4 A BILL to amend and reenact §§ 22.1-289.02 and 22.1-289.030 of the Code of Virginia, relating to child
5 care; exemption from licensure; light family day homes.

8 **Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:**

9 **1. That §§ 22.1-289.02 and 22.1-289.030 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted as follows:**

10 **§ 22.1-289.02. Definitions.**

11 As used in this chapter, unless the context requires a different meaning:

12 "Child day center" means a child day program offered to (i) two or more children under the age of 13 in a
13 facility that is not the residence of the provider or of any of the children in care or (ii) 13 or more children at
14 any location.

15 "Child day program" means a regularly operating service arrangement for children where, during the
16 absence of a parent or guardian, a person or organization has agreed to assume responsibility for the
17 supervision, protection, and well-being of a child under the age of 13 for less than a 24-hour period.

18 "Early childhood care and education entity" means a child day center, family day home, or family day
19 system serving children under the age of five.

20 "Family day home" means a child day program offered in the residence of the provider or the home of any
21 of the children in care for one through 12 children under the age of 13, exclusive of the provider's own
22 children and any children who reside in the home, when at least one child receives care for compensation.
23 The provider of a licensed or registered family day home shall disclose to the parents or guardians of children
24 in their care the percentage of time per week that persons other than the provider will care for the children.
25 ~~Family Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, family day homes serving five through 12 children,
26 exclusive of the provider's own children and any children who reside in the home, shall be licensed.~~
27 However, no family day home shall care for more than four children under the age of two, including the
28 provider's own children and any children who reside in the home, unless the family day home is licensed or
29 voluntarily registered. However, a family day home where the children in care are all related to the provider
30 by blood or marriage shall not be required to be licensed.

31 "Family day system" means any person who approves family day homes as members of its system; who
32 refers children to available family day homes in that system; and who, through contractual arrangement, may
33 provide central administrative functions including, but not limited to, training of operators of member homes;
34 technical assistance and consultation to operators of member homes; inspection, supervision, monitoring, and
35 evaluation of member homes; and referral of children to available health and social services.

36 "Head Start provider" means a public or private, nonprofit or for-profit organization or agency, including
37 any community-based organization, as such term is defined in 20 U.S.C. § 7801, to which a grantee has
38 delegated all or part of the responsibility of the grantee for operating a Head Start program.

39 "Light family day home" means a family day home for five through eight children under the age of 13,
40 exclusive of the provider's own children and any children who reside in the home.

41 "Out-of-school time program" means a program that (i) serves only school-age children; (ii) operates
42 primarily before or after regular school hours, during the summer, or at times when school is not normally in
43 session; and (iii) is offered for the purpose of promoting expanded childhood learning and enrichment, child
44 and youth development, or educational, recreational, or character-building activities.

45 "Publicly funded provider" means any (i) educational program provided by a school division or local
46 government to children between birth and age five or (ii) child day program that receives state or federal
47 funds in support of its operations that serves three or more unrelated children. "Publicly funded provider"
48 does not include any program for which the sole source of public funding is (a) the federal Child and Adult
49 Care Food Program (CACFP) administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Food and Nutrition
50 Service or (b) financial assistance for military child care pursuant to 10 U.S.C. § 1798 and that is accredited
51 by a U.S. Department of Defense-approved national accrediting body. Any program described in clause (b)
52 shall subsequently be considered a publicly funded provider if each child for whom such program receives
53 such financial assistance for military child care either disenrolls from or ages out of such program.

54 "Registered family day home" means any family day home that has met the standards for voluntary
55 registration for such homes pursuant to regulations adopted by the Board and that has obtained a certificate of
56 registration from the Superintendent.

59 § 22.1-289.030. Exemptions from licensure.

60 A. The following programs are not child day programs and shall not be required to be licensed:

61 1. A program of instructional experience in a single focus, such as, but not limited to, computer science, archaeology, sport clinics, or music, if children under the age of six do not attend at all and if no child is allowed to attend for more than 25 days in any three-month period commencing with enrollment. This exemption does not apply if children merely change their enrollment to a different focus area at a site offering a variety of activities and such children's attendance exceeds 25 days in a three-month period.

62 2. Programs of instructional or recreational activities wherein no child under age five attends for more than six hours weekly with no class or activity period to exceed one and one-half hours, and no child five years of age or above attends for more than six hours weekly when school is in session or 12 hours weekly when school is not in session. Competition, performances, and exhibitions related to the instructional or recreational activity shall be excluded when determining the hours of program operation.

63 3. Instructional programs offered by private schools that serve school-age children and that satisfy compulsory attendance laws or provide services under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, as amended, and programs of school-sponsored extracurricular activities that are focused on single interests such as, but not limited to, music, sports, drama, civic service, or foreign language.

64 4. Instructional programs offered by public schools that serve preschool-age children, satisfy compulsory attendance laws, or provide services under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (20 U.S.C. § 1400 et seq.), as amended, and programs of school-sponsored extracurricular activities that are focused on single interests such as, but not limited to, music, sports, drama, civic service, or foreign language.

65 5. Early intervention programs for children eligible under Part C of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (20 U.S.C. § 1431 et seq.), as amended, wherein no child attends for more than a total of six hours per week.

66 6. Practice or competition in organized competitive sports leagues.

67 7. Programs of religious instruction, such as Sunday schools, vacation Bible schools, Bar Mitzvah or Bat Mitzvah classes, and nurseries offered by religious institutions and provided for the duration of specified religious services or related activities to allow parents or guardians or their designees who are on site to attend such religious services and activities.

68 8. A program of instructional or athletic experience operated during the summer months by, and as an extension of, an accredited private elementary, middle, or high school program as set forth in § 22.1-19 and administered by the Virginia Council for Private Education.

69 9. Programs providing instructional experience in horse riding, provided that (i) such a program is taught (a) by an adult with a recognized certification in horse riding instruction and (b) to fewer than 12 children at any time, (ii) at least one adult actively supervises no more than three children at any time during such a program, and (iii) the majority of programming for any such program relates to horse riding and equine activities.

70 B. The following child day programs shall not be required to be licensed:

71 1. A child day center that has obtained an exemption pursuant to § 22.1-289.031.

72 2. A program where, by written policy given to and signed by a parent or guardian, school-age children are free to enter and leave the premises without permission. A program that would qualify for this exemption except that it assumes responsibility for the supervision, protection, and well-being of several children with disabilities who are mainstreamed shall not be subject to licensure.

73 3. A program that operates no more than a total of 20 program days in the course of a calendar year, provided that programs serving children under age six operate no more than two consecutive weeks without a break of at least a week.

74 4. Child-minding services that are not available for more than three hours per day for any individual child offered on site in commercial or recreational establishments if the parent or guardian (i) can be contacted and can resume responsibility for the child's supervision within 30 minutes and (ii) is receiving or providing services or participating in activities offered by the establishment.

75 5. A certified preschool or nursery school program operated by an accredited private school as set forth in § 22.1-19 and administered by the Virginia Council for Private Education that complies with the provisions of § 22.1-289.032.

76 6. A program of recreational activities offered by local governments, staffed by local government employees, and attended by school-age children. Such programs shall be subject to safety and supervisory standards established by the local government offering the program.

77 7. A program offered by a local school division, operated for no more than four hours per day on full instructional days or for more than four hours per day on shortened instructional days or noninstructional days, staffed by local school division employees, and attended by children who are at least three years of age and are enrolled in public school or a preschool program within such school division. Such programs shall be subject to safety and supervisory standards established by the local school division offering the program.

78 8. Child-minding services offered by a business on the premises of the business to no more than four children under the age of 13 at any given time and for no more than eight hours per day, provided that the

121 parent or guardian of every child receiving care is an employee of the business who is on the premises of the
 122 business and can resume responsibility for the child's supervision within 30 minutes upon request.

123 9. A program offered by a private school accredited by and in good standing with the Virginia Council for
 124 Private Education, operated for no more than four hours per day, staffed by the accredited private school's
 125 employees, and attended by school-age children who are enrolled in the accredited private school. Such
 126 programs shall be subject to safety and supervisory standards established by the Virginia Council for Private
 127 Education.

128 10. A child day program that (i) serves only dependent children of military personnel and (ii) (a) is located
 129 on a military base or federal property or (b) is certified as a family child care provider by a branch of the
 130 Armed Forces of the United States. Any branch of the Armed Forces of the United States or its agent,
 131 including an installation commander of a military base on which a child day program is located, may assume
 132 responsibility for approving or determining which children may be served by the program that is so exempted
 133 from licensure.

134 11. An out-of-school time program pursuant to § 22.1-289.02 that (i) is affiliated with a national
 135 organization with established health and safety requirements; (ii) is in compliance with any health and safety
 136 requirements established by the national organization described in clause (i); (iii) has adopted standards and
 137 requirements relating to staff training and qualifications that are consistent with the Board's regulations
 138 relating to staff training requirements and qualifications; (iv) requires all applicants for employment,
 139 employees, applicants to serve as volunteers, and volunteers to undergo a background check in accordance
 140 with § 22.1-289.039 and, if applicable, in accordance with the provisions of § 22.1-289.040; and (v) has
 141 policies and procedures relating to emergency preparedness and response, child abuse prevention and
 142 response, and internal incident reporting and investigation. If there is a conflict between any of the health and
 143 safety requirements established by the national organization or any other standards, requirements, policies, or
 144 procedures adopted by the out-of-school time program and the Board's regulations, the Board shall conduct
 145 an internal review process and consult with the out-of-school time program provider to ensure substantial
 146 compliance with the Board's regulations.

147 12. *A light family day home, provided that such home complies with the requirements for child day
 148 programs set forth in § 22.1-289.035, ensures that an individual trained and certified in first aid and
 149 cardiopulmonary resuscitation will be present in the home whenever children are present, is in compliance
 150 with all safe sleep guidelines recommended by the American Academy of Pediatrics, and self-administers the
 151 health and safety guidelines evaluation checklist described in subdivision B 2 of § 22.1-289.015. The
 152 Superintendent may conduct inspections of a light family day home to ensure compliance with basic health
 153 and safety standards.*

154 C. Child day programs that are exempt from licensure pursuant to subsection B, except for child day
 155 programs that are exempt from licensure pursuant to subdivision B 1, 5, or 11, or 12 shall:

156 1. File with the Superintendent annually and prior to beginning operation of a child day program a
 157 statement indicating the intent to operate a child day program, identifying the specific provision of this
 158 section relied upon for exemption from licensure, and certifying that the child day program has disclosed in
 159 writing to the parents or guardians of the children in the program the fact that it is exempt from licensure;

160 2. Report to the Superintendent all incidents involving serious physical injury to or death of children
 161 attending the child day program. Reports of serious physical injuries, which shall include any physical
 162 injuries that require an emergency referral to an offsite health care professional or treatment in a hospital,
 163 shall be submitted annually. Reports of deaths shall be submitted no later than one business day after the
 164 death occurred; and

165 3. Post in a visible location on the premises notice that the child day program is operating as a program
 166 exempt from licensure with basic health and safety requirements but has no direct oversight by the
 167 Department.

168 D. Child day programs that are exempt from licensure pursuant to subsection B, except for child day
 169 programs that are exempt from licensure pursuant to subdivision B 1, 5, 6, 7, or 11, or 12 shall:

170 1. Have a person trained and certified in first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation present at the child
 171 day program whenever children are present or at any other location in which children attending the child day
 172 program are present;

173 2. Maintain daily attendance records that document the arrival and departure of all children;

174 3. Have an emergency preparedness plan in place;

175 4. Comply with all applicable laws and regulations governing transportation of children; and

176 5. Comply with all safe sleep guidelines recommended by the American Academy of Pediatrics.

177 E. The Superintendent shall inspect child day programs that are exempt from licensure pursuant to
 178 subsection B to determine compliance with the provisions of this section only upon receipt of a complaint,
 179 except as otherwise provided by law.

180 F. Family day homes that are members of a licensed family day system shall not be required to obtain a
 181 license from the Superintendent.
