SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 701

Celebrating the life of Donald Richard Davenport.

Agreed to by the Senate, October 30, 2025

WHEREAS, Donald Richard Davenport, an enterprising business executive, devoted activist, and beloved member of the Caroline County community, died on May 6, 2024; and

WHEREAS, raised in Richmond, Donald Davenport moved to New York City as a teenager and was present during the historic Stonewall uprising of 1969, a series of protests often credited with being the foundational moment of the gay liberation movement of the late 20th century; and

WHEREAS, for nearly 40 years, Donald Davenport served as chief executive officer of Davenport Unger Enterprises, LLC, a family-owned commercial and residential construction company, working tirelessly to enhance a variety of businesses and homes throughout the Commonwealth; and

WHEREAS, Donald Davenport worked passionately over the years to advocate for equality and LGBTQ+ rights in his roles as both fundraising vice chair of the Caroline County Democratic Committee and as vice chair for outreach and membership with the LGBTQ+ caucus of the Democratic Party of Virginia; and

WHEREAS, Donald Davenport drew from his expertise as both a business leader and activist while serving as a member of the board of the Richmond Business Alliance between 2013 and 2018, guiding the Gay Community Center of Richmond's efforts to foster unity between the Richmond LGBTQ+ community and the city's business community at large; and

WHEREAS, Donald Davenport will be fondly remembered and dearly missed by his loving husband, Charles; his son, Stephen; and numerous other family members and friends; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Senate of Virginia hereby note with great sadness the loss of Donald Richard Davenport, a treasured member of the Caroline County community whose generosity and dedication inspired all who knew him; and, be it

RESOLVED FURTHER, That the Clerk of the Senate prepare a copy of this resolution for presentation to the family of Donald Richard Davenport as an expression of the Senate of Virginia's respect for his memory.
