6	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

8 9	CHARTER FOR THE
10	TOWN OF SHENANDOAH.
11	§ 1. Town incorporated; powers generally.
12	The Town of Shenandoah, in the County of Page, shall continue to be a town corporate, in the name and
13 14	style of the Town of Shenandoah and as such shall have and exercise all the powers conferred upon towns by the general laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia concerning towns now in force or that hereafter may be
15 16	enacted for the government of towns so far as the same are not inconsistent with this act. § 2. Boundaries.
17	The boundaries of the Town shall remain as now established unless changed in accordance with
18	applicable law.
19 20	§ 3. Government vested in Town council; composition of council and qualifications of members.
20 21	The government of said Town shall be vested in a Town council, which shall be composed of the Mayor and six council members, each of whom shall be a qualified voter within the said Town.
22	§ 4. Election of Mayor; term of office.
23	The Mayor shall be elected at large at the November 2026 general election, and every two years
24 25	thereafter, and shall hold office for two years from the first day of January next succeeding his election. § 4.1. Election of council members; term of office.
25 26	The Town council shall be a continuing body, and no measure pending before such body shall abate or be
27	discontinued by reason of expiration of the term of office or removal of any or all of the members. The Mayor
28	and council in office at the time of adoption of this charter shall continue in office until the expiration of the
29 30	terms to which they were elected or until their successors are elected and qualified. Accordingly, at the time of the general election in November of 2026, there will be an election for Mayor and three council positions
31	and, in November 2028, there will be an election for the Mayor and the other three council positions. The
32	terms of council members shall be for four years, beginning on the first day of January next succeeding their
33	election. Council members shall be elected by the locality at large.
34 35	§ 5. Officers appointed by council. The Town council may appoint the following officers, who serve at the pleasure of the council:
36	(a) Town Manager. The Town Manager shall be responsible to the Town council for the proper
37	administration of all affairs of the Town, for the control and management of all Town departments and
38 39	property, for the appointment, supervision, discipline and dismissal of all Town employees (except, with
40	respect to Town council appointed officers, appointment and dismissal shall be by act of the Town council), for the preparation and implementation of an annual budget, and for any other duties as prescribed by the
41	council and is vested with all the powers provided by the general laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia. The
42	Town Manager shall also perform other duties and receive such compensation as the Town council may
43 44	prescribe. The Town Manager may also hold the position of Town Clerk. (b) Town Treasurer. The Town Treasurer shall keep the Town's books and accounts and collect all the
45	taxes, revenues, and assessments that may be levied by the council and is vested with all the powers provided
46	by the general laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia. The Town Treasurer shall also perform other duties
47 48	and receive such compensation as the Town council may prescribe.
48 49	(c) Town Clerk. The Town Clerk shall attend the meetings of the council, keep a record of its proceedings, and generally perform such other acts and duties as the council may from time to time prescribe. The Town
50	Clerk shall receive such compensation as the council may prescribe and may also hold the office of Town
51	Treasurer so long as he or she is not a member of the Town council.
52 53	(d) Town Attorney. The Town Attorney shall be an attorney at law licensed to practice under the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia. The Town Attorney shall receive such compensation as may be determined by
55 54	the council and shall have such duties as prescribed by the council.
55	(e) Chief of Police. The Chief of Police shall be the head of the Town of Shenandoah Police Department
56	and shall be a law-enforcement officer responsible for the enforcement of the criminal laws and such other

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duties prescribed by the laws of the Town and the Commonwealth of Virginia. The Chief of Police shall also 57

58 perform other duties and receive such compensation as the Town council may prescribe. The Chief of Police 59 shall have all powers that are now or may hereafter be provided to law-enforcement officers and police 60 chiefs by the Commonwealth of Virginia.

(f) Other officers. The Town council may appoint such other officers as may be necessary to conduct the 61 62 business of the Town, prescribe their duties, and fix their compensation.

63 The Town council may designate a person to act in an interim capacity for any of the foregoing officers 64 during the absence or incapacity of such officer.

All Town officers already in office at the time of the enactment of this charter shall continue until further 65 66 action of the Town council.

67 Any officer appointed by the council may be removed at its pleasure. The council may fill any vacancy in 68 any appointed office. 69

§ 6. Mayor; powers and duties.

The Mayor shall have the following powers and duties:

71 (a) The Mayor shall see that the bylaws and ordinances of the Town are fully executed and enforced. He shall preside over the meetings of the Town council and shall have the same right to speak therein as 72 73 members of the Town council but shall not vote except in the case of a tie. He shall be recognized as the head 74 of the Town council and the head of the Town government for all ceremonial purposes. He shall perform such 75 other duties consistent with his office as may be imposed by the council. In times of public danger or emergencies, he may take command of the police and maintain order and enforce laws, and for this purpose 76 77 may deputize such assistant law-enforcement officers as may be necessary.

78 (b) The Mayor, or the person acting as Mayor, shall authenticate with his signature every ordinance and 79 resolution adopted by the council, and such documents or instruments as the council, this charter, or the laws 80 of the Commonwealth shall require.

81 (c) The Mayor shall see that the duties of the various Town officers, agents, and employees are faithfully 82 performed. The Mayor shall have power to investigate their accounts and have access to all of their books 83 and documents in their offices. 84

§ 7. Salary.

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The salary of the Mayor and council members shall be fixed by the Town council.

§ 8. Vice Mayor.

87 A Vice Mayor shall be elected by a majority of the council at its organizational meeting after the general 88 election of 2026 to a term of two years, and every two years thereafter. The Vice Mayor shall possess the 89 powers and discharge the duties of the Mayor during any period of absence or disability of the Mayor. While 90 serving in the place of the Mayor, the Vice Mayor may vote as a member of the Town council. If the Vice 91 Mayor is also absent or unable to act, the council may choose another council member to possess the powers 92 and discharge the Mayor's duties during the period of the Vice Mayor and Mayor's absence or disability. 93 While serving in the place of the Mayor, such council member may vote as a member of the Town council. 94 The council may provide reasonable compensation to the Vice Mayor or other council member discharging 95 the duties of the Mayor pursuant to this section. Upon the adoption of this charter, the current Vice Mayor of 96 the council shall serve as Vice Mayor until the organizational meeting after the general election of 2026. 97

§ 9. Public utilities; acquisition, maintenance, etc., of waterworks and other utilities.

98 The Town shall have the right to maintain, operate, acquire, construct, and keep waterworks and electric plants, and any other plants or property which towns have the right to conduct, maintain, acquire, operate, 99 100 and construct under the general laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia. 101

§ 10. Public utilities; appointment of officers; establishment of regulations; fixing of rates.

For the purpose of properly conducting its waterworks, electric plant, and other public works, the council 102 may employ such officers, agents, and employees as it may deem necessary, and fix the compensation of the 103 104 same; may promulgate and establish such rules and regulations in regard to the use and maintenance of such water, water systems, electric plant, and public works as it thinks best; may fix the rates for the use of water, 105 electricity, et cetera, from its works, and provide for the collection of the same; may change and alter the 106 rates at any time, without notice; and the council shall be the sole judge of the rates to be charged for such 107 108 service; and the council is granted all the powers which a municipal corporation has in the operation of its 109 public works. 110

§ 11. Sewers and sewage systems.

111 The Town may construct, maintain, and operate sewers and sewage systems, and charge for connections 112 therewith, and the use thereof such rates as the council may deem proper, and may change the same from time to time without notice. The council may establish and promulgate any rules and regulations in regard to 113 the connection, or continued use thereof as it may deem proper; may refuse any connection, and disconnect 114 the same if for any reason the connection, or continued use thereof, becomes inimical to the public welfare, 115 116 or detrimental to the sewage system, or if the charges therefor be unpaid, and the council may be the sole judge when the same is to be disconnected or when the connection is to be refused. 117

118 § 12. Miscellaneous powers.

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119 (a) Removal or reconstruction of unsafe buildings, etc.; protection of public gatherings.

120 The Town may regulate the size, height, materials, and construction of buildings, fences, walls, retaining

121 walls, and other structures hereafter erected in such manner as the public safety and conveniences may 122

require; remove or require to be removed or reconstructed any building, structure, or addition thereto, which 123 by reason of dilapidation, defect of structure, or other causes may have become dangerous to life or property,

124 or which may have been erected contrary to law; and enact stringent and efficient laws for securing the

125 safety of persons from fires in halls and buildings used for public assemblies, entertainments, or amusements.

(b) Fees for permits, etc.

The Town may charge and collect fees for permits to use public facilities and for public services and 127 128 privileges.

129 (c) Cemeteries.

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130 The Town may provide in or near the Town lands to be used as burial places for the dead; improve and 131 care for the same and the approaches thereto; charge for and regulate the use of ground therein; and provide 132 for the perpetual upkeep and care of any plot or burial lot therein. The Town is authorized to take and 133 receive sums of money by gift, bequest, or otherwise, to be kept or invested, and the income thereof is to be 134 used for the perpetual upkeep and care of the said lot or plat for which the said donation, gift, or bequest 135 shall have been made.

136 (d) Injunctive relief.

137 The Town may maintain a suit to restrain by injunction the violation of any ordinance, notwithstanding 138 any punishment that may be provided for the violation of such ordinance.

139 § 13. Contractual powers; gifts; grants.

140 (a) Acquisition of property generally; holding, selling, leasing, etc., Town property.

141 The Town may acquire, by purchase, gift, devise, condemnation, or otherwise, property, real and personal, or any estate or interest therein, within or without the Town or the Commonwealth of Virginia and 142 143 for any of the purposes of the Town. 144

(b) Debts and evidence of indebtedness.

145 The Town may contract debts, borrow money, and make and issue evidence of indebtedness. 146 (c) Gifts.

147 The Town may accept or refuse gifts, donations, bequests, or grants of any kind from any source, 148 absolutely or in trust, which are related to the Town's powers, duties, and functions, or for educational, 149 charitable, or other public purposes, and do all the things and acts necessary to carry out the purposes of 150 such gifts, grants, bequests, and devises, with power to manage, maintain, operate, sell, lease, or otherwise 151 handle or dispose of the same, in accordance with terms and conditions of such gifts, grants, bequests, and 152 devises. The Town shall also have the authority to make appropriations of public funds, of personal property 153 or any real estate and donations to any charitable institution or association, located within its respective 154 limits or outside its limits, if such institution or association provides services to residents of the Town. 155

§ 14. Adoption of ordinances.

All ordinances of the Town must, before becoming effective, be enacted by a majority vote of the council 156 and be approved by the Mayor, and if disapproved by the Mayor, shall become effective only upon the 157 158 affirmative vote of the council by at least four members thereof entered of record. 159

§ 15. Council; meetings; quorum.

160 (a) Regular meetings. The Town council shall by ordinance fix the time of their regular meetings. The 161 council may convene at such additional times as it may deem necessary in accordance with applicable law.

(b) Special meetings. A special meeting may be called by the Mayor or by three or more council members, 162 163 provided that the Mayor and all council members are notified a reasonable period of time prior to the 164 meeting, or are present, or sign a waiver, which may be signed after the meeting. No business shall be 165 transacted at a special meeting except that for which it is called unless all members of the council are present or sign a waiver, which may be signed after the meeting. 166

167 (c) Quorum. Four members of the council shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. As the Mayor does not vote, the Mayor's attendance does not count towards the quorum requirement. 168

169 (d) Procedural rules. The council may adopt its own rules of order and procedure that govern meetings of 170 the council. 171

§ 16. Town powers enumerated.

The Town may do all things whatsoever necessary or expedient for promoting or maintaining the general 172 173 welfare, comfort, education, morals, peace, government, health, trade, commerce, or industries of the Town 174 or its inhabitants; prescribe any penalty for the violation of any Town ordinance, rule, or regulation or of 175 any provisions of this charter, not exceeding the fine or sentence imposed by the laws of the Commonwealth 176 of Virginia; pass and enforce all bylaws, rules, regulations, and ordinances that it may deem necessary for 177 the good order and government of the Town, the management of its property, the conduct of its affairs, and 178 the peace, comfort, convenience, order, morals, health, and protection of its citizens or their property; and do 179 such other things and pass such other laws as may be necessary or proper to carry into full effect any power, 180 authority, capacity, or jurisdiction that is or shall be granted to or vested in said Town, or in the council,

court, or offices thereof, or which may be necessarily incident to a municipal corporation. 181

182 The Town may compel the abatement and removal of all nuisances within the said Town at the expense of 183 the person or persons causing the same or the owner or occupant of the ground or premises wherein the

same may be found, and to require all lands and lots and other premises within the Town to be kept clean and 184 sanitary and free from stagnant water, weeds, filth, and unsightly deposits or to make them at the expense of 185 the owners or occupants thereof; to regulate or prevent slaughterhouses or other noisome and offensive 186

business within the Town and generally to define, prohibit, abate, and suppress and prevent all things 187 detrimental to the health, morals, safety, convenience, and welfare of its inhabitants. 188

189 § 17. Organization and maintenance of volunteer fire department.

The Town council may organize and maintain a volunteer fire department for the purpose of extinguishing 190 191 fires and protecting the buildings and property located within said Town from destruction by fires and 192 conflagrations; and said council may enact ordinances and regulations for the control and regulation of said 193 fire department.

§ 18. Licensing and regulating shows, circuses, etc.

195 The council shall have the right to license and regulate the holding and location of shows, circuses, public 196 exhibitions, carnivals, and similar shows or fairs, or prohibit the holding of the same or any of them within 197 the Town. 198

§ 19. Removal of snow from sidewalks; skating or riding bicycles thereon.

199 The council shall have the right to require the owners of real estate abutting upon paved or other 200 improved sidewalks to remove the snow therefrom, to prevent skating or riding of bicycles thereon, and of all other improper uses thereof, and to punish such violation by fine. 201

§ 20. Applicability of general laws of the Commonwealth; powers enumerated in charter not exclusive. 202

The Town council shall have all powers and authority that are now or may hereafter be granted to 203 204 councils of towns by the general laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia; and the recital of special powers 205 and authorities herein shall not be taken to exclude the exercise of any power and authority granted by the 206 general laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia to town councils, but not herein specified.

207 § 21. Ordinances continued in force.

208 All ordinances now in force in the Town, not inconsistent with this act, shall be and remain in force until 209 altered, amended, or repealed by the Town council.

§ 22. Severability of provisions. 210

211 If any clause, sentence, paragraph, or part of this charter shall for any reason be adjudged by any court 212 of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder of said charter, but shall be confined in its operations to the clause, sentence, paragraph or part thereof directly 213 214 involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered. 215

§ 23. Repealing clause.

216 All acts and parts of acts in conflict with this charter are hereby repealed, provided, however, that nothing contained in this act shall be construed to invalidate or to in any manner affect the present existing 217 218 indebtedness and liabilities of the Town, whether evidenced by bonded obligations or otherwise, or to relieve 219 it of any part of its present obligation or liability on account of bond issues, liabilities, or debts of whatsoever

220 nature or kind.

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221 2. That Chapter 163 of the Acts of Assembly of 1926, as amended, is repealed.
