Bill Number: HB 1549H1 **Patron:** Green
Bill Title: Vehicle operation; unlicensed minor; penalty.

Bill Summary: This bill provides that any person who knowingly authorizes the operation of a motor vehicle by a minor who such person knows has no operator's license or learner's permit or who has a learner's permit but who such person knows would operate such motor vehicle in violation of certain limitations on operating a motor vehicle with a learner's permit is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor if such violation results in a motor vehicle accident that causes injury or death to any person, provided that such violation does not otherwise constitute a felony. Existing law prohibits any person from knowingly authorizing the operation of a motor vehicle by any person who the authorizing person knows (i) has had his operator's license or permit suspended or revoked or (ii) has no operator's license or permit and has been previously convicted of driving without a license, and any such violation is a Class 1 misdemeanor.

Explanation: None.

Fiscal Summary: This bill expands the scope of an existing Class 1 misdemeanor, which may have an indeterminate fiscal impact to the state as explained below. The Department of Motor Vehicles will implement this bill utilizing existing staff and resources.

Fiscal Analysis: This bill would expand the scope of an existing Class 1 misdemeanor. Anyone convicted of a Class 1 misdemeanor is subject to a sentence of up to 12 months in jail and a fine of not more than \$2,500, either or both.

There is not enough information available to reliably estimate the increase in jail population as a result of this proposal. However, any increase in jail population will increase costs to the state. The Commonwealth currently pays localities \$5.00 a day for each misdemeanant or otherwise local-responsible prisoner held in a jail. It also funds a large portion of the jails' operating costs, e.g., correctional officers. The state's share of these costs on a per prisoner, per day basis varies from locality to locality. However, according to the Compensation Board's most recent Jail Cost Report (November 2024), the estimated total state support for local jails averaged \$56.38 per inmate, per day in FY 2023.

Other: This bill is a companion to SB750H1.
