Bill Title: Concealed handgun permits; reciprocity with other states.

Bill Summary: Provides that the Superintendent of State Police, in consultation with the Office of the Attorney General, shall determine whether other states meet the statutory qualifications for Virginia to recognize the concealed handgun permit of a person from such other state. The proposal provides that, any out-of-state permit is recognized in the Commonwealth, provided that (i) the issuing authority provides the means for instantaneous verification of the validity of all such permits or licenses issued within that state, accessible 24 hours a day and (ii) except for the age of the permit or license holder and the type of weapon authorized to be carried, the requirements and qualifications of that state's law are adequate to prevent possession of a permit or license by persons who would be denied a permit in the Commonwealth under this article. The bill prevents a Virginia resident, except for an active-duty service member or such service member's spouse, who has not been issued a valid resident concealed handgun permit from using a concealed handgun or concealed weapon permit or license issued by another state to carry a concealed handgun in the Commonwealth. The foregoing provisions of the bill have a delayed effective date of July 1, 2027. The bill requires the Superintendent of State Police, in consultation with the Office of the Attorney General, to review any agreements for reciprocal recognition that are in place with any other states as of July 1, 2026, to determine whether the requirements and qualifications of those states' laws are adequate to prevent possession of a permit or license by persons who would be denied a permit in the Commonwealth and revoke any reciprocity agreement or recognition of any states that do not meet such requirements or qualifications by December 1, 2026. The bill requires the Attorney General to provide a written explanation for any determination that a state's laws are adequate to prevent possession of such permit or license by persons who would be denied such permit in the Commonwealth.

Fiscal Analysis: This bill requires the Department of State Police (VSP), in consultation with the Office of the Attorney General, to determine if the requirements and qualifications of state law are substantially similar to the requirements provided in this article to prevent possession of a permit or license by person who would be denied a permit in Virginia. The agency indicates they would need up to two positions to meet the requirements of the bill. The two positions included either two attorneys or one attorney and one paralegal. The agency did not provide the estimated cost for a paralegal. However, it is DPB's determination that one attorney would be sufficient to meet the provisions of this bill. The annual salary and benefit cost of an attorney is estimated to be \$206,682. This cost does not include any equipment or other one-time costs.

The bill also requires the Superintendent of State Police to maintain a registry of such states that meet the requirements and qualifications on the Virginia Criminal Information Network (VCIN) and make the registry available to law-enforcement officers for investigative purposes. It also allows for the Superintendent of State Police, in consultation with the Attorney General, to enter into agreement for reciprocal recognition with any state. VSP did not provide an estimated cost for the changes to VCIN. The impact on the OAG is unknown at this time.

Other: This bill is similar to SB115ES1.
