 3564 18.2-251.3, 18.2-255, 18.2-255.2, 18.2-258, 18.2-258.02, 18.2-258.1, or 18.2-258.2, or any substantially 3565 3566 similar offense in any other jurisdiction, which offense would be a felony if committed in the 3567 Commonwealth; (ii) a conspiracy to commit any of the offenses listed in clause (i); or (iii) violations as a principal in the second degree or accessory before the fact of any of the offenses listed in clause (i). In 3568 3569 determining whether the defendant has provided substantial assistance pursuant to the provisions of this 3570 section, the court shall consider (a) the court's evaluation of the significance and usefulness of the defendant's 3571 assistance, taking into consideration the Commonwealth's evaluation of the assistance rendered; (b) the 3572 truthfulness, completeness, and reliability of any information or testimony provided by the defendant; (c) the 3573 nature and extent of the defendant's assistance; (d) any injury suffered or any danger or risk of injury to the defendant or his family resulting from his assistance; and (e) the timeliness of the defendant's assistance. If 3574 3575 the motion is made more than one year after entry of the final judgment order, the court may reduce a sentence only if the defendant's substantial assistance involved (1) information not known to the defendant 3576 until more than one year after entry of the final judgment order, (2) information provided by the defendant 3577 3578 within one year of entry of the final judgment order but that did not become useful to the Commonwealth 3579 until more than one year after entry of the final judgment order, or (3) information the usefulness of which 3580 could not reasonably have been anticipated by the defendant until more than one year after entry of the final 3581 judgment order and which was promptly provided to the Commonwealth by the defendant after its usefulness 3582 was reasonably apparent. 3583

§ 19.2-386.22. Seizure of property used in connection with or derived from illegal drug transactions.

3584 A. The following property shall be subject to lawful seizure by any officer charged with enforcing the 3585 provisions of Chapter 11 (§ 4.1-1100 et seq.) of Title 4.1 or Article 1 (§ 18.2-247 et seq.) of Chapter 7 of Title 18.2: (i) all money, medical equipment, office equipment, laboratory equipment, motor vehicles, and all 3586 other personal and real property of any kind or character, used in substantial connection with (a) the illegal 3587 manufacture, sale or distribution of controlled substances or possession with intent to sell or distribute 3588 controlled substances in violation of § 18.2-248, (b) the sale or distribution of marijuana or possession with 3589 3590 intent to distribute marijuana in violation of subdivisions (a)(2), (a)(3) and (c) of § 18.2-248.1 § 4.1-1103, or (c) a drug-related offense in violation of § 4.1-1117 or 18.2-474.1; (ii) everything of value furnished, or 3591 3592 intended to be furnished, in exchange for a controlled substance in violation of § 18.2-248 or for marijuana in 3593 violation of § 18.2-248.1 4.1-1103 or for a controlled substance or marijuana in violation of § 4.1-1117 or 3594 18.2-474.1; and (iii) all moneys or other property, real or personal, traceable to such an exchange, together 3595 with any interest or profits derived from the investment of such money or other property. Under the 3596 provisions of clause (i), real property shall not be subject to lawful seizure unless the minimum prescribed 3597 punishment for the violation is a term of not less than five years.

3598 B. All seizures and forfeitures under this section shall be governed by the procedures contained in Chapter 3599 22.1 (§ 19.2-386.1 et seq.).

#### § 19.2-386.23. Disposal of seized controlled substances, marijuana, and paraphernalia.

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3601 A. All controlled substances, imitation controlled substances, marijuana, or paraphernalia, the lawful possession of which is not established or the title to which cannot be ascertained, which have come into the 3602 3603 custody of a peace officer or have been seized in connection with violations of Chapter 11 (§ 4.1-1100 et 3604 seq.) of Title 4.1 or Chapter 7 (§ 18.2-247 et seq.) of Title 18.2, shall be forfeited and disposed of as follows:

3605 1. Upon written application by (i) the Department of Forensic Science, (ii) the Department of State Police, or (iii) any police department or sheriff's office in a locality, the court may order the forfeiture of any such 3606 3607 substance or paraphernalia to the Department of Forensic Science, the Department of State Police, or to such 3608 police department or sheriff's office for research and training purposes and for destruction pursuant to 3609 regulations of the United States Department of Justice Drug Enforcement Administration and of the Board of 3610 Pharmacy once these purposes have been fulfilled.

3611 2. In the event no application is made under subdivision 1, the court shall order the destruction of all such 3612 substances or paraphernalia, which order shall state the existence and nature of the substance or 3613 paraphernalia, the quantity thereof, the location where seized, the person or persons from whom the substance 3614 or paraphernalia was seized, if known, and the manner whereby such item shall be destroyed. However, the court may order that paraphernalia identified in subdivision 5 of § 18.2-265.1 not be destroyed and that it be 3615 given to a person or entity that makes a showing to the court of sufficient need for the property and an ability 3616 to put the property to a lawful and publicly beneficial use. A return under oath, reporting the time, place and 3617 manner of destruction shall be made to the court by the officer to whom the order is directed. A copy of the 3618 3619 order and affidavit shall be made a part of the record of any criminal prosecution in which the substance or paraphernalia was used as evidence and shall, thereafter, be prima facie evidence of its contents. In the event 3620 3621 a law-enforcement agency recovers, seizes, finds, is given or otherwise comes into possession of any such substances or paraphernalia that are not evidence in a trial in the Commonwealth, the chief law-enforcement 3622 officer of the agency or his designee may, with the written consent of the appropriate attorney for the 3623 3624 Commonwealth, order destruction of same; provided that a statement under oath, reporting a description of the substances and paraphernalia destroyed and the time, place and manner of destruction, is made to the 3625 3626 chief law-enforcement officer by the officer to whom the order is directed.

B. No such substance or paraphernalia used or to be used in a criminal prosecution under Chapter 11 (§ 3627 4.1-1100 et seq.) of Title 4.1 or Chapter 7 (§ 18.2-247 et seq.) of Title 18.2 shall be disposed of as provided 3628 3629 by this section until all rights of appeal have been exhausted, except as provided in § 19.2-386.24.

3630 C. The amount of any specific controlled substance, or imitation controlled substance, retained by any law-enforcement agency pursuant to a court order issued under this section shall not exceed five pounds, or 3631 3632 25 pounds in the case of marijuana. Any written application to the court for controlled substances, imitation 3633 controlled substances, or marijuana, shall certify that the amount requested shall not result in the requesting 3634 agency's exceeding the limits allowed by this subsection.

3635 D. A law-enforcement agency that retains any controlled substance, imitation controlled substance, or 3636 marijuana, pursuant to a court order issued under this section shall (i) be required to conduct an inventory of such substance on a monthly basis, which shall include a description and weight of the substance, and (ii) 3637 destroy such substance pursuant to subdivision A 1 when no longer needed for research and training 3638 3639 purposes. A written report outlining the details of the inventory shall be made to the chief law-enforcement 3640 officer of the agency within 10 days of the completion of the inventory, and the agency shall detail the 3641 substances that were used for research and training pursuant to a court order in the immediately preceding fiscal year. Destruction of such substance shall be certified to the court along with a statement prepared under 3642 3643 oath, reporting a description of the substance destroyed, and the time, place, and manner of destruction. 3644

§ 19.2-386.24. Destruction of seized controlled substances or marijuana prior to trial.

3645 Where seizures of controlled substances or marijuana are made in excess of 10 pounds in connection with any prosecution or investigation under Chapter 11 (§ 4.1-1100 et seq.) of Title 4.1 or Chapter 7 (§ 18.2-247 et 3646 3647 seq.) of Title 18.2, the appropriate law-enforcement agency may retain 10 pounds of the substance randomly selected from the seized substance for representative purposes as evidence and destroy the remainder of the 3648 3649 seized substance.

Before any destruction is carried out under this section, the law-enforcement agency shall cause the 3650 material seized to be photographed with identification case numbers or other means of identification and shall 3651 prepare a report identifying the seized material. It shall also notify the accused, or other interested party, if 3652 known, or his attorney, at least five days in advance that the photography will take place and that they may be 3653 3654 present. Prior to any destruction under this section, the law-enforcement agency shall also notify the accused or other interested party, if known, and his attorney at least seven days prior to the destruction of the time and 3655 3656 place the destruction will occur. Any notice required under the provisions of this section shall be by first-3657 class mail to the last known address of the person required to be notified. In addition to the substance retained for representative purposes as evidence, all photographs and records made under this section and properly 3658 3659 identified shall be admissible in any court proceeding for any purposes for which the seized substance itself 3660 would have been admissible.

#### § 19.2-386.25. Judge may order law-enforcement agency to maintain custody of controlled 3661 3662 substances, etc.

Upon request of the clerk of any court, a judge of the court may order a law-enforcement agency to take 3663 into its custody or to maintain custody of substantial quantities of any controlled substances, imitation 3664 3665 controlled substances, chemicals, marijuana, or paraphernalia used or to be used in a criminal prosecution under Chapter 11 (§ 4.1-1100 et seq.) of Title 4.1 or Chapter 7 (§ 18.2-247 et seq.) of Title 18.2. The court in 3666 its order may make provision for ensuring integrity of these items until further order of the court. 3667

3668 § 19.2-389. Dissemination of criminal history record information.

3669 A. Criminal history record information shall be disseminated, whether directly or through an intermediary, 3670 only to:

Upon receipt of a written request from an employer or prospective employer, the Central Criminal 3921 Records Exchange, or the criminal justice agency in cases of offenses not required to be reported to the 3922 Exchange, shall furnish at the employer's cost a copy of conviction data covering the person named in the 3923 request to the employer or prospective employer making the request, provided that the person on whom the 3924 data is being obtained has consented in writing to the making of such request and has presented a photoidentification to the employer or prospective employer. 4162 B. A qualified entity may request the Department of State Police to conduct a national criminal

4163 background check on any provider who is employed by such entity. No qualified entity may request a4164 national criminal background check on a provider until such provider has:

*underage marijuana use,* and drunk driving shall be provided in the public schools. The Virginia Alcoholic
Beverage Control Authority *and the Virginia Cannabis Control Authority* shall provide educational materials
to the Department of Education. The Department of Education shall review and shall distribute such materials
as are approved to the public schools.

The Virginia Foundation for Healthy Youth shall develop and the Department of Education shall
distribute to each local school division educational materials concerning the health and safety risks of using
retail tobacco products and hemp products intended for smoking, as such terms are defined in § 18.2-371.2.

A school board 4243 may, by regulation, authorize the division superintendent or his designee to conduct a preliminary review of 4244 such cases to determine whether a disciplinary action other than expulsion is appropriate. Such regulations 4245 shall ensure that, if a determination is made that another disciplinary action is appropriate, any such subsequent disciplinary action is to be taken in accordance with the procedures set forth in this article. 4246 4247 Nothing in this section shall be construed to require a student's expulsion regardless of the facts of the 4248 particular situation.

4249 B. Each school board shall revise its standards of student conduct to incorporate the requirements of this4250 section no later than three months after the date on which this act becomes effective.

- 4252 A. The board of visitors of each baccalaureate public institution of higher education or its designee may:

In addition to the powers set forth in Restructured Higher Education Financial and Administrative Operations Act (§ 23.1-1000 et seq.), lease or sell and convey its interest in any real property that it has acquired by purchase, will, or deed of gift, subject to the prior approval of the Governor and any terms and conditions of the will or deed of gift, if applicable. The proceeds shall be held, used, and administered in the same manner as all other gifts and bequests;

4264 2. Grant easements for roads, streets, sewers, waterlines, electric and other utility lines, or other purposes4265 on any property owned by the institution;

4266 3. Adopt regulations or institution policies for parking and traffic on property owned, leased, maintained,4267 or controlled by the institution;

4268 4. Adopt regulations or institution policies for the employment and dismissal of professors, teachers, 4269 instructors, and other employees;

5. Adopt regulations or institution policies for the acceptance and assistance of students in addition to the regulations or institution policies required pursuant to § 23.1-1303;

A. It shall be unlawful for any person to obtain a Virginia driver's license, special identification card,
vehicle registration, certificate of title, or other document issued by the Department if such person has not
satisfied all legal and procedural requirements for the issuance thereof, or is otherwise not legally entitled
thereto, including obtaining any document issued by the Department through the use of counterfeit, forged, or
altered documents.

A violation of this section may be prosecuted in the jurisdiction (i) from which any person obtained any document issued by the Department, (ii) where any person received or created any counterfeit, forged, or altered document used to obtain any document issued by the Department, or (iii) where any counterfeit, forged, or altered document has been filed with the Department.

#### 4321 § 46.2-347. Fraudulent use of driver's license or Department of Motor Vehicles identification card 4322 to obtain alcoholic beverages or marijuana; penalties.

4323 Any underage person as specified in § 4.1-304 who knowingly uses or attempts to use a forged, deceptive 4324 or otherwise nongenuine driver's license issued by any state, territory or possession of the United States, the 4325 District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico or any foreign country or government; United States 4326 Armed Forces identification card; United States passport or foreign government visa; Virginia Department of 4327 Motor Vehicles special identification card; official identification issued by any other federal, state or foreign 4328 government agency; or official student identification card of an institution of higher education to obtain 4329 alcoholic beverages shall be or marijuana is guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor, and upon conviction of a 4330 violation of this section, the court shall revoke such convicted person's driver's license or privilege to drive a 4331 motor vehicle for a period of not less than 30 days nor more than one year.

#### 4332 § 48-17.1. Temporary injunctions against alcoholic beverage or marijuana sales.

4333 A. Any locality by or through its mayor, chief executive, or attorney may petition a circuit court to 4334 temporarily enjoin the sale of alcohol *or marijuana* at any establishment licensed by the Virginia Alcoholic 4335 Beverage Control Authority or the Virginia Cannabis Control Authority. The basis for such petition shall be 4336 the operator of the establishment has allowed it to become a meeting place for persons committing serious 4337 criminal violations of the law on or immediately adjacent to the premises so frequent and serious as to be 4338 deemed a continuing threat to public safety, as represented in an affidavit by the chief law-enforcement 4339 officer of the locality, supported by records of such criminal acts. The court shall, upon the presentation of 4340 evidence at a hearing on the matter, grant a temporary injunction, without bond, enjoining the sale of alcohol 4341 or marijuana at the establishment, if it appears to the satisfaction of the court that the threat to public safety 4342 complained of exists and is likely to continue if such injunction is not granted. The court hearing on the 4343 petition shall be held within 10 days of service upon the respondent. The respondent shall be served with 4344 notice of the time and place of the hearing and copies of all documentary evidence to be relied upon by the 4345 complainant at such hearing. Any injunction issued by the court shall be dissolved in the event the court later

#### § 53.1-231.2. Restoration of the civil right to be eligible to register to vote to certain persons. 4356

4357 This section shall apply to any person who is not a qualified voter because of a felony conviction, who 4358 seeks to have his right to register to vote restored and become eligible to register to vote, and who meets the 4359 conditions and requirements set out in this section.

Any person, other than a person (i) convicted of a violent felony as defined in § 19.2-297.1 or in 4360 4361 subsection C of § 17.1-805 and any crime ancillary thereto; (ii) convicted of a felony pursuant to § 4.1-1101, 4.1-1114, 18.2-248, 18.2-248.01, 18.2-248.1, 18.2-255, 18.2-255.2, or 18.2-258.02; or (iii) convicted of a 4362 4363 felony pursuant to § 24.2-1016, may petition the circuit court of the county or city in which he was convicted 4364 of a felony, or the circuit court of the county or city in which he presently resides, for restoration of his civil right to be eligible to register to vote through the process set out in this section. On such petition, the court 4365 may approve the petition for restoration to the person of his right if the court is satisfied from the evidence 4366 4367 presented that the petitioner has completed, five or more years previously, service of any sentence and any 4368 modification of sentence including probation, parole, and suspension of sentence; that the petitioner has 4369 demonstrated civic responsibility through community or comparable service; and that the petitioner has been 4370 free from criminal convictions, excluding traffic infractions, for the same period.

If the court approves the petition, it shall so state in an order, provide a copy of the order to the petitioner, 4371 and transmit its order to the Secretary of the Commonwealth. The order shall state that the petitioner's right to 4372 4373 be eligible to register to vote may be restored by the date that is 90 days after the date of the order, subject to 4374 the approval or denial of restoration of that right by the Governor. The Secretary of the Commonwealth shall 4375 transmit the order to the Governor who may grant or deny the petition for restoration of the right to be eligible to register to vote approved by the court order. The Secretary of the Commonwealth shall send, 4376 4377 within 90 days of the date of the order, to the petitioner at the address stated on the court's order, a certificate of restoration of that right or notice that the Governor has denied the restoration of that right. The Governor's 4378 4379 denial of a petition for the restoration of voting rights shall be a final decision and the petitioner shall have no right of appeal. The Secretary shall notify the court and the State Board of Elections in each case of the 4380 4381 restoration of the right or denial of restoration by the Governor.

4382 On receipt of the certificate of restoration of the right to register to vote from the Secretary of the 4383 Commonwealth, the petitioner, who is otherwise a qualified voter, shall become eligible to register to vote. 4384

#### § 54.1-2903. What constitutes practice; advertising in connection with medical practice.

4385 A. Any person shall be regarded as practicing the healing arts who actually engages in such practice as defined in this chapter, or who opens an office for such purpose, or who advertises or announces to the public 4386 in any manner a readiness to practice or who uses in connection with his name the words or letters "Doctor," 4387 "Dr.," "M.D.," "D.O.," "D.P.M.," "D.C.," "Healer," "N.P.," or any other title, word, letter or designation 4388 4389 intending to designate or imply that he is a practitioner of the healing arts or that he is able to heal, cure or 4390 relieve those suffering from any injury, deformity or disease.

4391 Signing a birth or death certificate, or signing any statement certifying that the person so signing has rendered professional service to the sick or injured, or signing or issuing a prescription for drugs or other 4392 4393 remedial agents, shall be prima facie evidence that the person signing or issuing such writing is practicing the healing arts within the meaning of this chapter except where persons other than physicians are required to 4394 4395 sign birth certificates.

B. No person regulated under this chapter shall use the title "Doctor" or the abbreviation "Dr." in writing 4396 4397 or in advertising in connection with his practice unless he simultaneously uses words, initials, an abbreviation or designation, or other language that identifies the type of practice for which he is licensed. No person 4398 4399 regulated under this chapter shall include in any advertisement a reference to marijuana, as defined in § 4400 18.2-247 54.1-3401, unless such advertisement is for the treatment of addiction or substance abuse. However, nothing in this subsection shall prevent a person from including in any advertisement that such person is 4401 registered with the Board of Directors of the Virginia Cannabis Control Authority to issue written 4402 4403 certifications for the use of cannabis products, as defined in § 4.1-1600. 4404

## § 54.1-4426. Accounting services for licensed marijuana establishments.

A. As used in this section, "licensed" and "marijuana establishment" have the same meanings as provided 4405 4406 in § 4.1-600.

The provisions of this subdivision shall not apply to any amendment to federal income tax law that is either subsequently adopted by the General Assembly or a federal tax extender as defined in subdivision b.

#### 4494 § 59.1-200. (Effective until July 1, 2025) Prohibited practices.

4495 A. The following fraudulent acts or practices committed by a supplier in connection with a consumer transaction are hereby declared unlawful: 4496

4497 1. Misrepresenting goods or services as those of another;

4498 2. Misrepresenting the source, sponsorship, approval, or certification of goods or services;

4499 3. Misrepresenting the affiliation, connection, or association of the supplier, or of the goods or services, 4500 with another;

4501 4. Misrepresenting geographic origin in connection with goods or services;

5. Misrepresenting that goods or services have certain quantities, characteristics, ingredients, uses, or 4502 4503 benefits; 4504

6. Misrepresenting that goods or services are of a particular standard, quality, grade, style, or model;

4505 7. Advertising or offering for sale goods that are used, secondhand, repossessed, defective, blemished, deteriorated, or reconditioned, or that are "seconds," irregulars, imperfects, or "not first class," without clearly 4506 and unequivocally indicating in the advertisement or offer for sale that the goods are used, secondhand, 4507 repossessed, defective, blemished, deteriorated, reconditioned, or are "seconds," irregulars, imperfects, or 4508 "not first class"; 4509

8. Advertising goods or services with intent not to sell them as advertised, or with intent not to sell at the 4510 4511 price or upon the terms advertised.

4512 In any action brought under this subdivision, the refusal by any person, or any employee, agent, or servant 4513 thereof, to sell any goods or services advertised or offered for sale at the price or upon the terms advertised or 4514 offered, shall be prima facie evidence of a violation of this subdivision. 4523 11. Misrepresenting by the use of any written or documentary material that appears to be an invoice or bill 4524 for merchandise or services previously ordered;

12. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, using in any manner the words "wholesale," 4525 "wholesaler," "factory," or "manufacturer" in the supplier's name, or to describe the nature of the supplier's 4526 4527 business, unless the supplier is actually engaged primarily in selling at wholesale or in manufacturing the 4528 goods or services advertised or offered for sale;

4529 13. Using in any contract or lease any liquidated damage clause, penalty clause, or waiver of defense, or attempting to collect any liquidated damages or penalties under any clause, waiver, damages, or penalties that 4530

- 4542 16. Failing to disclose all conditions, charges, or fees relating to:

4543 a. The return of goods for refund, exchange, or credit. Such disclosure shall be by means of a sign 4544 attached to the goods, or placed in a conspicuous public area of the premises of the supplier, so as to be 4545 readily noticeable and readable by the person obtaining the goods from the supplier. If the supplier does not 4546 permit a refund, exchange, or credit for return, he shall so state on a similar sign. The provisions of this 4547 subdivision shall not apply to any retail merchant who has a policy of providing, for a period of not less than 20 days after date of purchase, a cash refund or credit to the purchaser's credit card account for the return of 4548 4549 defective, unused, or undamaged merchandise upon presentation of proof of purchase. shall include the conditions, charges, or fees in the event that a consumer breaches the agreement;

4561 16a. Failing to provide written notice to a consumer of an existing open-end credit balance in excess of \$5
4562 (i) on an account maintained by the supplier and (ii) resulting from such consumer's overpayment on such account. Suppliers shall give consumers written notice of such credit balances within 60 days of receiving overpayments. obligation to pay for the goods or services;

69. Selling or offering for sale any substance intended for human consumption, orally or by inhalation,
that contains a synthetic derivative of tetrahydrocannabinol. As used in this subdivision, "synthetic derivative" means a chemical compound produced by man through a chemical transformation to turn a
compound into a different compound by adding or subtracting molecules to or from the original compound.
This subdivision shall not (i) apply to products that are approved for marketing by the U.S. Food and Drug
Administration and scheduled in the Drug Control Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.) or (ii) be construed to prohibit
any conduct permitted under Chapter 16 (§ 4.1-1600 et seq.) of Title 4.1;

70. Selling or offering for sale to a person younger than 21 years of age any substance intended for human consumption, orally or by inhalation, that contains tetrahydrocannabinol. This subdivision shall not (i) apply to products that are approved for marketing by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and scheduled in the Drug Control Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.) or (ii) be construed to prohibit any conduct permitted under Chapter 16 (§ 4.1-1600 et seq.) the Cannabis Control Act (§ 4.1-600 et seq.) of Title 4.1;

4878 71. Selling or offering for sale any substance intended for human consumption, orally or by inhalation, that contains tetrahydrocannabinol, unless such substance is (i) contained in child-resistant packaging, as 4879 4880 defined in § 4.1-600; (ii) equipped with a label that states, in English and in a font no less than 1/16 of an 4881 inch, (a) that the substance contains tetrahydrocannabinol and may not be sold to persons younger than 21 years of age, (b) all ingredients contained in the substance, (c) the amount of such substance that constitutes a 4882 4883 single serving, and (d) the total percentage and milligrams of tetrahydrocannabinol included in the substance 4884 and the number of milligrams of tetrahydrocannabinol that are contained in each serving; and (iii) 4885 accompanied by a certificate of analysis, produced by an independent laboratory that is accredited pursuant to 4886 standard ISO/IEC 17025 of the International Organization of Standardization by a third-party accrediting 4887 body a licensed marijuana testing facility, that states the tetrahydrocannabinol concentration of the substance or the tetrahydrocannabinol concentration of the batch from which the substance originates. This subdivision 4888 shall not (i) apply to products that are approved for marketing by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and 4889 4890 scheduled in the Drug Control Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.) or (ii) be construed to prohibit any conduct permitted under Chapter 16 (§ 4.1-1600 et seq.) the Cannabis Control Act (§ 4.1-600 et seq.) of Title 4.1; 4891

4892 72. Manufacturing, offering for sale at retail, or selling at retail an industrial hemp extract, as defined in §
4893 3.2-5145.1, a food containing an industrial hemp extract, or a substance containing tetrahydrocannabinol that
4894 depicts or is in the shape of a human, animal, vehicle, or fruit;

4895 73. Selling or offering for sale any substance intended for human consumption, orally or by inhalation,
4896 that contains tetrahydrocannabinol and, without authorization, bears, is packaged in a container or wrapper
4897 that bears, or is otherwise labeled to bear the trademark, trade name, famous mark as defined in 15 U.S.C. §
4898 1125, or other identifying mark, imprint, or device, or any likeness thereof, of a manufacturer, processor,
4899 packer, or distributor of a product intended for human consumption other than the manufacturer, processor,

For purposes of this subdivision, "ignition interlock system" has the 4919 same meaning as ascribed to that term in § 18.2-270.1 and "targeted advertising" has the same meaning 4920 ascribed to that term in § 59.1-575 and includes direct mailings to an individual. This provision shall not 4921 apply to ignition interlock service vendor ads, pamphlets, or kiosk advertisements approved by the 4922 Commission on the Virginia Alcohol Safety Action Program and provided at a Commission-approved 4923 location;

That the Virginia Cannabis Control Authority (the Authority) may, on and after September 1, 2025, 4950 begin accepting license applications from all applicants, including pharmaceutical processors and 4951 cannabis dispensing facilities that hold a permit pursuant to Chapter 16 (§ 4.1-1600 et seq.) of Title 4.1 4952 of the Code of Virginia and industrial hemp processors or growers that are registered with the Commissioner of Agriculture and Consumer Services pursuant to Chapter 41.1 (§ 3.2-4112 et seq.) of 4953 4954 Title 3.2 of the Code of Virginia, and issuing licenses pursuant to the provisions of § 4.1-1000 of the 4955 Code of Virginia, as created by this act. Notwithstanding the third enactment of this act, any applicant 4956 issued a license by the Authority may operate in accordance with the provisions of this act prior to 4957 May 1, 2026; however, prior to May 1, 2026, no licensee may engage in the retail sale of marijuana, 4958 marijuana products, immature marijuana plants, or marijuana seeds. Notwithstanding any other 4959 provision of law, on or after September 1, 2025, and prior to May 1, 2026, no marijuana cultivation 4960 facility licensee, marijuana processing facility licensee, marijuana transporter licensee, retail

4961 marijuana store licensee, or marijuana testing facility licensee or agent or employee thereof shall be 4962 subject to arrest or prosecution for a violation of Chapter 11 (§ 4.1-1100 et seq.) of Title 4.1 of the Code of Virginia or § 18.2-248, 18.2-248.01, 18.2-255, 18.2-255.1, 18.2-255.2, 18.2-258, 18.2-258.02, 18.2-265.3, 4963 4964 or 18.2-308.4 of the Code of Virginia, as amended by this act, or § 18.2-248.1 of the Code of Virginia, as 4965 repealed by this act, involving marijuana if such violation is related to acts committed within the scope 4966 of the licensure or employment and in accordance with the provisions of the Cannabis Control Act (§ 4.1-600 et seq. of the Code of Virginia) and this enactment. From September 1, 2025, to September 1, 4967 2030, the Authority shall reserve license slots for all pharmaceutical processors and cannabis 4968 4969 dispensing facilities that have been issued a permit by the Board of Directors (the Board) of the 4970 Authority pursuant to Chapter 16 (§ 4.1-1600 et seq.) of Title 4.1 of the Code of Virginia and issue 4971 applicable licenses for any location for which such a permit has been issued, provided the applicable 4972 licensing requirements are met. The Board shall not permit any marijuana cultivation facility licensee 4973 to engage in the outdoor growth of marijuana plants until the Board has promulgated regulations governing outdoor growth pursuant to § 4.1-606 of the Code of Virginia, as amended by this act. 4974 4975 Priority for tier IV and tier V marijuana cultivation facility licenses shall be given to pharmaceutical 4976 processors that have been issued a permit by the Board pursuant to Chapter 16 (§ 4.1-1600 et seq.) of Title 4.1 of the Code of Virginia and no less than five industrial hemp processors or growers that are 4977 4978 registered with the Commissioner of Agriculture and Consumer Services pursuant to Chapter 41.1 (§ 4979 3.2-4112 et seq.) of Title 3.2 of the Code of Virginia and completed such registration prior to January 1, 4980 2021.

4981 5. That the Board of Directors of the Virginia Cannabis Control Authority shall establish a seed-to-sale 4982 tracking system pursuant to § 4.1-611 of the Code of Virginia by December 31, 2025.

6. That the Virginia Cannabis Control Authority (the Authority) shall (i) analyze whether any limits should be placed on the number of licenses issued to operate a marijuana establishment, (ii) analyze and identify any necessary adjustments regarding canopy limits for marijuana cultivation facility licensees, and (iii) report its finding to the General Assembly by November 1, 2026. The Authority shall continue such analysis and submit updated findings to the General Assembly for two years after such initial report and shall submit such updated findings by November 1 during the two subsequent years.

4989 7. That the Board of Directors (the Board) of the Virginia Cannabis Control Authority shall 4990 promulgate regulations to implement the provisions of this act by December 31, 2025. 9. That the initial referendum authorized by § 4.1-629 of the Code of Virginia, as created by this act, on the question of whether the operation of retail marijuana stores shall be prohibited in a particular locality shall be held and results certified by December 31, 2025. A referendum on such question shall not be permitted in a locality after January 1, 2026, unless such referendum follows a referendum held prior to December 31, 2025, and any subsequent referendum, in which a majority of the qualified

5004 voters voting in such referendum voted "Yes" to prohibit the operation of retail marijuana stores.

5005 10. That the provisions of the first enactment amending subsection B of § 4.1-614 of the Code of 5006 Virginia, as amended by this act, shall become effective July 1, 2027.

5007 11. That the provisions of this act may result in a net increase in periods of imprisonment or 5008 commitment. Pursuant to § 30-19.1:4 of the Code of Virginia, the estimated amount of the necessary 5009 appropriation cannot be determined for periods of imprisonment in state adult correctional facilities; 5010 therefore, Chapter 2 of the Acts of Assembly of 2024, Special Session I, requires the Virginia Criminal

5011 Sentencing Commission to assign a minimum fiscal impact of \$50,000. Pursuant to § 30-19.1:4 of the

5012 Code of Virginia, the estimated amount of the necessary appropriation cannot be determined for

5013 periods of commitment to the custody of the Department of Juvenile Justice.
