HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. 790

Celebrating the life of Timothy Paul Johnson.

Agreed to by the House of Delegates, July 18, 2024

WHEREAS, Tim Johnson exemplified the highest virtues of an educator and coach through his deep and unwavering devotion to his students, championing them in their pursuits and working tirelessly to ensure their success both in and out of the classroom; and

WHEREAS, Tim Johnson cultivated his love for golf throughout his life by playing or watching the sport whenever he could, and he also found great joy in cheering on the Clemson University Tigers over the years; and

WHEREAS, Tim Johnson will be fondly remembered and dearly missed by his parents, Rita and Neil; his brother, Steve; and numerous other family members and friends; now, therefore, be it
