Bill Number: SB903ER Patron: Stanley

Bill Title: Sale and procurement of animals by pet shops; pet shop regulations.

Bill Summary: Requires pet shops to make records of dogs taken into custody. Such records shall be maintained for at least two years and made available for State Veterinarian inspection upon request. Creates a civil penalty for violations in the section with penalties of up to \$1,000 to be remitted to the agency.

Explanation: This bill involves the Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (VDACS).

Language and dollars are included in the Introduced Budget.

Fiscal Summary: Funding for the program is included in the Introduced Budget. It is anticipated that any additional expenditure impact this bill may have on VDACS can be absorbed within existing resources.

Fiscal Analysis: This impact statement is final. HB1600/SB800 (the Introduced Budget bill) includes \$2.9 million annually (conference amendments provide an advance of \$150,000 in fiscal year 2025) from the general fund for the phased modernization of the agency's general fund supported regulatory programs. Approximately \$370,000 of this is anticipated to be spent on upgrading the State Veterinarian's online animal custody reporting system. This system migration would allow pet shops to provide similar records to animal shelters, and VDACS anticipates that such a migration is necessary to implement the provisions of this bill. It is anticipated that VDACS can absorb any additional costs associated with the implementation of this bill.

The Office of the Attorney General and the Department of Law (OAG) anticipates that the costs associated with this legislation would be absorbable within current resources. The OAG notes that while an individual bill's impact may be absorbable, if the aggregate number of "absorbable" bills likely to pass either house is unusually large, it is possible the agency will require additional resources.
