Celebrating the life of D'Angelo.

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 696

Offered October 27, 2025

WHEREAS, D'Angelo, a talented singer-songwriter, multi-instrumentalist, and record producer who was considered a pioneer of the neo soul genre of music that emerged in the late 1990s and early 2000s, died on October 14, 2025; and

WHEREAS, born Michael Eugene Archer, D'Angelo grew up in Richmond and began playing piano at the age of three; as a teenager, he formed a vocal trio, Three of a Kind, with his cousins, then formed a duo with his brother, Luther, with whom he won an amateur night competition at the Apollo Theater in Harlem;

WHEREAS, D'Angelo began experimenting with recording his own music and relocated to New York City to pursue a music career; he performed with the hip-hop group I.D.U. before receiving a record contract

WHEREAS, D'Angelo's first national success came as a songwriter and producer on "U Will Know," which was recorded by the supergroup Black Men United in 1994; the song peaked at number 28 on the Billboard Hot 100 chart, and D'Angelo was featured in the music video as the group's choir director; and

WHEREAS, in 1995, D'Angelo released his debut solo album, Brown Sugar, a labor of love on which he wrote and arranged the songs, provided vocals, performed much of the album's musical accompaniment, and served as producer; the album was credited with launching neo soul, a contemporary genre that blended classic soul sounds with rhythm and blues, hip-hop, jazz, and other types of music; and

WHEREAS, D'Angelo's second album, Voodoo, is considered one of the finest examples of neo soul and an overall masterpiece, debuting at number one in 2000; the track "Untitled (How Does It Feel)" was a major hit for its silky groove and sultry music video and was subsequently listed as the second greatest rhythm and blues song of the 21st century by Rolling Stone magazine; and

WHEREAS, in 2014, D'Angelo released his third studio album, Black Messiah, which met with widespread critical acclaim for its forays into rock and roll and psychedelic sounds; and

WHEREAS, among many accolades over the course of his career, D'Angelo won GRAMMY awards for the albums Voodoo and Black Messiah and the songs "Untitled (How Does It Feel)" and "Really Love"; and

WHEREAS, D'Angelo will be fondly remembered and greatly missed by his three children and numerous other family members and friends; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Senate of Virginia hereby note with great sadness the loss of D'Angelo, a musical luminary who inspired generations of fans and fellow recording artists; and, be it

RESOLVED FURTHER, That the Clerk of the Senate prepare a copy of this resolution for presentation to the family of D'Angelo as an expression of the Senate of Virginia's respect for his memory.
