**Bill Number:** SB305 **Patron:** Pekarsky  
**Bill Title:** Kinship foster care; barrier crime waiver.

**Bill Summary:** Establishes a process by which a local department of social services may apply for a barrier crime waiver on behalf of an individual who has been convicted of a Virginia barrier crime that is not included on the list of federal barrier crimes and does not otherwise fall under a barrier crime exception for foster or adoptive homes for the purpose of approval of the individual's home as a kinship foster home. The bill creates a process by which a local department of social services may apply to the Department of Social Services for a waiver and for the Department to evaluate such application.

### **Fiscal Summary:** Minimal/absorbable fiscal impact.

**Fiscal Analysis:** This bill requires the Department of Social Services (DSS) to establish a barrier crime waiver process as it relates to the approval of an individual's home as a kinship foster home and supply information about the waiver process to qualifying individuals. Local departments of social services (LDSS) are permitted to apply to DSS for such a waiver on behalf of an individual meeting the conditions outlined in the bill after conducting an assessment of the individual and related circumstances. DSS is required to evaluate all applications submitted by LDSS and notify the LDSS of its decision in writing.

DSS does not have data on the number of individuals deemed ineligible for a kinship foster care placement because of a barrier crime, nor an estimate of the number of potential eligible applicants for a barrier crime waiver. However, DSS expects that staff members at DSS and LDSS currently conducting eligibility determinations can take on any additional responsibilities associated with the barrier crime waiver application and review process.

It is further expected that any additional costs associated with the provisions of this legislation, including the development of a waiver application, distribution of associated informational resources, and the promulgation of regulations, will be minimal and absorbable within existing resources.
